Report: 3rd-grade reading results up 7%

However, BOE president wary of preliminary data

YOUNGSTOWN

The Ohio Department of Education reports Youngstown City Schools had a 7-percent increase in third-grade reading results.

Preliminary data in the report show a 10-percent reduction of the achievement gap and a 26-percent increase on the scaled score.

A scaled score is the total number of correct answers that have been converted

cent to 34 percent in overall proficiency," according to a district news release.

"It shows that what we've been doing is working," said district CEO Krish Mohip. "This demonstrates what our children can accomplish when supported with quality, targeted instruction led by skilled and committed teachers and principals and informed by data."

Brian Benyo, chairman of the Youngstown City School District Academic Distress Commission, agreed.

"It is a testament to combined contribution of the teaching staff, administration and district as a whole," he said. "That kind of improvement doesn't come easy."

Mohip mirrored Benyo's sentiment and said district

Zac Brown Band set for inaugural Y Live music event

PROMOTERS OF THE ANNOUNCED Zac Brown Band concert Aug. 24 at Youngstown State University's Stambaugh Stadium expect the show to be the first of an annual major music series at the outdoor venue.

"We want it to be an annual event so we need the community to support it," said Eric Ryan, chief executive officer of JAC Live, which is co-promoting the Brown concert with the Muransky Companies. "It is our hope that [it] grows to a multi-day, must-see music festival."

The inaugural Y Live: The Youngstown Music Event is sponsored by Sweeney Chevrolet Buick GMC, DeBartolo Corp., Eastwood Mall and Huntington Bank.

Tickets for the Zac Brown Band show will go on sale at 10 a.m. June 24 at ticketmaster.com and the SouthWoods Health Box Office at the Covelli Centre. Tickets are \$45.50, \$55.50, \$65.50, \$81.50 and \$95.50. YSU students will be able to purchase discounted tickets with information about that released next week.

Stambaugh will have 21,000 tickets for sale, including 5,000 on the field, Ryan said.

The band will face the west side of the stadium with the stage positioned between the 30-yard lines of the football field, he said. The east side seats will be closed off.

Victim begged murder suspect for life

Prosecutors said Friday that Elizabeth Pledger-Stewart begged for her life after her car was pushed

into a Market Street building, but the man accused of killing her told detectives his mind was already made up.

"He said he didn't have any time for that – it was too late," city Prosecutor Dana Lantz said of the confession 59-year-old Dale Williams gave to detectives for the shooting of Pledger-Stewart, 46, of Boardman, about 8 a.m. Thursday on Market Street.

Judge Robert Milich set bond at \$5 million for Williams, who was arraigned on a charge of aggravated mur-

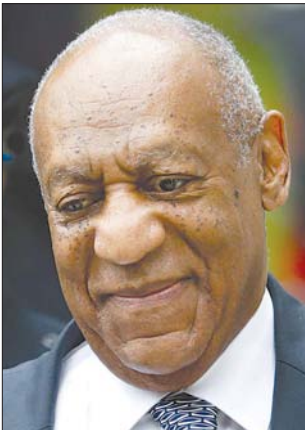

Trump financial form shows revenue up at hotel, resort

Disclosure reveals Washington property saw \$20M in earnings

WASHINGTON

President Donald Trump's Washington hotel saw almost \$20 million in revenue during its first few months of operation – a period that coincided with his election and inauguration as the 45th president.

His Mar-a-Lago resort in Florida, which he's visited seven times as president, pulled in millions of dollars more than it had previously.

The new details were included in a financial disclosure that Trump voluntarily submitted Friday to the Office of Government Eth-

ics, the first snapshot of the Trump Organization's finances since its longtime leader became president.

When he took office in January, Trump turned over the reins of his global real es-

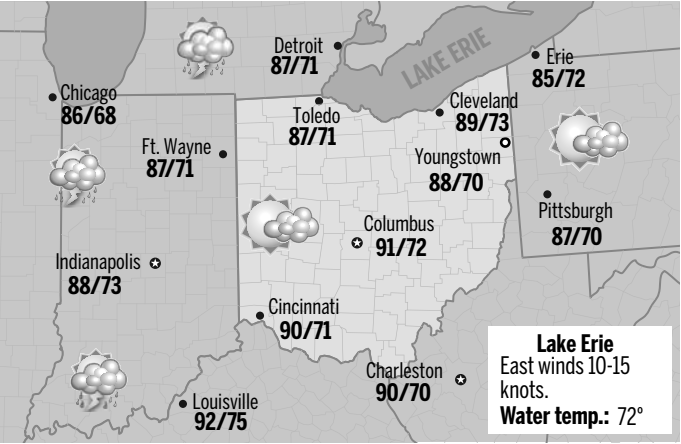

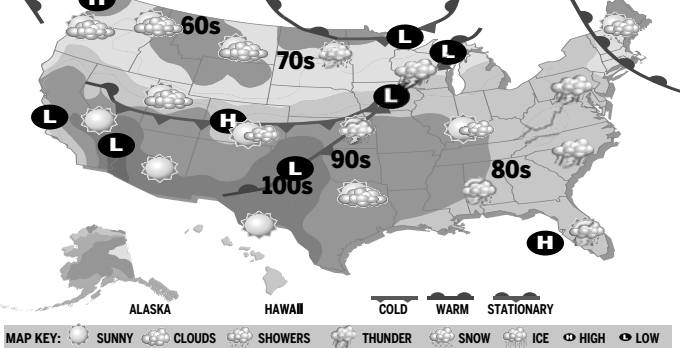

Coroner releases results of Carrie Fisher death inquiry

LOS ANGELES

Carrie Fisher died from sleep apnea and a combination of other factors, but investigators haven't been able to pinpoint an exact cause, coroner's officials said Friday.

Among the factors that contributed to Fisher's death was buildup of fatty tissue in the walls of her

arteries, the Los Angeles County coroner's office said in a news release late Friday.

The release states that the "Star Wars" actress showed signs of having taken multiple drugs, but investigators could not determine whether they contributed to her death in December.

The agency did not immediately respond to a request for additional details about whether a full autopsy report and toxicology results were available.

At impasse, Cosby jury tests the patience of judge, defense

NORRISTOWN, PA. The jury in Bill Cosby's sexual-assault case tested the patience of defense lawyers and even the judge on the fifth day of deliberations Friday as it repeatedly asked to run through testimony from the TV star, his accuser and others, struggling to break a deadlock that threatens to end the trial without a verdict.

Jurors in Bill Cosby's suburban Philadelphia sexual-assault trial wrapped up for the night, still at an impasse after more than 50 hours of deliberations.

They will return this morning for the sixth day of deliberations.

Judge Steven O'Neill refused repeated defense requests for a mistrial -- two made in open court Friday and several others made behind closed doors -- declaring that jurors could talk as long as they wanted over allegations that Cosby drugged and molested a woman at his Philadelphia mansion in 2004.

But even the solicitous judge had his limits, putting his foot down late Friday afternoon when the jurors asked to hear a sliver of testimony they'd just had read back to them. The judge told them they had to rely on their collective memory.

As the panel deliberated charges that could send him to prison for the rest of his life, Cosby tweeted thanks to his fans and supporters.

The case has already helped demolish Cosby's image as America's Dad,

cultivated during his eight-year run as Dr. Cliff Huxtable on the top-rated "The Cosby Show."

Dozens of women have come forward to say he drugged and assaulted them, but this was the only case to result in criminal charges.

On Friday, the jury asked to review multiple pieces of evidence, including Cosby's 2006 deposition testimony about quaaludes, a now-banned party drug.

Cosby, who gave the deposition as part of Constand's lawsuit against him, said he got seven prescriptions for the powerful sedative in the 1970s for the purpose of giving them to women with whom he wanted to have sex.

The testimony is relevant because Cosby is charged with giving pills to Constand, a former Temple University employee, to incapacitate her before their sexual encounter. He has said it was Benadryl, a cold and allergy medicine. Prosecutors have suggested he gave her some-

thing stronger, possibly quaaludes.

The jurors also listened to the definition of reasonable doubt, the threshold that prosecutors must cross to win a conviction, and reviewed testimony from Constand and her mother about phone conversations they had with Cosby after the encounter. According to the testimony, Cosby called himself a "sick man" but refused to identify the pills he gave to Constand.

Cosby's lawyer, Brian McMonagle, has said Cosby and Constand were lovers sharing a consensual moment of intimacy.

McMonagle objected in court to the panel's repeated requests to review testimony, saying it suggested some jurors were trying to coerce other jurors in an attempt to bring an end to the deadlock.

The judge said he saw no evidence of coercion or trouble in the deliberating room after the jurors reported their impasse on Thursday.

