3 arrested after raid of Boardman nuisance home

2 men, woman face host of charges including heroin possession

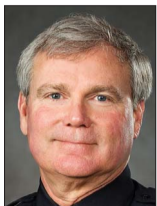
For months, neighbors suspected the house at 120 Wildwood Drive was a haven for drug activity.

Police had made arrests there twice since March.

Then a raid Friday by the township police department's narcotics enforcement unit led to three people being led from the house

in handcuffs. Now Police Chief Jack Nichols said Friday that his department will work with the Mahoning County Prosecutor's Office to have the Wildwood residence declared a nuisance.

Neighbors, who did not want to be identified, said they often

saw vehicles coming and going from the residence, staying at the house for approximately five to 10 minutes. They see the same vehicles coming back every few days.

"We don't want our neighborhood to become that type of environment," said one neighbor.

It's those kinds of complaints that usually are the starting point

Woman shot dead while in parked vehicle

YOUNGSTOWN

Police are trying to put together the events that led to the shooting death of a 24-year-old woman.

Officers answering a gunfire call Friday afternoon on a West Side street found a woman dead inside a sport utility vehicle.

Police say the woman's death is a homicide, the ninth of the year in Youngstown. She is identified as Rae'venna Faircloth-Thomas of Youngstown.

Officers were called about 12:30 p.m. to the first block of Oneta Street for a report that someone in a car was firing shots at an SUV that was parked on the street. When officers arrived, the car was gone, but they discovered the woman shot to death in the driver's seat of the SUV.

Several neighbors who did not want to give their names said they heard the shots and they had not seen the SUV on their street before.

About 3:30 p.m., officers converged on a vacant home on Millet Avenue, also on the West Side, where they found the car that is suspected of being involved in the homicide. Detectives searched the car and took a person to the detective bureau for questioning.

Just after officers arrived at the crime scene on Oneta, it began raining. Detective Sgt. Ron Rodway said the

YSU students teach Boardman campers archaeology basics

"I FOUND SOMETHING!" one boy called out excitedly.

He and other participants in Boardman Park's Adventure Day Camp were digging for artifacts in the park's sand volleyball court Friday. Campers eagerly uncovered seashells and brightly colored gemstones.

The activity was organized and led by a group from Youngstown State University's department of sociology and anthropology. Several YSU

students, led by instructor/archaeologist Tom Delvaux, volunteered at the camp four days this week, culminating in Friday's dig. This marked the fourth year the YSU archaeology group visited campers.

The aim, Delvaux said, is that kids "get a taste for what archaeology is. It's a science. It's not Indiana Jones."

Archaeological skills "apply to a lot of different things," said Delvaux. "Methodology. Patience."

Earlier this week, campers learned archaeology basics and got to see artifacts that

Despite local case, voter fraud remains uncommon

YOUNGSTOWN

Although the indictment of an Austintown man on two counts of illegal voting suggests that voter fraud does occur, data from the Ohio Secretary of State's office undermine claims of widespread fraud.

Konstantinos Mouzos, 69, of Compass West Drive, was indicted Thursday after being accused of voting in the March 15 primary and the Nov. 6 general election last year despite not being an American citizen. Despite the indictment, the Mahoning County Board of Elections only has a record of him voting in the general election.

Illegal voting is a fifth-degree felony that can result in six to 12 months in prison.

More than 117,000 of Mahoning County's more than 166,000 registered voters cast ballots in the 2016 election. Three raised concerns with the office of Secretary of State Jon Husted.

Patriot Water identified as source of odors on Warren's north side

WARREN

Patriot Water Treatment, which began operating a commercial wastewater treatment plant on Sferra Drive in 2011, was identified as the source of terrible odors experienced by residents and businesses throughout the north side of the city in recent weeks.

Ed Haller, director of the city's water pollution control department, said perhaps

it's for the best that the odor problem occurred when it did.

His department has been waging a battle with the company for a year over

chemical compounds Patriot has been sending into the sewers, Haller said.

"We can't continue to allow them to do just anything they want that could be detrimental to greater Warren," Haller said.

Patriot, located on the north end of town, treats wastewater it receives from customers. At the end of the process, the water goes into the sewers and travels to the

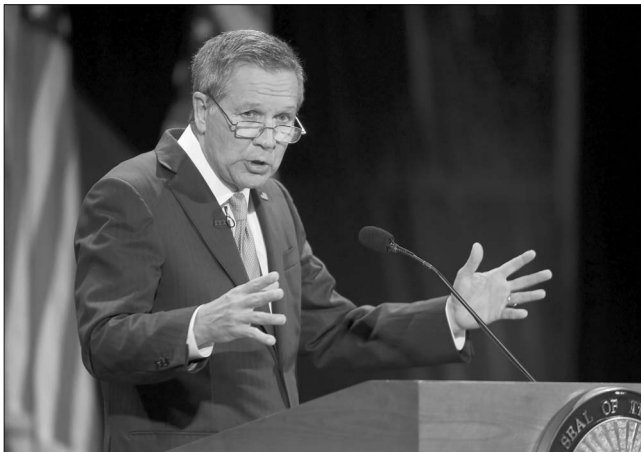

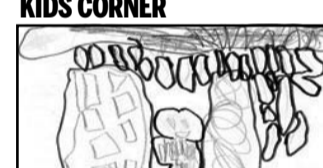

Governors in several states that opted to expand Medicaid under former President Barack Obama's health care law are wary of the Senate Republican plan to end the added federal funding for it within seven years.
The proposal released Thursday calls for a slower phase-out of the Medicaid expansion than a bill adopted earlier by the House. Yet it still would force those states to figure out what to do about the millions of lower-income Americans who used it to gain health coverage.

The doubts about the latest plan from Washington came from Republicans, Democrats and the nation's one independent governor.
"I have deep concerns with details in the U.S. Senate's plan to fix America's health care system and the resources needed to help our most vulnerable, including those who are dealing with drug addiction, mental illness and chronic health problems and have nowhere else to turn," Ohio Gov. John Kasich, a Republican, said in a Twitter message.

Kasich was part of a group of Republican and Democratic governors who wrote a letter last week to Senate leaders calling for them to work in a bipartisan way to revamp the nation's complex health-insurance policies.
Another was Nevada Gov. Brian Sandoval, also a Republican. His decision to expand Medicaid has provided health coverage to more than 210,000 Nevada residents.

"It appears that the proposed bill will dramatically reduce coverage and will negatively impact our future state budgets," he said in an emailed statement.

Part of the Obama law was an offer to the states: If they would expand

rising there and elsewhere even with the federal government paying for most of the expansion, largely because more people signed up than originally expected.
"We anticipate it will be hundreds of thousands of Oregonians that will be stripped of health care under this proposal in order to get a tax break for wealthy Americans," said Oregon Gov. Kate Brown, a Democrat.

That was a reference to other provisions of the Republican plan that would cut taxes by nearly \$1 trillion over the next decade, mostly for corporations and America's wealthiest families.

In Montana, 20 percent of residents didn't have medical insurance in 2013. By last year, that was down to 7 percent. Gov. Steve Bullock, a Democrat, attributes the higher coverage rates to the Medicaid expansion and said the Senate bill would undo that.

Charlie Baker, the Republican governor in heavily Democratic Massachusetts, and Tom Wolf, a Democratic governor in Pennsylvania, had similar concerns. Governors also said the bill could hurt rural hospitals and senior citizens who have nursing-home care covered by Medicaid.