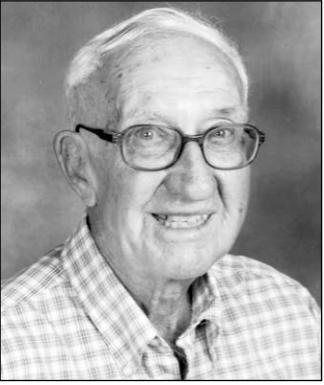

Township police are investigating a theft from auto reported at the Davis Family YMCA parking lot Thursday in which credit and bank cards and cash were taken.

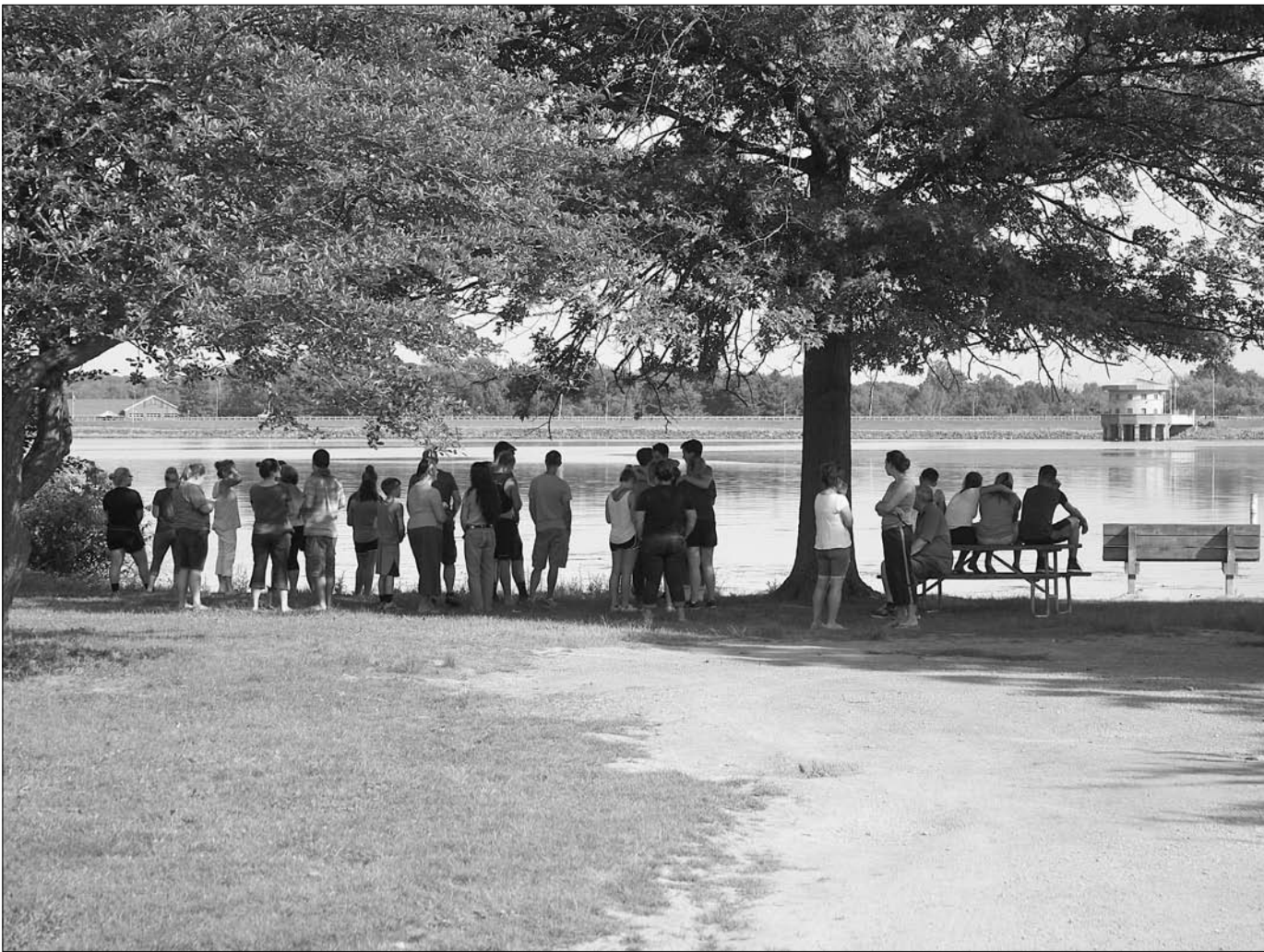

MVSD board OKs distribution of funds

MINERAL RIDGE

The Mahoning Valley Sanitary District Board of Directors has approved distribution of surplus funds totaling \$5 million to Youngstown, Niles and McDonald.

Under the resolution the four-member board unanimously approved Thursday, Youngstown will get \$3.7 million; Niles will get \$1.2 million; and McDonald will get \$100,000.

The distribution is subject to the approval of Judges Lou A. D'Apolito of Mahoning County Common Pleas Court and Ronald Rice of Trumbull County Common Pleas Court, said Alan Tatalovich, district secretary.

The resolution says the MVSD board has determined that the district's treasury will have \$5 million in available surplus funds as of Dec. 31.

Tatalovich said this is the first time in his 30 years with MVSD that the district will be distributing surplus funds to communities it

serves.

The resolution says the money is being given to the three communities in proportion to the amount of MVSD water pumped and billed to them.

It says the surplus distribution is being made "for the purpose of infrastructure improvements and related equipment necessary to maintain and distribute safe water supply."

The surplus money will be dispensed in three installments: \$2 million each on June 30 and Sept. 30 and \$1 million on Dec. 31, the resolution says.

The district furnishes treated water from Meander Creek Reservoir to Youngstown, Niles and McDonald, which supply it to Girard, Canfield, Lordstown, Craig Beach and portions of 10 townships in Mahoning and Trumbull counties.

The 7-mile-long reservoir has an 11 billion gallon capacity. And the district pumps an average of more than 20 million gallons of water a day and serves about 220,000 people.

tate, property-management and marketing empire to his two adult sons and a senior executive.

But Trump did not divest, instead placing his enormous portfolio of financial assets in a trust controlled by the executive and Donald Trump Jr.

He can take back control of the trust at any time, and he's free to withdraw cash from it as he pleases.

His latest financial disclosure covers January 2016 through this spring.

The documents have added importance because

Trump isn't following the long tradition of presidential candidates and office-holders making public their tax returns.

Those returns provide more complete financial information than the financial disclosures, which include mostly broad ranges for income and debts.

The report shows Trump resigned from more than 500 positions, stepping down from many on the day before his inauguration.

Trump listed at least \$315 million in liabilities, about the same as in a report he filed last year.

The president still owes more than \$100 million to

Deutsche Bank and a similar amount to Ladder Capital Finance, a New York-based real-estate investment trust.

What is unclear from the disclosure is whether Trump added to his debt in any significant way to help pay for his presidential campaign.

Because the ranges required for disclosure under federal ethics laws are so wide – Trump's disclosure lists five separate liabilities each at "over \$50,000,000" – it is impossible to tell whether his debt load has changed appreciably.

Even in the thick of his presidential campaign, Trump earned at least \$594 million from his businesses,

properties, books and other products. That's in line with what he reported for 2015 and the first few months of 2016.

Some of Trump's ventures appear to be making more money than they had a year earlier.

His book "The Art of the Deal" is having a comeback of its own. Royalties from the 1987 autobiography ranged between \$100,000 and \$1 million, according to the new report.

The 2016 report listed royalties as being between \$50,000 and \$100,000, and the 2015 report put them at \$15,000 to \$50,000.

Trump's management fees

from Indonesian companies tied to two planned resorts there more than doubled. The latest disclosure puts the fees \$380,000, up from \$167,000 he reported in 2016.

Trump is partnering with a billionaire Indonesian, Hary Tanoesoedibjo, on the two ventures. One is planned for the tourist island of Bali, the other near Jakarta.

Mar-a-Lago, where Trump played host to several foreign dignitaries during his seven weekends there this winter, has improved its finances. Trump listed the resort's income as about \$37 million, up from about \$30 million it had taken in prior to his May

2016 financial report.

His golf club in Bedminster, New Jersey, on the other hand, produced almost \$20 million in revenue, about what it had during the previous reporting period. Trump recently began decamping to that property some weekends.

The Trump International Hotel, housed in the Old Post Office building down the street from the White House, has seen a burst of activity since opening its doors last fall. In addition to serving as a hub during inauguration festivities, it has hosted numerous events for foreign diplomatic and business interests.

der for the death of Pledger-Stewart as she was driving to work.

Lantz told the judge Pledger-Stewart and Williams are both from the Cleveland area and had a relationship that turned sour.

On Wednesday less than 12 hours before her death, Pledger-Stewart drove to the Boardman police station and made a report about threats Williams made against her, including one where he threatened "to get her in the streets."

Lantz said Williams confessed to detectives and said he knew her route to work and was waiting for her Friday. Video shows that Williams waited for 48 minutes nearby before he saw Pledger-Stewart's car, and he weaved in and out of traffic before ramming it off the road and killing her.

Williams emptied an entire 10-round clip of 9 mm ammunition at Pledger-Stewart, Lantz said, before surrendering to police, even though he told detectives he hoped a police officer would shoot him.

Lantz said Williams had a menacing conviction in Cleveland in 1994 and an aggravated-assault conviction in Cleveland in 1996.

Earlier Friday, at Compass Family And Community Services, advocates for victims of domestic violence had a forum because they said they want victims to know there is hope and there are resources available for them, said Joe Caruso, president and CEO.

Malinda Gavins, the project manager for Sojourner House, which is run by Compass and helps victims of domestic abuse, said it is important for someone in an abusive relationship to have a plan when they leave a relationship. person who is abused wants to leave.

Gavins said that Sojourner House is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week and there is a person available after hours who can talk to a victim at any time and can refer that person to a place to stay at any time.

City police officer Kelly Jankowski, who works with domestic-violence victims as part of her job as an investigator with the Family Investigative Services Unit at the department, said when officers take domestic-violence complaints, victims are given a form to fill out that refers them to Sojourner House should they need help finding an immediate place to stay.

Jankowski said it is not unusual for victims to drop charges or refuse to testify against their abuser. Often,

she said, they are afraid because the abuser will go to jail only for a short period. Jankowski said she tells victims that they can use that time to figure out when to leave the relationship.

Caruso and Gavins said it is not unusual for a victim to try and leave a situation several times before they finally succeed. What helps when someone uses a program like Sojourner House is that victims have a network of counselors and other people around to help them. That builds up a person's self esteem because they have people supporting them, Gavins said.

"They have a whole team to help them," Gavins said.

But Thursday, Austintown police say Mango punched an employee at a Mahoning Avenue store and took \$50. About two hours later he was dead after leading police on a chase that went the wrong way on Interstate 680 and he was killed after ramming head-on into a tractor-trailer.

Mango, 47, of Hanoverton, served 13 years in prison after a similar chase in 2001.

His record appears to be clean until 2016, when he picked up the theft charge in Mahoning County Area Court in Boardman, and the case was then bound over to a grand jury and Mango was indicted. He pleaded guilty to the charge in May. In the plea agreement, prosecutors said they would stand silent at sentencing.

Columbiana County Municipal Court records show Mango has cases dating back to 1990.

On March 28, he was charged with misdemeanor theft, pleaded no contest April 3 and was found guilty and sentenced to 180 days in jail.

However, court records show on April 24 Mango was released because there was a bed available at the Neil Kennedy Recovery Clinic for a 28-day recovery program. On May 24, a court entry said Mango was still undergoing counseling. The last entry in the file, dated May 31, said "counseling ongoing." The records referred to a report but the report was not available online.

On Thursday, an employee at the Dollar Tree, 6007 Mahoning Ave., told Austintown police a man came to the counter to purchase a soda at 9:35 a.m. When she opened the register, he punched her in the face, took \$50 from the register and fled.

He also stole another employee's cellphone, which had been sitting on the counter. The employee told police he left in a blue

Chevrolet S-10 pickup truck with a blue cap. Austintown police broadcast a description of the truck and Youngstown police spotted it about 11 a.m. in the Shirley Road area.

The truck would not pull over for police and instead went south on Interstate 680, crossing over the freeway just before the turnpike and going north on I-680.

At some point, Mango ended up going north in the southbound lanes of the freeway before he struck a tractor-trailer in the area of the Market Street exit and was killed.

The 2001 chase happened after several robberies Mango was suspected of in Boardman at the time. Township police chased him into Youngstown, where he ended up ramming three cars at the intersection of Youngstown-Poland Road and Midlothian Boulevard.

One of the people in those cars, Phillip Swanter, 34, of Struthers, died about a month later from his injuries.

Road work to begin in Mercer communities

STONEBORO, PA.

A project designed to give motorists a smoother ride on state Route 845 in Stoneboro and in Lake and Sandy Lake townships in Mercer County is expected to begin next week, the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation said.

The project will improve about 3 miles of Route 845 (Stoneboro Lateral Road/Linden Road/Linden Street/Walnut Street) from U.S. Route 62 in Sandy Lake Township to state Route 358 (Sandy Lake-Greenville Road) in Lake Township.

The work, scheduled

for completion by early September, will include milling, paving, updating drainage, road shoulders, guide rail installation, curb ramps, chain-link fencing and pavement markings.

No detours are expected, but motorists may encounter lane restrictions controlled by flaggers.

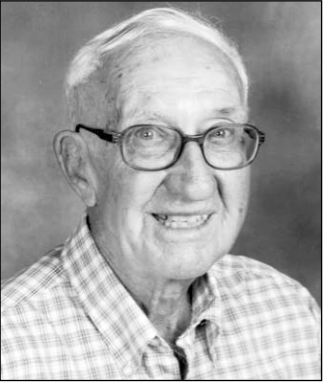

Closed housing sales up across the Mahoning Valley

YOUNGSTOWN

Closed housing sales in the Mahoning Valley were up in every county year-over-year in May.

Closed sales were up by 0.4 percent year-over-year in Mahoning County to 250 from 249, according to the Youngstown/Columbiana County Association of Realtors.

In Columbiana County, closed housing sales were

up 18.7 percent to 89 from 75 reported in May.

Trumbull County also saw an increase in closed sales year-over-year in May. Total closed sales in May were up 14.6 percent to 227 from 198 reported in May 2016, according to the Warren Area Board of Realtors.

Mahoning County saw a 34.7 percent increase in pending sales year-over-year from 259 in May 2016 to 349 in May. New listings

dropped 3.3 percent to 356 from 368 the previous year, and the inventory of homes for sale also dropped by 32.5 percent to 967 from 1,433.

The average sales price for a house in the county was up 2.9 percent to \$117,432.

For the year so far, Mahoning County has a 3.6 percent decrease in closed sales over 2016.

In Columbiana County, pending sales were up 61.4 percent to 142 from 88 the

previous year.

New listings in the county dropped 5.3 percent to 124 from 131, and the inventory of homes for sale dropped 18.2 percent to 409 from 500 in May 2016. The average sales price for a home in the county dropped 4 percent to \$108,561.

For the year so far, closed sales in Columbiana County are up 5.5 percent.

In Trumbull County, pending sales are up 41.8

percent to 275 from 194 in May 2016.

New listings in the county were down 16.2 percent to 279 from 333 the previous year, and the inventory of homes dropped by 29.5 percent to 778 from 1,103.

The average sales price for a home in the country increased 17.5 percent to \$103,443.

So far this year the county has sold 8.5 percent more homes than last year.

Amazon deal for Whole Foods could bring retail experiments

Online retail giant Amazon is making a bold expansion into physical stores with a \$13.7 billion deal to buy Whole Foods, setting the stage for radical retail experiments that could revolutionize how people buy groceries and everything else.

Amazon could try to use automation and data analysis to draw more customers to stores while helping Whole Foods cut costs and perhaps prices. Meanwhile, the more than 460 Whole Foods stores in the U.S., Canada and the U.K. could be turned into distribution hubs – not just for delivering groceries but as pickup centers for online orders.

“The conventional grocery store should feel threatened and incapable of responding,” Wedbush Securities analyst Michael Pachter said.

Moody's lead retail analyst Charlie O'Shea said the deal could be “transformative, not just for food retail, but for retail in general.”

Walmart, which has the largest share of the U.S. food market, has already been pushing harder into e-commerce to build on strength in its stores and groceries. It announced Friday that it's buying online men's clothing retailer Bonobos for \$310 million, following a string of online

acquisitions including ModCloth and Moosejaw.

But if Amazon can be the one-stop shop for everything – groceries had been one of the key missing elements – customers would have even less of a need to go to Walmart or elsewhere.

Amazon already offers grocery-delivery services in five markets, but analysts say expansion is tough because its current distribution centers are set up for dry goods, not perishables. Just two years ago, Whole Foods CEO John Mackey told Bloomberg BusinessWeek that Amazon's foray into grocery delivery would be “Amazon's Waterloo.”

But it was Whole Foods that fell behind as shoppers found alternatives to the organic and natural foods it helped popularize since its founding in 1978. Whole Foods has seen its sales slump and recently announced a board shake-up and cost-cutting plan amid pressure from activist investor Jana Partners.