Former Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer, a Republican who surprised her party when she decided to expand Medicaid four years ago, is urging Congress to save the expansion, which has provided coverage to 400,000 Arizonans.

Trying to keep the expansion without added federal help could blow a hole in state budgets.
In Oregon, lawmakers this week passed a health care tax intended to fix a \$1.4 billion, two-year budget deficit attributed largely to Medicaid expansion costs. Those costs are

The last two of the show's eight episodes will air Tuesday, executive producer Jimmy Miller said Friday.

ABC "loved it creatively and wanted to do more, but could not figure out a way to get it done finan-

cially," Miller said in a statement.

The network didn't immediately respond to a request to comment.

Miller thanked critics and viewers who have expressed their support for the comedy, and said he hoped it would land on its feet elsewhere.

"Clearly this show has hit a nerve, and we are hell bent on finding a new home for our 'Downward Dog,'" he said.

The series stars Allison Tolman as the owner of Martin the dog, who talks directly to viewers about his feelings. The series

centers on his sometimes conflicted feelings about his owner, loneliness and hatred of a neighborhood cat.

Series co-creator Samm Hodges is the voice of Martin.

Tolman was nominated for an Emmy Award in 2015 for her role on the FX series "Fargo."

"Downward Dog" was filmed in Pittsburgh.

Child-sex sentence

The former principal of a Poland Township church school is going to prison for having sex with a 14-year-old girl.

Judge Anthony D'Apolito of Mahoning County Common Pleas Court on Friday sentenced Christopher Stivers to seven years in prison, according to 21 WFMJ-TV, The Vindicator's broadcast partner.

The sentence is longer than the six years recommended by prosecutors when the 32-year-old Struthers man pleaded guilty to two counts of sexual battery last month.

The indictment said the sexual contact took place between early October and late November, just days after the girl turned 14.

According to police, the activity took place at the Gospel Baptist School on Clingan Road, where Stivers served as principal.

After serving his prison time, Stivers will be required to register as a tier-three sex offender.

Defense: Suppress comments made to detective

WARREN

The attorney for Arthur Harper says comments he made to a detective not long after his common-law wife's son died of severe head trauma should be suppressed from evidence.

An assistant prosecutor, meanwhile, says Harper's admission that he used a wrestling move called a "pile driver" on the 3-year-old should be admissible at trial.

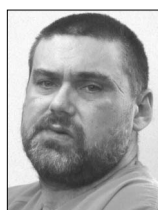
Attorneys for Harper and the prosecution filed arguments with Judge Peter Kontos of Trumbull County Common Pleas Court recently as to why the evidence heard at an April

21 suppression hearing supports their positions.

Harper, 44, of High Street Northeast, is charged with murder, felonious assault and child endangering in the Nov. 28, 2015, death of Russell Cottrill. He is scheduled to go on trial Aug. 28.

But John Juhasz, who represents Harper, says the comments Harper made about wrestling with the boy were coerced by Detective Nick Carney of the Warren Police Department and were not the "expression of free choice."

Based on what Carney said at the

suppression hearing, Harper never waived his rights, only indicated he understood them, Juhasz said.

Furthermore, the statements also were involuntary because of the tactics Carney used to get Harper to change his story from saying the boy hurt himself in his bedroom to talking about the wrestling move, Juhasz said.

In assistant Prosecutor Diane Barber's filing, she says before Carney interviewed Harper at the hospital where Russell was being treated, Carney discovered that Harper had been convicted of three prior domestic-violence charges, one of which resulted in a prison sentence.

In an interview at the police station, Harper said the "pile driver"

move that injured Russell involved holding Russell upside down with Russell's head between Harper's legs. Harper "would then fall back, slamming onto the floor. Russell's head hit the floor and he stopped breathing," the filing says.

Harper also demonstrated in a one-minute video the "pile driver" move to Carney using a baby doll, Barber said.

As for coercion by Carney, Barber said there is no evidence that Carney "subjected [Harper] to threats or physical abuse or deprived him of food, sleep or medical treatment."

Judge Kontos has not ruled on the request to suppress Harper's statements.

Robert Jones, 63, of Olivette Court, was arraigned before Magistrate Anthony Sertick on charges of felonious assault, being a felon in possession of a firearm and carrying a concealed weapon after he was arrested about 2:45 p.m. in the 600 block of Lakewood Avenue on the South Side.

Police were called to the

street for a report of a man arguing with two men and holding a gun to the head of one of them who was on the ground after firing several shots. Detective Sgt. Ed Kenney was the first to arrive on the scene and ordered all three men on the ground at gunpoint.

One of the men told Kenney that Jones had a gun, and when other officers arrived, they searched Jones

for police, Nichols said.

"It begins with neighbor complaints about frequent traffic in and out for short periods of time, at all times of day or night," he said.

Those tips initiate investigations. The next steps likely include surveillance of the house, checks of the license plates on vehicles that go to the location and traffic stops that can lead police to drugs and drug users who can offer information.

"It takes a lot of time," said Nichols.

Another Wildwood neighbor said it was especially concerning because her house resembles 120 Wildwood, and suspicious vehicles often would pull into her driveway before pulling out and going to the other house.

"I am fearful for my life, because they all think it's his house," she said, referring to Michael J. Forgach, 41, who was among those arrested. Mahoning County auditor records show that the house is owned by John and Theodora Forgach, who records indicate live and own property in North Carolina.

Michael Forgach, along with Syrena Whitfield, 25, and Dawond Roddy, 31, all of whom reportedly live at the Wildwood address, were arrested on charges of heroin possession, possession of drug-abuse instruments, possession of drug paraphernalia and permitting drug abuse, according to police.

Court records indicate

that township police on Friday also filed a charge of inducing panic against Whitfield. A report on the incident leading to that charge, which occurred in April, was not immediately available.

Police sometimes charge drug-overdose victims with inducing panic. Neighbors said someone had recently overdosed at the Wildwood house.

After Friday's raid, police reported finding drug paraphernalia and suspected heroin in the house.

The house was the site of two other raids earlier this year.

On March 8, police found a stash of drug-related items while serving a search war-

rant, including numerous crack pipes and hypodermic needles. That search reportedly turned up: small bags containing suspected marijuana; numerous crack pipes; hypodermic needles; a spoon with suspected drug residue on it; a small amount of cash; a digital scale; five 9 mm rounds of ammunition, and other drug-related items. Forgach was arrested on charges of possession of drug paraphernalia and possession of drug-abuse instruments. Court records list those charges as dismissed.

On April 12, Forgach again was arrested at the home on charges of permitting drug abuse, possession of

drug-abuse instruments, possession of drug paraphernalia and two counts of drug possession. A search at that time turned up crack pipes, a digital scale, \$115 in cash, plastic bags, hypodermic needles and other drug-related items, police said. Police also found substances that tested positive for cocaine and heroin.

Court records indicate that the case based on the April incident was bound over for a grand jury to review.

Forgach was indicted Thursday by a Mahoning County grand jury on charges of possession of heroin, possession of cocaine and permitting drug abuse.

The secretary of state's office conducts an annual review of the state's voter registration database to identify noncitizens who are registered to vote. This is done by comparing the database with information provided by the Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

Registered voters who are identified have 60 days to either cancel their voter registration or provide documentation showing they are citizens.

Tom McCabe, deputy director of the Mahoning County Board of Elections, told *The Vindicator* that local boards are not able to determine citizenship and anyone with a valid driver's license can register.

Mouzos had an expired green card, officials in the county prosecutor's office said.

A green card grants an individual legal permanent residency but not citizenship, which is required to vote.