Groceries are already a fiercely competitive business, with low-cost rivals such as Aldi putting pressure on traditional supermarket chains and another discounter, Lidl, opening its first U.S. stores just this week. Whole Foods itself had launched an offshoot chain named after its “365”

private-label brand in a nod to the popularity of no-frills chains.

The Amazon-Whole Foods combination, expected to close by the end of the year, could put even more pressure on those chains and other big grocery sellers.

Amazon could try to cut operational costs at Whole Foods by using the same types of robots that already move inventory around at its e-commerce fulfillment centers.

The company also has been testing sensors at a convenience store in Seattle to track items as shoppers put them into baskets or return them to the shelf. Shoppers skip the checkout line, and their Amazon accounts get automatically charged. Gartner retail analyst Robert Hetu said Amazon could bring pieces of that to Whole Foods to further cut costs.

Both companies said there will be no layoffs, but they did not respond to other questions about Amazon's plans for Whole Foods. Whole Foods will keep operating stores under its name. In an email to customers, the company said it planned to maintain the same standards under Amazon, including bans on artificial flavors and colors.

Dow ticks up; grocery stores plunge after Amazon deal

Amazon's \$13.4 billion deal for Whole Foods sent grocery stores, big retailers, and food makers and distributors plunging Friday. Energy companies rose while other stocks were little changed.

It's rare for a single deal to have a big effect on the broader stock market, but Amazon's agreement to buy Whole Foods Market did.

Investors wondered if Amazon will do to grocery stores and supermarkets what it's done to sellers of goods such as clothing and office supplies: force them to make big changes or be supplanted.

Neil Saunders, managing director of the research firm Global Data Retail, said Amazon is likely to push supermarkets and grocery stores to slash prices, which will affect the companies that make and distribute those products.

“As Amazon enters the grocery-market proper, it will put a lot more pressure on existing grocers,” he said. “Those grocers will respond by cutting prices, and that will cut profits for the distributors.”

Elsewhere, energy companies rose as oil futures bounced back from their lowest price this year and utilities and industrial and basic materials ground out modest gains.

Wal-Mart had its worst day in more than a year as it fell \$3.67, or 4.7 percent, to \$75.24. Costco took its biggest loss in almost six years as it sank \$12.95, or 7.2 percent, to \$167.11. Target tumbled \$2.85, or 5.1 percent, to \$52.61.

Supermarkets and grocery stores had also plunged Thursday after Kroger cut its annual forecast. Kroger, which plunged 19 percent a day ago, lost another \$2.27, or 9.2 percent, and hit a three-year low of \$22.29. Sprouts Farmers Market skidded \$1.41, or 6.3 percent, to \$21.01.

US housing starts drop for 3rd-straight month

Homebuilders slowed down the pace of construction for the third-straight month in May, a possible sign that the shortage of houses for sale might worsen.

The Commerce Department said Friday housing starts fell 5.5 percent in May to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1.09 million units. This comes after a 2.7 percent monthly decline in April and a 7.7 percent drop in March. Home construction is still 3.2 percent higher year-to-date, but that increase has been too modest to address the dwindling supply of homes.

Homebuilders remain optimistic about their sales prospects, but the level of construction has done little to meet demand from would-be buyers. The number of existing homes listed for sale has been registering annual declines for roughly two years – creating a dearth

of properties on the market.

“The lack of inventory of homes for sale is one of the most pressing challenges in the housing market today,” said Mark Fleming, chief economist at First American Financial, a title insurance company.

The monthly declines in housing starts come despite a solid job market with a relatively healthy unemploy-

ment rate of 4.3 percent. Many analysts expect the job gains to translate into more home construction. What has generally happened is a decline in the construction of apartment buildings that has been more than offset by the gains in the building of single-family houses.

Groundbreakings in the Northeast were unchanged in May.

Ohio's May jobless rate at 4.9 percent

Ohio's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.9 percent in May, down from 5 percent in April.

Ohio's nonagricultural wage and salary employment increased 6,300 over the month, from a revised 5,509,100 in April to 5,515,400 in May.

The local county unemployment figures will be released Tuesday.

The number of workers unemployed in Ohio in May was 286,000, down 2,000 from 288,000 in April.

The state's May civilian labor force, or the sum of the employed and unemployed, was 5,789,000, an increase from April's 5,787,000.

The state saw increases in the private sector of 5,200; in professional and business services of 7,000; mining and logging of 100; edu-

cational and health services of 6,500; other services of 2,900; financial activities of 1,900; state government of 5,000; local government of 1,300; and federal government of 400.

The state saw decreases in manufacturing of 3,600; 2,100 losses in construction; leisure and hospitality of 6,000; trade, transportation and utilities of 5,900; and information of 1,200.

The number of unemployed has increased by 4,000 in the past 12 months from 282,000.

The May unemployment rate for Ohio, at 4.9 percent, did not change from May 2016.

The U.S. unemployment rate for May was 4.3 percent, 0.1 percentage points lower than in April, and 0.4 percentage points lower than in May 2016.

Scalise's doctor
hopes for an
'excellent recovery'

WASHINGTON

Congressman Steve Scalise can hope to make an "excellent recovery," his trauma surgeon said Friday, even though the lawmaker arrived at the hospital Wednesday at imminent risk of death after getting shot at a congressional baseball practice.

In his first public comments since the shooting, Dr. Jack Sava of MedStar Washington Hospital Center said it's a "good possibility" that the Louisiana Republican will be able to return to work in his full capacity.

Sava declined to put a timeline on when that would happen or when Scalise, 51, would be able to leave the hospital. The doctor described how a bullet from an assault rifle entered Scalise's hip and traversed his pelvis, shattering blood vessels, bones and internal organs along the way.

Anger erupts over
possible flaws at
burned tower

LONDON

Grief turned to outrage Friday over a deadly high-rise tower fire in London amid reports that materials used in the building's renovation could have fueled the inferno that left dozens dead and missing as it decimated the public-housing block.

Engineering experts say outside insulation panels installed on the 24-story Grenfell Tower may have helped the fire spread rapidly from one floor to the next. The Guardian newspaper reported Friday that contractors installed a cheaper, less flame-resistant type of paneling in the renovation that ended in May 2016.

Tensions were high Friday two days after the overnight fire gutted the huge housing block, killing at least 30 people and leaving dozens missing and hundreds homeless.

Scuffles broke out near the Kensington and Chelsea town hall offices as demonstrators chanting "We want justice!" surged toward the doors.

after US Navy ship
collision off Japan

TOKYO

Seven crew members are missing and one injured after a U.S. Navy destroyer collided early this morning with a merchant ship off the coast of Japan, the country's coast guard reported.

Footage from the Japanese TV network NHK showed heavy damage to the mid-right side of the Navy ship and a person in a stretcher being lifted to a helicopter.

The U.S. 7th Fleet said on its Facebook page that the number of injuries is still being determined.

Coast guard official Takeshi Aikawa said seven crew members are unaccounted for, and one had a head injury. Further details of his or her condition were not known.

Relatives of crew members were awaiting news of their loved ones.

Southwest US preps
for 120 degree temps

When bracing for 120 degrees, it's all about the water.

Drinking it, splashing in it to stay cool, and drinking it some more. A lot more.

That's what officials were urging and residents were planning Friday as a potentially record-shattering heat wave started enveloping the Southwest United States and threatened to bring temperatures of more than 120 degrees to parts of Arizona and California next week.

People in places such as Palm Springs and Phoenix are used to seriously high temperatures, but 120 degrees becomes all the talk around the water cooler. And with the health dangers of heat and dehydration, that's where authorities hope they keep coming back.

Trump confirms he's under investigation

WASHINGTON

President Donald Trump confirmed Friday he is under federal investigation and appeared to single out a senior Justice Department official for criticism, underscoring his growing frustration with the persistent focus on Russia's involvement in the 2016 election and possibly his campaign.

"I am being investigated for firing the FBI Director by the man who told me to

fire the FBI Director! Witch Hunt," the president wrote.

The morning missive appeared to refer to Rod Rosenstein, the deputy attorney general.

Last month, Rosenstein sent a memo to Trump raising concerns over FBI Director James Comey — concerns the White House then cited as a central reason for Comey's firing.

Days after Comey was abruptly ousted, Rosenstein appointed Robert Mueller as special counsel to investigate Russian involvement

in the 2016 presidential election and possible collusion with the Trump campaign. Mueller also has expansive powers to investigate any matters that develop from his initial investigation.

It was unclear whether the president's comment confirming he was under investigation was based on direct knowledge or media reports that Mueller is examining whether the president obstructed justice by firing Comey.