Green-card holders can lose their lawful permanent residency for committing certain crimes. In most cases, unlawful voting is considered a deportable offense under federal law.

This year, the secretary of state identified 426 noncitizens who were registered to vote, 82 of whom appear to have voted.

There were 5.6 million ballots cast in Ohio during the 2016 general election, and 202 voters have been referred to law enforcement by the secretary of state.

If all those cases resulted in convictions, that would mean three out of every 100,000 Ohioans who voted committed an infraction.

"It is rare," said a spokeswoman for Husted. "But when it happens, we keep people accountable."

President Donald Trump has alleged that several million noncitizens voted illegally in the 2016 general election. In May, he signed an executive order creating a commission to examine voter fraud at the national level.

Chairman Mark Munroe said Trump's commission is long overdue.

He praised Husted for addressing the problem in Ohio, but he said there is not an efficient mechanism to prove citizenship.

Munroe added that while detection of voter fraud is rare, without complete lists of noncitizens, it can be difficult to keep them from voting.

"We do not have a good system in place to prevent them from voting, other than relying on their honesty to do the right thing and not vote," Munroe said.

The secretary of state's office said they compare voter rolls with BMV data because the BMV requires applicants to provide documents showing they are citizens or otherwise here legally.

However, Munroe said that even if voter fraud is rare, it's worth pursuing.

"Many elections are won or lost by very small margins," he said. "If even a small number of noncitizens are voting in our elections, outcomes can be affected."

Mahoning County Democratic Chairman David Betras said people who break the law should be prosecuted, but Republicans shouldn't use voter fraud as an excuse to engage in voter suppression.

He agreed with Ohio's Republican secretary of state.

"As Secretary of State Husted says, fraud is rare," Betras said. "I believe him, the facts back him up, and that should be the end of the discussion."

rain made processing the SUV more difficult because evidence such as gunshot residue or DNA evidence on the victim had to be kept dry.

Officers borrowed a tarp from a neighbor, and patrol

officers and even supervisors also used their umbrellas to shield crime-scene personnel and coroner's workers who examined the SUV.

Detective Sgt. D.P. Scott, head of the crime lab, was soaked as he worked in the rain taking several photos of the SUV and the surrounding area.

When the body of Faircloth-Thomas was removed from the SUV, a Pittsburgh Steelers Hines Ward jersey could be seen on the victim.

Rodway said Oneta is a quiet street, particularly the stretch where the victim was found, between Frank Sinkwich Drive and Salt Springs Road. He said one of the keys for investigators

is finding out why she was there in the first place.

Rodway would not say how officers were able to find the suspected car on Millet, but he credited Community Police Unit officer George Wallace for helping to track it down.

In 2016, Youngstown had 18 homicides – eight at this time last year.

wastewater treatment plant on the south end of town for treatment with other wastewater. Eventually, the water flows into the Mahoning River.

Patriot began as a treatment facility for wastewater produced by the gas and oil industry, an alternative to injection wells.

Receiving fracking wastewater has challenges of its own, such as treating barium and salt, Haller said.

But Patriot also has permission to accept wastewater from other sources besides the gas and oil industry. Last year, the city experienced problems with Patriot's discharging high levels of zinc from wastewater, Haller said.

Then in May, Water Pollution Control started noticing the presence of dimethyl disulfide in the water, Haller said.

According to the Reactor Resources website, dimethyl disulfide is used in the sulfiding process, which removes

sulfur and nitrogen from motor fuels. It's also used as a pesticide and a food additive in cheese, meats, soups, savory flavors and fruit flavors, according to the www.chemicalbook.com website.

Its odor has been described as pungent garlic, propane, decaying fish, or decomposing materials, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Andy Blockson, president of Patriot Water, said the key for him is that dimethyl disulfide is not regulated by the EPA, so his company is not required to test for it. As a result, he would not know whether the chemical is in any of the loads of waste his company received. "It's not a pollutant of concern," he said.

If Patriot discharged the compound, "we wouldn't know because we don't test for it," he said.

Haller said testing indicated that Patriot did discharge the chemical, and Blockson agrees that is true. But he also believes it has come from other sources because "it's everywhere."

Haller said one of the reasons the chemical went into Warren's treatment system is because Patriot was accepting wastewater from a Dayton-area landfill.

Blockson said it might have come from that customer, but it's an unregulated compound, so it might have come from multiple customers. "It's not illegal to be in the waste stream," he said.

When the public started complaining about smells, Water Pollution Control investigated its industrial facilities.

The problem appeared to be focused in the Warren Industrial Park where Patriot is located because other industries in the park reported the smell, Haller said.

All of those and other industries tested showed very low or nondetectable amounts of the chemical, Haller said.

On June 9, the city had its highest reading so far for the chemical, Haller said.

Throughout last week, the Ohio EPA conducted meetings in Warren that included the Mahoning Trumbull Air Pollution Control Agency,

Warren Water Pollution Control, Patriot and Ohio Department of Health, Haller said.

Sometime late last week, Patriot shut down its discharge of water into the city's sewers in the presence of Water Pollution Control officials except for wastewater from toilets and sinks. "Since they shut down, it's been perfect," Haller said of readings of dimethyl disulfide.

Blockson said Patriot has shut off any discharges into the sewer system and is not receiving any liquid wastes until the chemical is completely gone from Patriot Water.

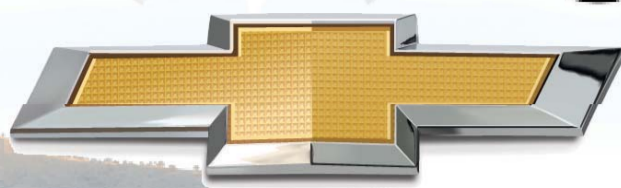
"Are we doing what we can to eliminate that smell? Yes. Are we going to fix it? Absolutely," Blockson said.

The Mahoning Trumbull Air Pollution Control Agency issued the city a notice of

violation last week for odors emitted by the city sewer system for the first three months of the year. Patriot told Warren Water Pollution Control in the presence of the Ohio EPA that it would provide data on all of the customers and loads it received since December, Haller said.

Blockson agreed, saying it will do this even though it's not required by law.

Israeli doctor discusses helping Syrian patients

Arie Eisenman wanted to be a doctor for as long as he could remember, never considering any other profession in his life.

As a man so dedicated to providing health care to those in need, he's glad he works in a place serving the kind of people who need it more than most: Syrians.

Dr. Eisenman sat in with Louie Free's Vindy Radio Talk Show on Friday morning as a part of his visit to the Youngstown area and talked about the work he and his emergency department staff have done at the Galilee Medical Center helping Syrian victims.

Dr. Eisenman is on a tour as a part of the Partnership 2gether Summit – an inter-

national program that pairs cities and communities in the U.S. and Europe with one in Israel.

The GMC has roughly 800 beds and a staff of 2,600 employees serving an annual number of 60,000 Jewish and non-Jewish people in the city of Nahariya. The GMC is 6 miles from the Lebanese border, the closest hospital to any border in Israel, to make it easier for those in need to reach them.

The emergency room, which Dr. Eisenman oversees, gets about 120,000 visits annually, compared with the average American ER, which has 20,000 visits annually.

"It's really a unique sample of ... people working together in harmony for many years now," he said.

The fact that Syrians are

means making a pact with the devil. It's something unheard of," he said.

Many of his patients come in as victims of the Syrian war, suffering from ballistic injuries – sometimes infected – from high-velocity weaponry such as rifles. For confidentiality, the center doesn't ask for identification – they assign nicknames and numbers to keep track of them, Dr. Eisenman said.

The center has most likely provided care for refugees and even ISIS soldiers. The

GMC takes a humanitarian health care approach, referring to their slogan: "Person-to-person medicine."

"That means you don't really care, and you don't look inside in order to know who you are taking care of," he said.

Since the beginning of the Syrian civil war in 2011, many victims have suffered from injuries from the warfare, including women, children and infants. The GMC began two years after the conflict broke out as a humanitarian health care effort for Syria.

Though he can't say for certain what his patients say about GMC after they leave, Dr. Eisenman hopes they spread the word everyone is welcome to his center.

At one point, Hammond's shoes fell off as he threw the rifle and a handgun he was carrying before falling on his face. He struggled with police before he was handcuffed by officers Michael Medvec and Detective Sgt. Josh Kelly.

Hammond also had a bag of suspected marijuana when he was searched, reports said.

Reports said Hammond complained he was not feeling well because he has asthma. An ambulance was called and he was examined at St. Elizabeth Youngstown Hospital before being taken to the jail.

This is not the first time Hammond has been charged with having an assault weapon and running from police. In August 2005, while on probation for

a burglary charge, he faced similar charges after police spotted him in a stolen car in the 2200 block of Selma Avenue near the scene of a recent drive-by shooting.

Reports said Hammond and another person in the car ran from police and Hammond tried to tackle an officer before he was caught. Inside the car police found a 9 mm assault rifle, several rounds of 9 mm ammunition and a .12-gauge shotgun.

In that case, Hammond was found guilty on weapons and receiving stolen property charges and sentenced to four years in prison.

In 2013, he received another four-year prison sentence on aggravated robbery, aggravated burglary and kidnapping charges from 2011 and also got a year in prison on a burglary charge.

In 2016, Hammond received two years' probation after pleading guilty to a charge of drug possession.

Senators ask military to review report on Yemen torture

WASHINGTON

Two senior U.S. senators are asking Defense Secretary Jim Mattis to investigate reports that U.S. military interrogators worked with forces from the United Arab Emirates accused of torturing detainees in Yemen.

Sen. John McCain, the Republican chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, and the ranking Democrat, Jack Reed, called the reports "deeply disturbing."

The reports were revealed in an investigation by The Associated Press published Thursday.

London council evacuates residents amid safety concerns

LONDON

A local London council has decided to evacuate some 800 households in apartment buildings it owns because of safety concerns following the devastating fire that killed 79 people in a west London high-rise.

The move comes amid escalating concerns among residents of thousands of tower blocks around Britain. The Camden Council is the first to take such a dramatic step in light of June 14 fire at Grenfell Tower.

Council leader Georgia Gould says the borough made the decision to empty the buildings after the London Fire Brigade and council experts had conducted a joint inspection of the properties.

Qatar weighs demands to end regional crisis

DUBAI, UNITED ARAB EMIRATES

With just days to decide, Qatar on Friday weighed an onerous list of demands by its neighbors as a way out of a regional crisis, and a top Emirati official warned the tiny country to brace for a long-term economic squeeze unless it is willing to acquiesce.

Qatar did not immediately respond after receiving a clear set of demands for the first time, but the ultimatum was quickly rejected by its ally, Turkey, and blasted as an assault on free speech by Al-Jazeera, the Qatari broadcaster that Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates and others are demanding to be shut down.

Qatar's neighbors insisted the 13-point list of demands was their bottom line, not a starting point for negotiations. The Arab countries signaled that if Qatar refuses to comply by the 10-day deadline, they will continue to restrict its access to land, sea and air routes indefinitely amid mounting economic pressure on the Persian Gulf nation.

Law to make VA more accountable for vets' care

WASHINGTON

President Donald Trump signed a bill into law Friday that will make it easier for the Department of Veterans Affairs to fire employees, part of a push to overhaul an agency that is struggling to serve millions of military vets.

"Our veterans have fulfilled their duty to our nation and now we must fulfill our duty to them," Trump said during a White House ceremony. "To every veteran who is here with us today, I just want to say two very simple words: Thank you."

Trump repeatedly promised during the election campaign to dismiss VA workers "who let our veterans down," and he cast Friday's bill signing as fulfillment of that promise.

The measure was prompted by a 2014 scandal at the Phoenix VA medical center, where some veterans died as they waited months for care. The VA is the second-largest department in the U.S. government, with more than 350,000 employees.

5 GOP senators now oppose health bill – enough to sink it

WASHINGTON

Nevada Republican Dean Heller became the fifth GOP senator to declare his opposition to the party's banner legislation to scuttle much of Barack Obama's health care overhaul Friday, more than enough to sink the measure and deliver a stinging rebuke to President Donald Trump unless some of them can be brought aboard.

Echoing the other four, Heller said he opposes the measure "in this form" but does not rule out backing a version that is changed to

his liking. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., has said he's willing to alter the measure to attract support and next week promises plenty of back-room bargaining as he tries pushing a final package through his chamber.

Nonetheless, Heller's announcement underscores the scant margin of error Republican leaders must deal with. Facing unanimous Democratic opposition, McConnell can afford to lose just two of the 52 GOP senators and still prevail.

Besides the five who've announced outright opposition, several other GOP senators – conservatives and moderates – have declined to commit to the new overhaul.

The measure resembles legislation the House approved last month that the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office said would mean 23 million additional uninsured people within a decade and that recent polling shows is viewed favorably by only about 1 in 4 Americans.

Heller, facing a competi-

tive re-election battle next year, said he was opposing the legislation because of the cuts it would make in Medicaid. The federal-state program provides health care to the poor, disabled and many nursing-home patients.

The Senate bill would also erase the tax penalties Obama's 2010 law imposes on people who don't purchase insurance. It would allow insurers to cover fewer benefits and repeal tax boosts on wealthier people that help finance the statute's expanded coverage.

The Senate legislation would phase out extra federal money Nevada and 30 other states receive for expanding Medicaid to additional low earners.

It would also slap annual spending caps on the overall Medicaid program, which since its inception in 1965 has provided states with unlimited money to cover eligible costs.

"I cannot support a piece of legislation that takes insurance away from tens of millions of Americans and tens of thousands of Nevadans," Heller said.

Cindy's remnants bring street flooding from South to Midwest

NASHVILLE, TENN.

Rain bands reeling away from Tropical Depression Cindy spread drenching rains from the Southeast to the Midwest, triggering flash-flood warnings over several states including West Virginia, whose residents Friday marked the anniversary of deadly floods last June.

The storms stretching for hundreds of miles are expected to push river levels higher in coming days as the remnants cross Tennessee and Kentucky into West Virginia.

The severe weather, which was blamed for recent coastal flooding in the Deep South, tornadoes and one death, is rumbling closer to the densely populated East Coast.

The National Weather Service said Friday that Cindy was winding down and had lost tropical char-

acteristics as heavy rain potential moved east across the Ohio Valley and into Pennsylvania with severe thunderstorms forming to the south.

Weather service forecasters said rainfall totals of 2-4 inches were possible in several states, with up to 6 inches in isolated spots.

Flash flood watches were issued for much of Kentucky and West Virginia. Last June, torrential rains in West Virginia claimed 23 lives and memories of that disaster remained fresh at somber ceremonies honoring the dead.