Still, the snowballing investigation has deeply an-

gered Trump, who denies he has any nefarious ties to Russia.

He's increasingly focused his anger at both Rosenstein and Mueller, according to advisers and confidants, viewing the two as part of a biased effort to undermine his presidency.

Sen. Dianne Feinstein, the top Democrat on the Senate Judiciary Committee, said she was "increasingly concerned" that Trump will fire both Mueller and Rosenstein.

"The message the presi-

dent is sending through his tweets is that he believes the rule of law doesn't apply to him and that anyone who thinks otherwise will be fired," Feinstein said. "That's undemocratic on its face and a blatant violation of the president's oath of office."

Rosenstein took over the Russia probe soon after Attorney General Jeff Sessions recused himself. But Rosenstein, too, may ultimately have to hand off oversight of the probe given his own role in Comey's firing.

Girlfriend whose texts urged
suicide guilty of manslaughter

TAUNTON, MASS.

A woman who sent her boyfriend a barrage of text messages urging him to kill himself when they were both teenagers was convicted Friday of involuntary manslaughter in a trial that raised questions about whether words can kill.

The judge found that Michelle Carter caused the death of Conrad Roy III, who intentionally filled his truck with carbon monoxide in a Fairhaven, Mass., store parking lot in July 2014.

Carter, who faces up to 20 years in prison, cried and clutched a handkerchief to her face as Juvenile Court Judge Lawrence Moniz detailed her conduct and the circumstances of Roy's death, but she was stoic when the verdict was formally pronounced.

As spectators and members of both the Roy and Carter families left the courtroom, she sat at the defense table sobbing.

The judge focused his ruling on three words Carter said to the 18-year-old Roy after he climbed out of his truck as it was filling with toxic gas and told her he was scared.

"Get back in," Carter told Roy, according to a friend who testified that Carter described the conversation in a text message to her about a month after Roy died.

The judge said those words constituted "wanton and reckless conduct."

He said Carter, then 17, had a duty to call someone for help when she knew Roy was attempting suicide. Yet she did not call the police or Roy's family, he noted.

"She did not issue a simple additional instruction: Get out of the truck," the judge said.

The case provided a disturbing look at teen depression and suicide. Carter and Roy met in Florida in 2012 while both were on vacation with their families. Their relationship consisted mainly of texting and

other electronic communications. They only met in person a handful of times.

Both teens struggled with depression. Carter had also been treated for anorexia, and Roy had made earlier suicide attempts.

The sensational trial was closely watched in legal circles and a hot topic on social media, in part because of the insistent tone of text messages Carter sent to Roy.

"You can't think about it. You just have to do it. You said you were gonna do it. Like I don't get why you aren't," Carter wrote to Roy the day of his suicide.

In the end, the judge found that it was not the coercive text messages that caused Roy's death. It was Carter's insistence that he get back in the truck. The judge ruled that Carter can remain free on bail but ordered her not to make any contact with Roy's family or leave the state. A sentencing hearing is scheduled for Aug. 3.

Trump restores some Cuba penalties

MIAMI

President Donald Trump declared Friday he was restoring some travel and economic restrictions on Cuba that were lifted as part of the Obama administration's historic easing. He challenged the communist government of Raul Castro to negotiate a better deal for Cubans and Cuban-Americans.

Announcing the rollback of President Barack Obama's diplomatic opening during a speech in Miami, Trump said Cuba had secured far too many concessions from the U.S. in the "misguided" deal but "now those days are over."

He said penalties on Cuba would remain in place until its government releases political prisoners, stops abusing dissidents and respects freedom of expression.

"America has rejected the Cuban people's oppressors," Trump said in a crowded, sweltering auditorium. "They are rejected officially today — rejected."

Though Trump's announcement stops short of a full reversal of the Cuba rap-

prochement, it targets the travel and economic engagement between the countries that has blossomed in the short time since relations were restored.

The goal is to halt the flow of U.S. cash to the country's military and security services in a bid to increase pressure on Cuba's government.

Embassies in Havana and Washington will remain open. U.S. airlines and cruise ships will still be allowed to serve the island 90

miles south of Florida.

The "wet foot, dry foot" policy, which once let most Cuban migrants stay if they made it to U.S. soil but was terminated under Obama, will remain terminated. Remittances to Cuba won't be cut off.

But individual "people-to-people" trips by Americans to Cuba, allowed by Obama for the first time in decades, will again be prohibited. And the U.S. government will police other such trips.

GOP, Dem governors call for
changes in House health bill

DES MOINES, IOWA

A group of Republican and Democratic governors are echoing President Donald Trump's criticism of a House GOP health care bill, saying it threatens coverage for the most vulnerable. Instead, they're asking Senate leaders to work together on an overhaul of Democrat Barack Obama's health care law.

In a letter to Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell and Minority Leader Chuck Schumer, seven governors, including three moderate Republicans, argue that "true and lasting reforms are best approached by finding common ground in a bipartisan fashion."

The governors implore the leaders to focus on stabilizing the individual insurance markets, give states flexibility and ensure affordable cover.

The Associated Press obtained a copy of the letter Friday.

The governors said they oppose the bill the

House narrowly passed last month, citing its deep cuts to Medicaid, the federal-state health insurance program for low-income Americans.

Republicans have said the House bill is aimed at lowering premiums and expanding consumers' insurance choices while getting rid of the mandates in "Obamacare" that require people to buy coverage.

The nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office has said the House measure would raise costs for many older and lower income people while causing 23 million people to lose insurance over a decade.

The bill "calls into question coverage for the vulnerable and fails to provide the necessary resources to ensure that no one is left out, while shifting significant costs to the states," the governors said.

The governors say Congress must focus more on controlling costs and settling the individual insurance market.

Johnson commits to 3 more years of racing

Hendrick reveals contract extension

BROOKLYN, MICH.

Fresh off another championship — and with three more victories already this season — Jimmie Johnson is showing no signs of slowing down.

Now, he's ready for at least three more years of racing. Beyond that, Johnson is leaving his options open.

Johnson agreed to a three-year contract extension with Hendrick Motorsports through 2020. Hendrick announced the deal with the seven-time NASCAR Cup Series champion Friday.

"I've said it before and continued to say that when the fire does go out, I will step down," said Johnson, who is preparing for this weekend's race at Michigan International Speedway. "I don't have any framework now on a timeline."

"I just know that I've got three more years of trying to go out there and win championships and win races. I'm as hungry as I've ever been and as focused and dedicated on doing my job."

Hendrick already lost Jeff Gordon, who announced his retirement two years ago, and now Dale Earnhardt Jr. is in his final season. Johnson, however, won the title last year at age 41 and has no interest in stepping aside. Maybe this will be his final contract, maybe it won't.

Oregon State's Heimlich maneuver: Keep mum

Oregon State players were happy to answer any questions about the baseball part of the College World Series. The topic of Luke Heimlich was a non-starter.

Heimlich, the Pac-12 pitcher of the year, announced Thursday he would not accompany the Beavers to Omaha because he didn't want to be a distraction. Last week it was revealed that when Heimlich was a teenager he pleaded guilty to molesting a 6-year-old girl. He did not pitch in the Beavers' super regional against Vanderbilt.

Coach Pat Casey said Heimlich made the decision to stay home on his own; if Heimlich had wanted to, he would have been allowed to travel to Omaha with the team. Oregon State, the No. 1 seed in the NCAA tournament, opens the CWS today against Cal State Fullerton.

Players gushed over the opportunity to play for a national championship and the success they've enjoyed this season. At 54-4, the Beavers have the fewest losses of any team entering a CWS since Texas came in 57-4 in 1982.

Questions to a half-dozen players about Heimlich and his absence were deflected with no comment or responses about how the team is close-knit and how it approaches games "one game at a time, one pitch at a time."

KJ Harrison, without mentioning Heimlich, generally addressed the cloud over the program.

"You just get stronger from it," he said. "It's one of those things. We're looking to play this weekend and we're looking at our next opponent and we keep a very good team aspect in here."

Ron Prettyman, NCAA managing director of championships and alliances, said in an interview with The Associated Press that the NCAA had no input on whether Heimlich should participate or be with the team in Omaha.

Prettyman said he knew of no discussions at the NCAA level since Heimlich's sex offender status came to light about instituting a policy that would bar an athlete who has a felony record from participating. Those decisions, he said, are left up to the school.

Asked if it was best for the CWS that Heimlich stayed away, Prettyman said, "There are pros and cons. My heart goes out to the victim but also to the young man who is paying severe consequences for a bad action. I really don't have a strong opinion about it — not that it made it easier or harder or anything else. We allowed the situation to run its course and we're here to support Oregon State in the process."