A brief ceremony marking last year's fatal flooding took place Friday at the West Virginia Police Academy in Dunbar, where a bell was rung 23 times, for each who died. U.S. Sen. Joe Manchin traveled to another community, White Sul-

phur Springs, for the dedication of a memorial for eight victims there.

Labeled a 1,000-year flood by the National Weather Service, the storm destroyed more than 2,100 homes statewide and damaged another 2,000.

"As time goes on, we're struggling to get through the after effects of what took place in the flood," John Wyatt, a pastor from Rainelle, told West Virginia Public Broadcasting. He's still rebuilding his own home.

With Cindy's remnants a threat over a huge area, many just hoped severe weather would pass them without harm.

The U.S. Storm Prediction Center said severe storms pose a lingering threat from the Southeast into western Pennsylvania.

Is Trump exaggerating Mueller/Comey tie?

Robert Mueller, the somber-faced and demanding FBI director who led the bureau through the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks, and James Comey, his more approachable and outwardly affable successor, may be poles apart stylistically but both command a wealth of respect in the law-enforcement and legal community.

That hasn't stopped President Donald Trump and his associates from repeatedly trying to draw unflattering attention to their relationship, insinuating a personal bond they suggest could disqualify Mueller from credibly serving as special

counsel in charge of the Russia investigation. Most recently, in an interview that aired Friday on "Fox & Friends," Trump claimed Mueller was "very, very good friends with Comey, which is bothersome."

The emphasis on their ties, besides being aimed at undermining Mueller's credibility and the legitimacy of his investigation, could also be an attempt by Trump to make the case for an eventual Mueller dismissal on conflict of interest grounds.

But the truth is more complicated and not squarely on the president's side.

Mueller and Comey, both known for their integrity

and self-assuredness, served closely alongside each other in the Bush administration at the Justice Department. They played pivotal roles in a 2004 White House confrontation and have spoken warmly of each other over the years, with Comey describing Mueller as "one of the finest people I've ever met." But they're not known to be especially close friends, and legal experts say whatever connection they do have doesn't come close to meriting Mueller's removal.

Trump's efforts to highlight, and exaggerate, their relationship seem by design, as conflict of interest is one of the few grounds for dismissal of a special counsel.

9/11 worker pardon unlikely to spark trend

NEW YORK

The New York governor's pardon of a World Trade Center disaster worker fighting deportation to Colombia after a drug conviction is the latest example of politicians trying to rescue individuals from their immigration problems, but the mixed and unpredictable results make it unlikely to become a common occurrence.

Carlos Cardona had his 1990 drug conviction wiped off the books by Gov. Andrew Cuomo this week, improving the Queens man's chances of remaining in the U.S. while he receives health treatments for ailments linked to his work on the Sept. 11, 2001, recovery effort.

His case follows several other recent instances when Democratic governors have pardoned individuals facing deportation for state crimes that sometimes occurred years earlier. The pardons have come after President Donald Trump ordered increased deportations, resulting in a boost of more than 35 percent in his first 100 days in office when compared to the same period last year.

"It works some of the time," said Jason A. Cade, a University of Georgia School of Law professor

who has studied how the practice has evolved over the last century. "It is a way to avert what might be unfair deportations in certain cases."

It did not work after Virginia Gov. Terry McAuliffe pardoned Liliana Cruz Mendez for a minor driving offense after she was detained by immigration agents when she arrived May 18 for a regular check-in. The Falls Church, Va., mother of two was sent back to her native El Salvador anyway.

Colorado Gov. John Hickenlooper, hoping to stop a deportation, pardoned a Cuban immigrant, Rene Lima-Marin, last month for an armed robbery he committed 19 years ago.

Cade said changes by Congress in the 1990s pertaining to when pardons can excuse drug offenses for immigration purposes created "a lot of weirdness" so that pardons sometimes are effective for more serious drug crimes but not for lesser offenses.

In addition to pardons by governors, some prosecutors are thinking twice before filing charges that might result in deportation, raising the risk that a "parallel system of justice emerges where it is different for noncitizens."

Russia fires missiles at IS in Syria

MOSCOW

Russia has fired cruise missiles from the Mediterranean Sea on positions of the Islamic State group in Syria, the Defense Ministry said Friday, Moscow's latest show of strength in the conflict wracking the Mideast country.

The ministry said in a statement that two frigates and a submarine launched six cruise missiles on IS installations in Syria's Hama province, destroying command centers and ammunition depots. It did not say when the missiles were launched.

Moscow has fired missiles from the Mediterranean at militants' positions in Syria before, including launches from a submarine and a frigate in May at the targets in the area of the ancient city of Palmyra.

Russia is one of the strongest backers of Syrian President Bashar Assad's government and has been carrying airstrikes in the country since September 2015.

Separately on Friday, a senior Russian lawmaker said Moscow is "nearly 100 percent" sure that the IS top leader was killed in a Russian airstrike last month.

The Defense Ministry first made the claim last week, saying that Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi's death in the May 28 strike on the outskirts of the Syrian city of Raqqa was still "being verified through various channels."

Toledo Blade: People who haven't slept in 24 hours shouldn't drive. They're so tired it's more dangerous than being drunk. So can it possibly make sense for first-year doctors to be at work that long, taking care of patients?

The Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education has repealed its rule saying first-year residents must not be kept working more than 16 straight hours. That leaves them with the same cap that applies to more advanced trainee doctors: 24 hours, plus four more for handoffs. Another rule limits their average week to 80 hours.

But the council's new rules also require both residents and faculty members to learn about fatigue and fighting it. The rules require policies to relieve, "without fear of negative consequences," residents who can't do their work, including because they're too tired.

This culture change in medicine can't just be about first-year residents. Other doctors, including more advanced trainees, also work extremely long shifts. Physicians at every level must be taught to recognize when their patients need them to get more rest.

There's a lot to say about Trump reversing some of the Obama administration's policies on Cuba. The White House recently announced it was banning individual travel to the island and further restricting what business Americans can do there.

Yes, there's a lot to say, but I wonder if there's any point in saying it. After all, most Americans want to relax the embargo on Cuba. Even most Republicans disagree with Trump on Cuba, polls show.

That requires a bit of explanation. America has a longstanding embargo on Cuba, preventing the U.S. from selling much of anything there. The policy traces back to the Cold War. The economic harm to the island resulting from the policy is obvious when one sets foot in Cuba.

When I visited in 2010, life had gotten better for Cubans since the hardest times in the early 1990s. Still, life was difficult. Meat was a luxury for Cubans. Milk was only rationed to young children. I bought a handmade dress for \$15, a handsome sum to a Cuban but a pittance to me.

Obama didn't end the embargo. It's still in place.

What Obama overturned were other Cold War-era measures. He restored diplomatic relations with Cuba and relaxed a travel ban on U.S. citizens visiting the island.

The only way I was able to visit Cuba in 2010 was with a special government permit, and by going for business instead of pleasure. The U.S. government also limited how much I could spend there. And, of course, I couldn't bring any Cuban rum or cigars home.

WORLD TRAVELER

I've traveled all over on five different continents. In college, I spent an entire summer in China, a Communist country with a bad human rights record – quite a bit worse than Cuba's, arguably – that the U.S. is on perfectly good terms with, thank you very much.

Yet I've never been hassled, searched, and investigated as much upon my return home as I was when I came back from Cuba.

On the way out, I had to first fly to Cancun and then board a second flight the next day to Cuba. On my return, I was questioned, searched, and scolded until I nearly missed my connecting flight.

The hypocrisy was jarring. Why is the U.S. on good terms with China but not Cuba?