Casey said his players have dealt with the situation as well as could be expected.

"I really haven't talked a whole lot about it," he said. "Our guys are very tight-knit group of guys. They've handled it with class. You prepare for distractions. I tell guys at the beginning of the season every year that one of the toughest things you have to do if you win is block out distractions. They can come from anywhere."

Details about the molestation were revealed last week in a story published by *The Oregonian*/OregonLive. In an editorial accompanying the article, the newspaper said it learned about Heimlich's 2012 conviction in Washington state after running a background check that it routinely does for in-depth profiles.

Heimlich was the team's top pitcher, with an 11-1 record and nation-best 0.76 ERA. He had been projected to be an early round pick in Major League Baseball's draft, which ended Wednesday without him being selected.

Prosecutors in Washington state initially charged Heimlich with two counts of molestation for abuse that began when the girl was 4, *The Oregonian* said. He ultimately pleaded guilty to one count of molestation in 2011, a period during which he was 15. Prosecutors dismissed the other charge.

He finished his probation and court-ordered sex offender treatment in fall 2014, around the time he moved to Corvallis to attend Oregon State.

Heimlich has said he plans to return for his senior year at Oregon State and rejoin the baseball team.

Ducks to buy out contract of ex-Penguin Despres

The Ducks are expected to buy out the contract of defenseman Simon Despres, whose time with the team was impacted heavily by multiple concussions.

Signed to a five-year contract extension worth \$18.5 million before the 2015-16 season, Despres was put on waivers for the purpose of the buyout. The Ducks will be paying Despres for the next eight seasons but will be on the hook for only one-third of the \$15.9 million left on his deal.

The window for teams buying out players began Friday. Most have them paying the player two-thirds of their money owed over twice the length of the remaining years on his deal. NHL buyout rules, however, allow for teams to buy out players under 26 years of age at one-third of the remaining amount.

Despres doesn't turn 26 until July 27. Instead of a \$3.7 million salary cap hit, the Ducks will be charged with a \$1,262,500 hit in 2017-18, according to capfriendly.com. They'll also see a savings of \$337,500 the following two seasons before getting charged with \$667,500 for seasons 2021-22 through 2024-25.

It is a huge difference for the budget-conscious Ducks, who typically don't like to go the buyout route but will pay out \$5.3 million instead of \$10.6 million for a player whose future in the NHL is clouded. Concussion symptoms resurfaced for Despres after a hit in the 2016-17 season opener at Dallas.

Despres did not play in another game with the team. He did attend some home games and began to do some light skating before practices during the playoffs, in addition to regularly being evaluated and examined by the team. But the once-promising defender was not close to playing.

Despres was rewarded with the extension after a strong performance in the Ducks' run to the 2015 Western Conference finals following his acquisition from Pittsburgh. A concussion resulting from an illegal high hit by Colorado's Tyson Barrie early in the 2015-16 season shelved him for 42 games.

It became clear that Despres wasn't the same player afterward. He missed more time because of a head injury suffered during a March 2016 game at Montreal and struggled during the subsequent first-round playoff loss to Nashville.

Despres pronounced himself fit for 2016-17 after a summer of visiting multiple specialists and was ready for a new start, even changing his number from 24 to 6. He felt he had overcome his concussions, which he said left him very sensitive to light and noise.

"I had headaches," Despres said during training camp last September. "Dizziness. Close to fainting. Stuff like that. It was a challenge. It was dangerous."

The cap savings triggered by the buyout puts the Ducks in a better position to sign cornerstone defenseman Cam Fowler to a long-term contract extension. Fowler cannot do so until July 1 as he isn't a free agent until next summer.

But the signs have long been apparent that locking up Fowler is high priority for the Ducks, who are currently in talks with Fowler's camp. The defender expressed in March to the Southern California News Group his confidence in a long-term deal getting done sooner than later.

were not afraid to voice this week. There's also a bit of an undercurrent about a Russian meeting an American, though Kovalev spends much of his time in Los Angeles.

Unfortunately for both fighters, those outside boxing don't seem terribly interested. The fight at the Mandalay Bay resort is being held in a smaller arena than the first, and pay-per-view sales are expected to be tepid.

And any efforts to generate buzz this week were dashed when Floyd Mayweather Jr. and Conor McGregor announced their own fight.

"The people who are going to buy our fight are still going to buy it and come out," Ward said. "I don't feel like it affects me. It is what it is."

Anyone who watched the first fight would have to be intrigued by the rematch. Kovalev appeared on his way to beating Ward in November before Ward gained control midway through the fight and eked out a one-point win on all three scorecards.

Kovalev claimed he overtrained for the first bout and had nothing when he went into the ring. Regardless, he said, he plans to not only win the fight but take out his frustrations on Ward.

"When I see his face I want to bash him," Kovalev said. "I don't like this guy."

Ward (31-0, 15 knockouts) isn't about to invite Kovalev over for dinner, either. He's not happy about what he said were racist overtones in videos sent out by Kovalev and his team, and unhappy Kovalev keeps questioning the legitimacy of his

win in the first fight.

"I've been through adversity in and out of the ring," Ward said. "I'm not perfect but I make an effort to be an asset to the game."

The fight will be televised on HBO pay-per-view, which has some in boxing scratching their heads. The first bout was on pay-per-view, too, and drew only a reported 150,000 buys, despite it being an attractive matchup for boxing fans.

Though Kovalev (31-1, 26 knockouts) made his mark as a power puncher, he was unable to put Ward away after putting him down in the first fight. Ward said that will play in his favor in the rematch.

"I'm not averse to getting hit," Ward said. "But I'm not going to put my head out there on a platter. I'm not into taking two [punches] to get one."

Area anglers get their revenge

Walleye tournament angler Sammy Cappelli vowed he would exact revenge for a cruel twist of fate that cost him and his teammate a shot at the Cabela's National Team Championship a few years back.

Competing under a no-cull format on wind-swept Lake Oahe in South Dakota, Cappelli stuck with a strategy of throwing back fish under 20 inches to fill his limit with bigger walleyes. The strategy backfired when the wind kicked up, making Oahe too rough.

He and partner Eric Williams returned to the dock fishless one of the three days thanks to the weather wrecking their plans to catch and keep bigger fish later. Had they kept the fish they threw back, they would have easily won the national crown. Cappelli vowed then that he would bounce back from that crushing disappointment and win it all.

Fate was far kinder June 8-10 for Cappelli, of Poland, and Williams, of Hubbard, as they pounded giant Lake Erie walleyes and easily outdistanced a world-class field of competitors in the 2017 Cabela's National Team Championship. They lugged home \$175,000 in merchandise and cash, including two Ranger 620FS boats with 250-hp Evinrude outboards and Power-Pole shallow-water anchoring systems.

A stickler for details, Cappelli credited their championship with a precise game plan and careful calibration of their Okuma line-counter reels. Trolling Bandit crankbaits on Blood Run monofilament line, the Cappelli-Williams team invested hours on land measuring and checking that their reels dispensed exactly the length of line they wished to deploy.

Their attention to detail paid off handsomely, as Cappelli and Williams boxed 107 pounds, 3 ounces of Lake Erie walleyes. No other team topped the century mark in the three-day tournament off Lorain out of the Black River.

They opened the competition with a five-fish limit at 41 pounds, 10 ounces, backed it up with 27-14 on day two, and finished strong with 37-11 in the final round.

"This was revenge for Lake Oahe," Cappelli said this week as he reflected on the satisfaction he and his teammate gained to soothe the sting they suffered when their South Dakota strategy blew up. "We would have easily won that year had we not had that weather change that made the lake unfishable and just kept the keepers we threw back."

Last weekend in Lorain, Cappelli and Williams fished close to the Black River, working 40 to 45 feet of water just 3 miles out. They made precision trolls over schools of walleyes they could trigger into striking by presenting their Bandits at the exact depth where they were feeding.

Fishing out of Cappelli's Mercury-powered Ranger 620, their haul included two walleyes in the 10-pound class and three more that bettered the 8-pound mark.

"The Blood Run mono really was huge for us," Cappelli said. "It is easy to manage and fishes precisely, so we knew that with a certain length of line out, we could be sure our lures would be exactly where we wanted them. Others tried to duplicate what we were doing, but their mono and line-counters just weren't synched as carefully as ours."

This year was Cappelli's 13th qualification for the Cabela's National Team Championship and turned out to be his lucky number. He and Williams are the first Ohio team to win the national title.

Cowbirds employ parasitic lifestyle

Every spring I get reports from astonished readers describing a small bird feeding a much larger, obviously begging chick. Readers ask if I can explain this.