After Obama relaxed America's anti-Cuba policies, you could literally fly Southwest to Havana.

I think the best comment on Trump's policies came in the form of a satirical "news" article: "President Trump Orders the Execution of Five Turkeys Pardoned By Obama." No, not really. It's a joke. But it exposes the motives and sentiments behind many of Trump's actions.

In part, Trump is probably working to secure the hard liner Cuban vote in Florida by undoing Obama's Cuba policies.

But more than that, Trump wants us to believe that Obama made America a "mess." To show us what a great president he is, Trump wants us to believe that everything was awful before him – so bad that it required Trump to make it "great" again, by undoing obvious boons like Obama's mild Cuba reforms.

If Obama did it, it's bad. Therefore Trump will do the opposite.

To Trump, trying to understand the complex background of America's relationship with Cuba is superfluous, since Trump himself doesn't understand it. Yet he's hurting both Americans and Cubans in the process.

**Health-care bill will haunt GOP, but not because of all the secrecy**By MICHAEL A. LINDENBERGER

The big problem with the Republicans' new health plan isn't the secrecy with which it was written. Nor even the ridiculous speed with which they now plan to rush it through the Senate.

The problem is that Majority Leader Mitch McConnell and his lieutenants are just plum scared.

How else to explain the jacked-up way the party is pretending the health-care repeal is really just a budget reconciliation measure, rather than a real live piece of legislation that will strip health insurance from millions of Americans? A budget reconciliation measure requires only a simple majority to pass and can't be filibustered.

They know that they don't have the votes to pass such a dog pile of a bill under normal rules.

That is, since they only have 52 Republicans in the Senate, they feel they'd have to bend too far to write a bill that would persuade eight Democrats to vote for it, enough to avoid a filibuster.

What's wrong with that? Well nearly everything. But let's start with the big-picture basics.

DELIBERATIVE BODY?

The reason the Senate operates differently from the House is that the Founders reasoned there was advantage in having at least one of the chambers of Congress be deliberative. The reason the Senate requires a 60-vote majority to get past a filibuster is because, especially on very large changes to our laws, there used to be a feeling that requiring a major-

ity party to work hard to win over at least some of the other team would ensure that the bill was thoroughly hashed out.

Rep. Michael Burgess talked with *The Dallas Morning News* editorial board this week. He talked sense about all sorts of things. But when he said that the Senate decision to operate under reconciliation rules had limited the lawmakers' flexibility when working on the Obamacare repeal bills, I asked him why his party had decided to go that route.

His answer: That's how Obama and the Democrats operated when they rammed the Affordable Care Act down the Republicans' throats, and so that's how the Republicans are going to ram down their replacement bill.

Ain't Washington great? Except of course, in this particular case it doesn't even happen to be true. Not even remotely.

LEGISLATIVE TRICKS

The Democrats pulled a number of legislative tricks toward the end to get their bill past the 60-vote threshold. And it's true that by the time the final version made it to the floor, there were plenty of lawmakers who hadn't read the whole bill.

So disgusted were certain members of the minority party that they loudly declared that if ever the political fortunes changed, and they were in the majority, they would run things with far less secrecy.

Actually, by "certain members" I mean McConnell, who promptly forgot about that pledge.

But long before the Democrats were busy pushing their bill through at the end, they had held plenty of open hear-

ings about the bill. Hearings that were open to both parties and the public.

Senate Republicans have, by contrast, held only "listening sessions" open only to Republican lawmakers.

But as I said, it's the not the secrecy that's telling here. It's the craven politics.

YEAR-LONG PROCESS

Were Democrats hard-pressed to pass their bill all those years ago? You betcha. They spent a year arguing about it, drafting it, and fighting over whether the moderates or the liberals would win. You might remember that liberal Democrats were for a single-payer system, and the moderates believed they'd only get 60 votes if they adopted the centrist market-based approach pioneered by Mitt Romney in Massachusetts.

Obama sided with the moderates, and that's what passed.

But notice: The Democrats worked overtime because they needed a bill to pass with 60 votes. Republicans, who were outvoted in the presidential election and who lost seats to Democrats, had a choice. They could have tried to pass a bill that would have peeled off eight Democrats and created something of a bipartisan replacement for Obamacare.

But they didn't try. Is it because they lacked the votes? Or the guts?

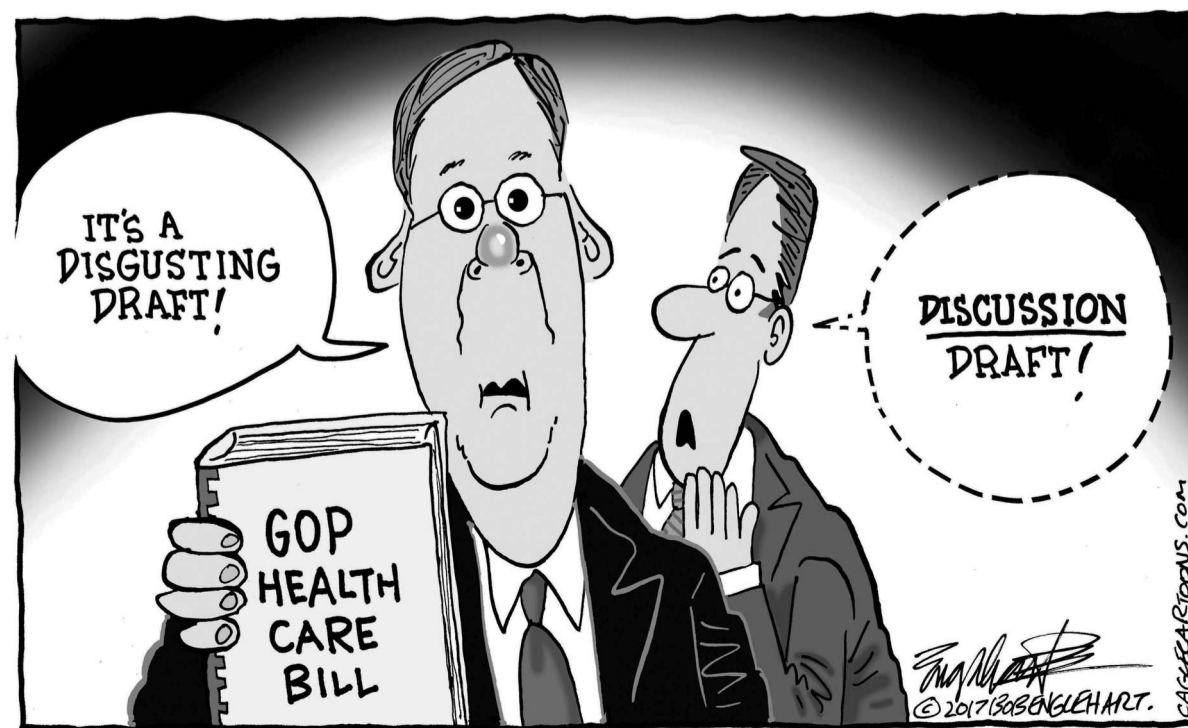
It's not easy to say. But when they do pass this loser of a bill, if they pass it, they are going to wear it come 2018. They might find that what they hoped would be a life vest is really an anchor tied tight around their shoulders.

Honda denies covering up the dangers of air bags

Honda is going public in an effort to debunk claims by lawyers that it knew about the hazards of exploding Takata air-bag inflators nearly two decades ago but covered them up. The automaker issued a statement Friday that outlines its defense against claims that Honda should compensate car owners because the use of Takata air bags caused their vehicles to lose value. The public escalation of Honda's fight comes just three days before Takata Corp. is expected to file for bankruptcy protection in Japan and the United States.