The answer is "brood parasitism." Brown-headed cowbirds are members of the blackbird family, and they are brood parasites; they lay their eggs in the nests of other birds. It's an admirable reproductive strategy. Why build a nest, incubate the eggs, and raise young when other birds will do it for you?

Though cowbirds are known to parasitize the nests of more than 200 species of birds, song sparrows, chipping sparrows, red-eyed vireos and indigo buntings are among the most frequent victims.

Brown-headed cowbirds are common on farmland, forest edges and at feeders. Males have shiny black bodies with distinctly brown heads. Females are uniformly grayish brown.

Presumably, the cowbird's parasitic lifestyle

originated on western prairies where they lived in association with huge herds of bison that once roamed the Great Plains. Cowbirds ate insects kicked up by the bison as they grazed their way across the prairie. Bison, however, did not stay in one place long enough for cowbirds to build their own nests and raise broods, so cowbirds adopted the parasitic lifestyle.

This strategy enables cowbirds to avoid most of the work associated with reproduction. Building a nest, defending a territory, incubating eggs and feeding young are time-consuming and energy-demanding chores. Cowbirds avoid these responsibilities by parasitizing other birds' nests.

Beginning in April and continuing well into summer, female cowbirds invest hours each morning from treetop perches watching the comings and goings of other birds to locate their nests. After the unsuspecting potential host lays an

egg, the female cowbird slips in and lays an egg of her own.

Before laying the egg, she sometimes removes one of the host eggs. A female lays one egg per day for five or six days. After a few days rest, she repeats the process.

In the 1880s, cowbirds expanded their range eastward as settlers tamed and divvied up the vast eastern forests into small, fragmented family farms. The cowbird's common name acknowledges the obligatory relationship between the birds and grazing livestock. Today, cowbirds inhabit all but the most densely forested areas in the lower 48 states.

The female cowbird's reproductive strategy is ingenious. While most songbirds raise two broods of four or five chicks per nest,

a female cowbird can lay as many as 40 eggs over the course of the nesting season. By using foster parents, she is freed from the duties of incubation and brood rearing.

After the eggs are laid, cowbirds have a distinct advantage. Cowbird eggs are usually larger than host eggs, they hatch sooner than host eggs, and cowbird hatchlings are bigger and grow faster than host hatchlings. After hatching, the cowbirds outcompete host chicks for food and sometimes throw the host chicks out of the nest.

When parent birds bring food to the nest, they usually feed the chicks that beg most vigorously. Larger cowbird chicks reach higher and more vigorously than host chicks. This can lead to foster parents' own chicks starving. The net effect of brood parasitism is tantamount to predation.

And when cowbirds fledge, they are usually larger than the adult hosts that raised them. This ex-

plains why we sometimes see smaller adult birds feeding much larger chicks.

The instinct to incubate whatever eggs a nest contains is powerful, but some birds can recognize cowbird eggs. Catbirds and robins, for example, remove cowbird eggs from their nests. And yellow warblers sometimes abandon parasitized nests or build a new nest on top of the one that contains cowbird eggs. A classic photo in an ornithology textbook depicts a three-story yellow warbler nest that buried two layers of cowbird eggs.

Most people never notice cowbird parasitism until they see a small adult bird feeding a much larger fledgling. It's a scene that makes no sense without an understanding of cowbird biology.

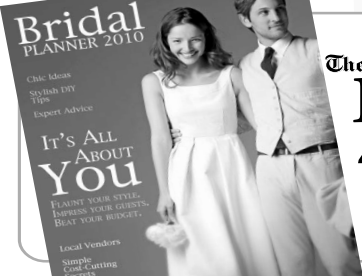

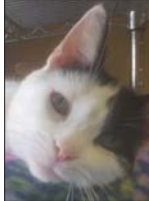

Shark bait

We're going to need a bigger cage.

The "Jaws" jokes write themselves with "47 Meters Down," a surprisingly effective shark-in-the-dark thriller that makes for frighteningly fun summer escapism. Horror director Johannes Roberts ("The Other Side of the Door") knows what the audience wants in a film like this — two sisters trapped in a dive cage surrounded by sharks — and gives it to them, straight no chaser.

Appropriately, he wastes little time on exposition. Lisa (Mandy Moore) and Kate (Claire Holt, "The Vampire Diaries") are two Americans on vacation on the Mexican coast. Uptight Lisa is trying to deal with a bad break-up, inspiring her younger sister Kate to take her out on the town to drown her romantic sorrows and stop sulking.

That's where they meet two good-natured, good-looking locals — Benjamin (Santiago Segura) and Louis (Yani Gellman) — who convince them that they need to dive with sharks to make their trip really memorable. These guys just happen to know a boat captain who, for a little cash, will take

them out to the right spot.

Lisa is reluctant, but Kate is totally up for hopping on a sketchy boat run by a scraggly expat American (Matthew Modine) — who looks like he's on the run from several U.S. governmental agencies — with two random dudes they just met while dancing and wearing beer goggles.

Guess they didn't see last summer's shark movie, "The Shallows," because before you can say "shark week," Lisa and Kate are in a cage underwater marveling at the beauty of all the fish. Just when Lisa is starting to think her fears are unjustified, a mechanical mishap sends the metal box plunging into the depths and the captain can't immediately reel them back in. That's when the oohing-and-

aahing quickly turns to panic and pleading.

Working from a script he wrote with Ernest Riera, Roberts keeps ramping up the tension and it mostly works, even when a plot device or two might seem to contradict common sense. Coming in at a breezy 89 minutes, the film doesn't allow much time to dwell on them anyway.

On top of that, "47 Meters Down" is a technical marvel. The first film to be shot at the 60,546-square-foot water tank at the Pinewood Dominican Republic Studios, it absolutely makes members of the audience feel like they're at the bottom of the ink-black ocean with Lisa and Kate. And the sharks look real and really hungry.

The movie lacks the emo-

tional resonance of that other stranded-in-the-ocean cinematic experience, "Open Water," from 2003. That was a film that lingered in the memory long after the lights went up, partly because it was based on a true story about a couple whose dive-boat left them to perish in the middle of the sea. And "47 Meters Down" is no "Jaws," but it doesn't aim for camp like the "Piranha" movies either, and feels less voyeuristic than "The Shallows."

None of that makes "47 Meters Down" any less entertaining and unsettling in a popcorn-thriller way. Like the old ad for "Jaws 2" said, "Just when you thought it was safe to go back in the water."

KATY PERRY

- ◆ **Album:** "Witness"
- ◆ **Grade:** C

She once roared. But now, we'll just call it meowing.

Katy Perry, one of the top voices in contemporary pop over the last decade, limps into her fourth album with a collection of songs that don't have a cohesive feel or message. It's a random hodgepodge of tracks that don't spark or shine; some of the tunes are cute, but most are forgettable.

"Witness" doesn't offer a fresh, or refreshed, Perry — the only thing new about her is that haircut. Vocally, she doesn't sound inspired or inspiring. And while "Witness" isn't expected to be the year's best album, what was expected was some fun, killer pop hits.

Lead single, "Chained to the Rhythm," is watered-down reggae pop without any real reggae flavor, and current single, the Nicki Minaj-assisted "Swish Swish," is a miss-miss.

"Witness" is Perry's first album without mega-producer

Dr. Luke, who is at war with pop singer Kesha over sexual abuse claims (he denies her allegations). Max Martin, Dr. Luke's former mentor, is still present though, along with big names such as Sia, Jeff Bhasker and DJ Mustard.

But none of them come to Perry's rescue. The beginning of "Hey Hey Hey" sounds like "Dark Horse," Perry's last No. 1 hit, and the hook echoes Avril Lavigne. "Bigger Than Me" comes off like a leftover track from her 2013 album, "Prism." And the title track is a bore.

Perry finds the right momentum on the dreamy "Tsunami," produced by Mike Will-Made It; "Bon Appetit," chosen as the official second single for mere minutes, is upbeat and catchy; and "Power," with little lyrics, is a shining effort thanks to multi-instrumentalist Jack Garratt's layered, experimental sound. But overall, "Witness" falls short.

CHEAP TRICK

Cheap Trick is way better than all right on "We're All Alright!" — which may be their best in 35 years.

With the album title taken from the ending chant on their signature song "Surrender," Cheap Trick makes a bold declaration that joyful, unrestrained, in-your-face (and burned into your brain) rock 'n' roll is alive and well.

Even this band's rejects are better than most bands' A-material: The best track on the album, "Radio Lover," sat atop a discarded demo pile for 20 years before surfacing here. It's one of four up-tempo rockers in a row that kick off the album, including the scale-climbing "Nowhere," and the first single "Long Time Coming," which pays homage to their musical roots with a Who-like riff similar to "Can't Explain."