Sears closes another 20 stores

Sears Holdings Corp. is shutting down another 20 stores, on top of more than 200 closings already announced this year, as the ailing retailer tries to turn around its business. Real-estate investment trust Seritage, which owns the 20 real-estate properties, confirmed the closings - 18 Sears stores and two Kmart stores - in a government filing Friday.

Kansas jury awards \$218M to farmers in Syngenta GMO suit

KANSAS CITY, MO.
A federal jury in Kansas has awarded nearly \$218 million to farmers who sued Swiss agribusiness giant Syngenta over its introduction of a genetically engineered corn seed. Syngenta vowed to appeal the verdict in what served as the first test case of tens of thousands of U.S. lawsuits assailing Syngenta's decision to introduce its Viptera seed strain to the U.S. market before China approved it for imports. The lawsuits say that wrecked an increasingly important export market for U.S. corn, causing years of depressed corn prices.

US indexes inch higher

U.S. stock indexes nudged higher Friday after energy companies clawed back some of their sharp losses from earlier in the week. Energy stocks led the way, and those in the S&P 500 climbed 0.8 percent for the largest gain of the 11 sectors that make up the index. Rising prices for oil and

natural gas drove the gains. Benchmark U.S. crude added 27 cents to settle at \$43.01 per barrel. Brent crude, the international standard, gained 32 cents to \$45.54 and natural gas rose 4 cents, or 1.2 percent, to \$2.93 per 1,000 cubic feet. EQT, a producer of natural gas and crude, had the day's biggest gain in the S&P 500 and jumped \$4.16,

or 8 percent, to \$56.19. Cabot Oil & Gas climbed 88 cents, or 3.8 percent, to \$23.74. What kept broad indexes afloat for the week were big gains for health care and technology stocks. The S&P 500 rose 0.2 percent for the week. Friday's biggest decliner in the S&P 500 was Bed Bath & Beyond.

Sales of new homes rebounded 2.9% in May

Sales of new homes rebounded in May, helped by strong sales gains in the South and West. Sales of new single-family homes rose 2.9 percent last month to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 610,000, the Commerce Department reported Friday. That followed a 7.9 percent drop in sales in April, which was the biggest monthly decline in eight months. Sales gains of 6.2 percent in the South and 13.3 percent in the West overcame big declines of 25.7 percent in the Midwest and 10.8 percent in the Northeast. The Midwest drop was the largest in that region in nearly three years. The median price of a home sold last month rose to a record \$345,800, up 16.8 percent from a year ago. Prices have been increasing as demand has outstripped supply, in part because of a shortage of available building lots. The rebound in May sales had been expected following the big April drop. Sales of previously owned homes also rose last month. The National Association of Realtors reported Thursday existing home sales, a much larger market than new homes, increased 1.1 percent in May to a seasonally adjusted annual sales rate of 5.62 million. Economists noted that the May level of sales was the highest since March, and the government also revised up activity for the past three months.

Cody Glass played in a youth hockey tournament in Las Vegas when he was 10. His Junior Steelers team finished a disappointing second.

He is looking forward to many more games in Sin City.

Glass was selected by the expansion Vegas Golden Knights with their first pick Friday night, going No. 6 overall as part of a parade of forwards at the top of the NHL draft. The 18-year-old Canadian center had 32 goals and 62 assists in 69 games last season for the Portland Winterhawks of the Western Hockey League.

"I didn't really see that as a hockey place when I went there, but now, with the new team and the fans and season tickets sold out, I think hockey will be unbelievable," Glass said. The first NHL draft in Chicago began with another 18-year-old forward, with Swiss center Nico Hischier going No. 1 overall to the New Jersey Devils. The Philadelphia Flyers then grabbed Nolan Patrick at No. 2.

Ten of the top 13 picks were listed as centers. Defensemen Miro Heiskanen (No. 3 overall to Dallas) and Cale Makar (No. 4 to Colorado) and right wing Owen Tippett (No. 10 to Florida) were the exceptions. Vegas also opted for another forward prospect with its second of three picks in the first round, taking Nick Suzuki at No. 12 before selecting Swedish defenseman Erik Brannstrom with the 15th pick.

"The forward group is real strong," New Jersey general manager Ray Shero said.

After a symphony of boos for NHL Commissioner Gary Bettman and most of Chicago's rivals across the league, the crowd cheered when the Blackhawks finally got on the clock at No. 26. But they promptly moved back three spots in a deal with Dallas in the first of three trades announced during the first round.

The St. Louis Blues sent forward Jori Lehtera and two draft picks to Philadelphia for Brayden Schenn, and also traded physical forward Ryan Reaves to the Stanley Cup champion Penguins.

The crowd at the United Center cheered again when the Blackhawks got back on the clock, and general manager Stan Bowman played to the roaring fans when he brought out captain Jonathan Toews and star winger Patrick Kane to announce their selection of Finnish defenseman Henri Jokiharju.

"Jonathan Toews and Patrick Kane call my name, and it can't be a better feeling," Jokiharju said.

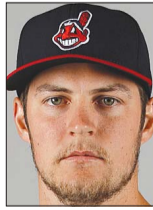

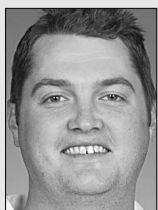

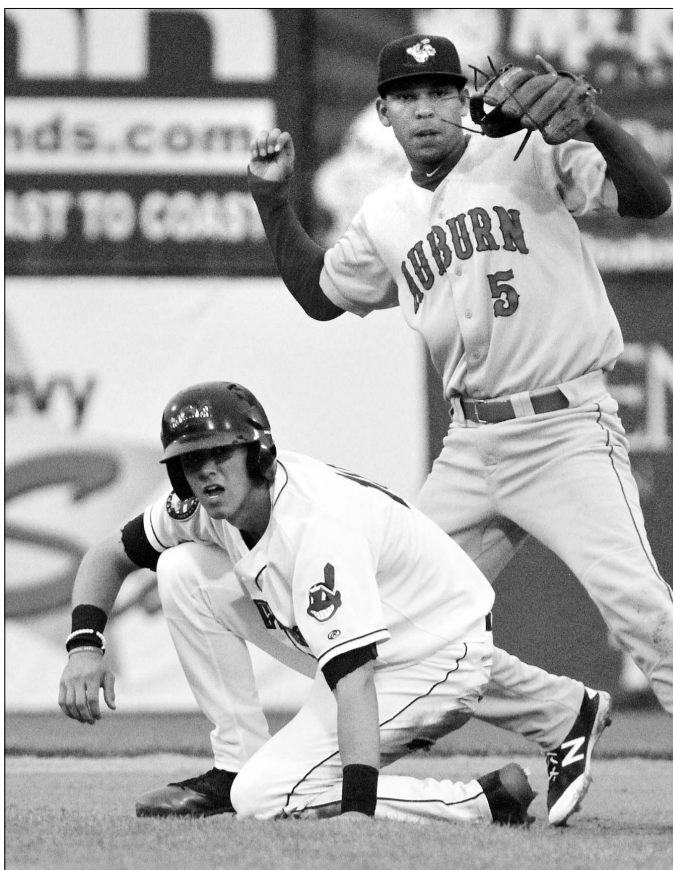

Pet squirrel that foiled Idaho home burglary returns to wild

A pet squirrel named Joey who gained fame as a crime-fighter might be more of the lover type.