A bonus track that deserves to be on every copy of the album is a cover of The Move's "Blackberry Way," which sounds like what would result if The Beatles' "Penny Lane" and The Monkees' "Daydream Believer" had a baby.

Following "Southeastern" and "Something More Than Free," two masterworks that have grown in stature since their release in 2013 and 2015, "The Nashville Sound" doesn't always rise to Isbell's standards. An angry song called "White Man's World," for example — likely Isbell's take on post-2016 election America — lacks his usual flair for nuanced, show-don't-tell lyrics.

But the album has its moments.

The opener, "Last of My Kind," is an evocative reflection on losing touch with the past. A wistful love song called "If We Were Vampires" rivals Isbell's best work. So does the emphatic, optimistic anthem, "Hope the High Road," the album's first single.

The 400 Unit is in fine form throughout, rocking when Isbell snarls and hanging back in songs that demand restraint.

So even if the album is not as consistently transcendent as the last two, that's a high bar — and nothing here will harm Isbell's soaring reputation.

Hot dog! Eye-catching LA wiener stand finds museum home

LOS ANGELES

An eye-catching Los Angeles hot dog stand designed in the 1940s to look like a giant wiener on a bun has found a home a decade after closing.

The Tail o' the Pup, which fed working people and Hollywood stars for 60 years, was moved this week for permanent display at Valley Relics Museum, home to many pop-culture items. The unique structure, which appeared in TV shows and movies

and was named a Los Angeles cultural landmark, has been in a storage yard since its walk-up window shut for the final time in 2005.

Nicole Miller, whose husband Jay's family has owned the Pup since the 1970s, said they'd hoped to find a new location to serve its famous all-beef franks once again, but couldn't secure permits. The family is glad the museum "is willing to take it, restore it and put it on display," she told the Los Angeles Daily News.

The chicken-wire and stucco dog measured 18 feet from nose to tail with a line of mustard running across its service window.

Designed by architect Milton Black

and opened in 1946, the Tail o' the Pup was built to catch the attention of passing motorists during an era when cars were king.

It's a rare surviving example of when giant doughnuts, chili bowls and coffee cups dotted Los Angeles curbs from the 1920s to after World War II, the newspaper said.

"The Tail o' the Pup was clearly among the best known of the 'programmatic' buildings – buildings that often looked like products sold inside," said Cindy Olnick of the Los Angeles Conservancy, a preservation group. "The whole building, besides the sign, was an advertisement."

No 'Dice'? Not quite: Showtime series will return

Q. Has Showtime renewed "Dice" for a second season? — Pete Garofalo, East Stroudsburg, Pa.

A. It has, and it will begin running on Aug. 20. The semi-autobiographical comedy starring Andrew Dice Clay has a seven-episode order for its sophomore round, with Ron Livingston ("Office Space") slated to join the show in a recurring role as an entertainment lawyer who ends up needing Dice's help as much as vice versa. Season 2 also will see guest turns by "Saturday Night Live" alum Laraine Newman, Billy Gardell ("Mike & Molly") and pop-music icon Tony Orlando.

Q. Is "Chicago Justice" really over already? It seems like it just started. — Dan Evans, via e-mail

A. Yes, the most recent addition to NBC's slate of Windy City dramas from executive producer Dick Wolf ended almost as soon as it began. Though it had gotten a pretty big build-up, with its characters woven into the other "Chicago" shows earlier — and its first official episode linked to a story that began on "Chicago Fire" and "Chicago P.D." — the network opted not to renew the drama that starred Philip Winchester and Carl Weathers. The roles they played will live on, though, as those episodes of the other "Chicago" series in which they appeared are repeated.

Q. We recently discovered "Longmire" and binge-watched all of its seasons. I read that there will be one last season. Do you know when it will air? — Diane Brown, Twin Falls, Idaho

A. Production on the last 10 episodes that will comprise the modern Western's sixth and final season began in March in New Mexico. Netflix has said they will debut sometime this year, and since all of them will be made available simultaneously for streaming, we'd anticipate that will happen close to the end of the year, since all 10 stories have to be ready at once.

Robert Taylor will close out his run as the title lawman, with Katee Sackhoff, Lou Diamond Phillips and Cassidy Freeman among other returnees. Warner Bros. Home Entertainment is sure to follow the tradition it's had with "Longmire" by releasing that last season on home

video sometime after it has run on Netflix for a while.

Q. Does Jim Parsons have any involvement in the upcoming "Big Bang Theory" spinoff "Young Sheldon"? — Mike Sloan, Bryan, Ohio

A. Very much so, and in a couple of ways. Multiple Emmy winner Parsons will be heard in voiceovers as the present-day Sheldon, commenting on his younger life that the new CBS comedy will depict — and he's also one of the executive producers of the show, which is scheduled to help launch the fall television season with a "pre-view" premiere on Sept. 25.

Q. Why was Emma Thompson not included in the reunion of "Love Actually" actors shown in the Red Nose Day special? — Carol Jason, via e-mail

A. Writer-director Richard Curtis — who made the original movie plus its brief sequel, and who also is the main driving force behind the Red Nose Day effort — told us that Thompson's absence was related directly to the absence of the late Alan Rickman, who played Thompson's husband in the 2003 film and was a close friend of hers.

Curtis said it would have been "too hard" in multiple ways to factor in Thompson's character, given the personal emotions involved and the fictional explanation that would have been needed for Rickman not being in the follow-up, given that there was only a short time to accommodate the many returnees and their "Actually" alter egos.

Q. With so many of the original actors back in the new "Twin Peaks," why isn't Michael Ontkean among them? — Jennifer Ford, Port St. Lucie, Fla.

A. The actor who played Sheriff Harry S. Truman in the first incarnation of David Lynch's mystery-drama retired from acting after his role in the 2011 George Clooney movie "The Descendants," and he evidently couldn't be persuaded to change his mind for the Showtime revival. Robert Forster's Sheriff Frank Truman, who is Harry's brother, clearly is intended to fill that character slot in the current version.

An ongoing wildfire keeps 'The Night Shift' active as Season 4 begins

Viewers haven't missed much in the lives of those who work "The Night Shift."

The NBC medical drama's fourth season begins Thursday, June 22 — and while it's been almost 10 months in real time, the new stories resume only 48 hours from last summer's end point. The wildfire that kept the San Antonio doctors busy still rages, with Jordan and Drew (Jill Flint, Brendan Fehr) surrounded by flames. A flame of a different kind is in another sort of trouble, since Jordan's sometimes-beau TC (Eoin Macken, who also directs an upcoming episode) is a captive at the Syria/Turkey border. And back at the Texas hospital, which has a new owner, Scott (Scott Wolf) is among the staffers dealing with incoming fire victims as an enigmatic newcomer (recurring guest star Mark Consuelos) joins the staff.

"We had a couple of lives in peril, nobody really knew what was happening with the condition of the hospital, so ... welcome back!," Flint muses. "It's like, who's going to have a job? Is TC dead? What's going to happen to Syd (Jennifer Beals' character, who was with TC)? For the actors, it's good to rehash the last script or watch the episode again, just to have reminders of small moments."

"The other things are kind of funny," Flint adds of picking up right where things left off. "You just hope nobody cut their hair, or slimmed down by 10 lbs. Over 48 hours, you would have had a pretty big diet. And my first episode back, they were like, 'So, how would you feel about rappelling from 40 feet up?' I thought, 'Well, considering my fear of heights, this is going to be interesting.' But I totally did it! I'm very proud of

myself. Now I'm like, 'Hey, guys! What else can Jordan do?'"

Wolf's "Night Shift" alter ego may revisit an old romance with Jordan, but he has other things on his mind, too. "Scott has gone through this incredibly difficult time," the "Party of Five" veteran says. "He's been revisited by a boy that he paralyzed by mistake, and that unearthed a bunch of

very difficult things for him. He's as vulnerable as he gets, and Jordan goes through so many things herself, they rediscover each other and almost see each other for the first time again.

"There's this sense of, did they really give themselves and each other a full chance?" Wolf notes. "Once they were there with TC, everything got murky and com-

plicated, so Scott and Jordan are still in this territory of wondering who they are supposed to be to each other. It's starting to interfere with their work in this profession that means so much to both of them, so we find Scott trying to reconnect with this person he used to be, someone who was in complete control of his world."

The filming schedule for "The Night Shift" permits its stars to

take other jobs during the traditional television season, as "Royal Pains" alum Flint did recently with a recurring guest role on CBS' "Bull." She says, "I did three episodes, and I had a really great time doing them. Everybody in that cast is wonderful — and I was paired up with (former 'Night Shift' co-star) Freddy (Rodriguez) again. It's been a hole in our hearts, missing Freddy."