Joey, who police credited with scaring off a burglar trying to break into his home's gun safe, made his long goodbyes earlier this month, then scampered up a backyard apple tree at his Meridian, Idaho, home and hasn't been seen since.

"If I had to guess, he found a girlfriend, and they're off doing their squirrel thing," said Adam Pearl, who raised Joey in his home for about 10 months.

A University of Idaho scientist said that's probably right for Joey.

"For a lot of mammals, behavior changes once spring comes," said

Janet Rachlow, a professor at the school's Department of Fish and Wildlife Sciences.

Joey made headlines in February after police went to Pearl's home to investigate the burglary and Joey introduced himself. A few hours later, police nabbed a teen burglary suspect with items from Pearl's home and scratches on his hands.

Like many famous crime-fighters, Joey had a rough start in life. He was abandoned after falling out of his nest not long after being born and would have died if Adam Pearl and his wife, Carmen, hadn't taken him in.

"His eyes weren't even open," Adam Pearl said. "He was about the size of a Bic lighter when we first got him."

They bought supplies and set an alarm every two hours to feed him. Joey thrived and soon had the run

of the house, using a litter box and learning to scavenge from bowls of nuts.

"I wanted him to be able to fend for himself," Adam Pearl said.

Joey did just that, delighting the family with his antics.

"He'd let anybody pet him when he was in the house," Pearl said. "I guess right up until the kid broke in. Right after that is when he started getting aggressive."

About a month ago, Pearl made the decision to leave a sliding door open after Joey seemed extra rambunctious. Joey eventually ventured out, played with wild squirrels during the day and returned to his bed inside at night.

On June 4, he climbed on Adam's shoulder, where he stayed for several minutes getting his ears scratched before disappearing in the apple tree.

"I think that was his goodbye, looking back on it," Adam Pearl said.

Q. I was very impressed with Navi, who played Michael Jackson in a recent Lifetime movie. What's his background? — Jean Price, Boulder, Colo.

A. Though the Trinidad-born Navi has earned international fame for his stage performances as Jackson, whom he's been portraying since age 15, he did his first actual acting beyond the singing and dancing in Lifetime's "Michael Jackson: Searching for Neverland." He says he's now leaving the Jackson connection behind to pursue other roles.

While his parents evidently wanted him to pursue a career in the construction field, Navi actually did know Jackson (whose family and estate didn't sanction the Lifetime project), and he says the music superstar used him as a decoy to distract paparazzi.

Q. I enjoyed seeing Leah Remini and Kevin James back together when she was on "Kevin Can Wait." Will she be back next season? — Linda Hart, via e-mail

A. Yes, and in a very big way. She and James will be reunited permanently as she becomes a co-star in Season 2 of the CBS sitcom, as she reprises her police-detective role in what's being called a retooling of the show's format. Whether that means bringing James' character out of retirement to rejoin the police force remains to be seen, though that would seem a good bet.

One thing Remini's hiring has meant is the series' dismissal of Erinn Hayes, who played James' wife. It clearly wasn't Hayes' choice to leave, since she tweeted that she was "let go" and it was a "very sad" development, and the show will need to explain her character's absence in some fashion when new episodes resume in late September.

Q. I heard that Lauren Gravam made a pilot for a new series that didn't make the fall schedule. What was it, and why wasn't the show ordered? — Matt Fellows, Antioch, Calif.

A. Her Fox pilot was titled "Linda From HR." and

while the network's executives would be the ones to give specifics (which rarely happens) on why the series wasn't picked up, the "Gilmore Girls" alum will be seen in another series.

She has a recurring role in the long-overdue new season of HBO's "Curb Your Enthusiasm," and she's said that virtually all of her scenes also involve its mentor, Larry David. She also had to improvise a lot of her dialogue, which she's noted as a challenge for her, coming from such tightly scripted programs as "Gilmore" and "Parenthood."

Q. Sir Roger Moore's recent passing got me thinking about "The Saint." How many other actors have played Simon Templar? — Daisy Allen, Buffalo, N.Y.

A. In television terms, there were two who followed Moore, who "owned" the role through most of the 1960s. Ian Ogilvy has the part in "Return of the Saint," which had a U.S. run on CBS in the late 1970s. A decade after that, Simon Dutton played Templar in several adventures that got American distribution as part of the syndicated "Mystery Wheel of Adventure." (Just before that, Andrew Clarke starred in a "Saint in Manhattan" pilot that never got beyond that stage.)

In movies, other actors have taken on Templar. A "Saint" series of the 1930s and 1940s started with Louis Hayward, who was succeeded by George Sanders, then by Hugh Sinclair. Hayward made a comeback in the part in a 1953 film. The most recent actor to see in the role is Val Kilmer, who played Templar in the 1997 movie "The Saint."

A TV revival of the franchise has been proposed for a number of years. First, it was going to star James Purefoy, then Dougray Scott, and then Adam Rayner. The Rayner pilot (which co-starred Eliza Dushku, and included Moore as a producer) actually was made, but several years later, it still has yet to be seen.

A decade later, the world is still a 'Zoo' as CBS suspense series returns

Ten years from now, the world as envisioned by James Patterson still will be a "Zoo" ... and, thanks to its animals, perhaps an even more lethal one.

The best-selling author's novel (co-written with Michael Ledwidge) makes a big time leap as its CBS summer-series incarnation's third season begins Thursday, June 29. With Patterson remaining among the show's executive producers, it's now 2027 in the story line, and a decade has meant big changes for familiar characters who are among the steadily lessening human survivors — and also for their rampaging quarry, now even deadlier as "hybrids" generated in laboratories.

One "Zoo" figure who makes a major transition is journalist Jamie Campbell, still played by "House of Cards" alum Kristen Connolly. Having spent a dozen years being on the run from marauding animals while also seeking a cure for the crisis, she's reintroduced as an experienced woman of action, signaled by her markedly different appearance.

"She's really undergone a transformation in a lot of ways," the friendly Connolly confirms of Jamie. "Her values are the same, but she's been on a mission, not unlike how we saw her in Season 1. In this case, it's more focused on the people who took Mitch away. It's made her a little tougher, and I'm excited to see what the audience thinks when they meet all these characters 10 years later."

"Mitch" is Mitch Morgan, the veterinary pathologist with whom Jamie developed a relationship that went beyond their shared quest to stop the attacks. Spoiler alert: His portrayer, Billy Burke, is back in the regular cast this season. So are James Wolk, Nonso Anozie, Alysia Diaz and Josh Salatin — and a new regular is Gracie Dzienny

("Chasing Life") as Mitch's now-grown daughter Clementine, who gave the impression at the end of Season 2 that she knew where her missing father was.

"Jamie does have a relationship with Clementine," Connolly reports. "I don't want to say too much about what that is, but where we left it

in Season 2, Clementine was a little girl who'd just met Jamie for the first time. And the history they've had over the past 10 years comes out in the first couple of episodes."

Also seen recently opposite Robert De Niro in HBO's Bernie Madoff drama "The Wizard of

Lies," Connolly admits she didn't expect the giant jump in time that "Zoo" is making. "We were all a little bit shocked" she says. "I think we all kind of thought, 'What are they doing?' And, 'Is this gonna work?' As we embarked on Season 3, though, it was such a good idea the writers had.

"It's really afforded us the opportunity not only to play with the characters and the journeys they've gone on, but with what the actual landscape of the world is at that point," adds Connolly. "We're not so tied to contemporary reality, and it allows us to go even crazier. If that's possible."
