City schools superintendent loses 'interim' tag

Joseph Meranto promoted to full time

The city school district's CEO has removed the interim superintendent title from Joseph Meranto.

Meranto, director of Choffin Career and Technical Center for the past 13

years, is the new district superintendent.

"As a lifelong Youngstown resident, I am excited for the opportunity to serve this community and school district in a more expansive role," Meranto said Friday. "I look forward to working with Mr. [Krish] Mohip and

the many hard-working administrators, teachers and support personnel in

Youngstown."

Mohip, who selected Meranto as interim superintendent earlier this month, said Meranto – whose salary will remain \$115,000 per year – is a perfect fit.

"We didn't have to look very far to find the right person to step into the superintendent's seat," Mohip said. "Joe has been a part of

our district for many years and a part of my leadership team since I got here. I'm confident he's the right person to help me in an even greater role, to implement the changes required to ensure our students – all of our students – are getting a quality education that prepares them for college, careers and beyond."

Meranto replaces Stephen Stohla, who served since July 2015. Stohla's contract was not renewed.

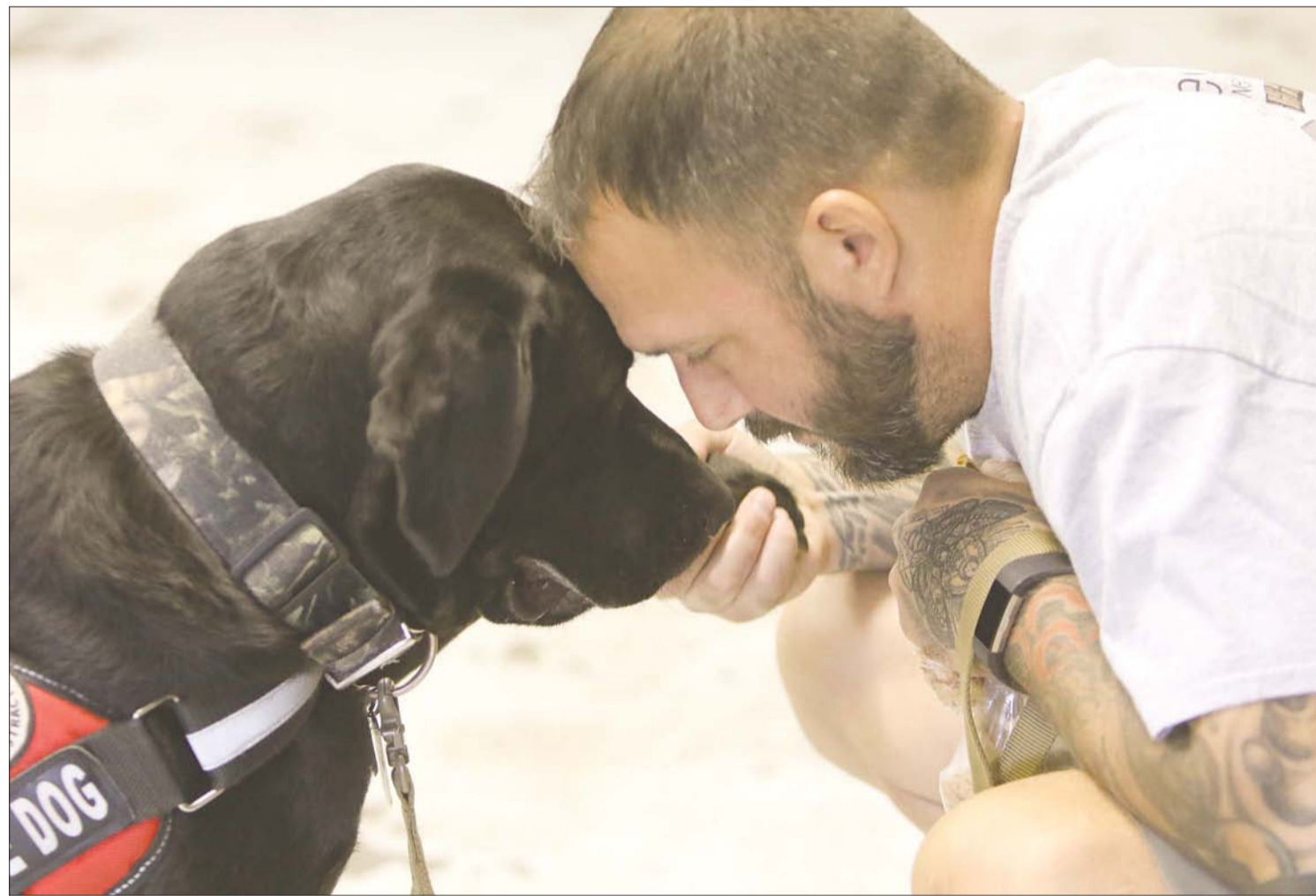
Meranto, however, was not without competition.

AUSTINTOWN

“NO PETS ALLOWED” is a common sign found outside businesses, but not all domesticated animals are pets.

Some are service animals.

Ann Gott, 67, of Austintown was diagnosed with post-traumatic stress disorder after her husband died. Not long after, she received Barney, a Maltese service dog that helps detect and calm her symptoms.

Barney's presence helps Gott feel comfortable when she leaves her home, but she said her experience having a service animal in public spaces

hasn't always been pleasant.

She had to leave a Walmart Supercenter after being told her service animal was not allowed inside the shopping cart she was using.

An employee from Walmart customer service told *The Vindicator* service animals weighing 12 pounds or less are allowed in the shopping cart, as long as the dog is atop a cover in the cart.

Gott said Barney was atop a proper cover and wearing the service animal vest.

Walmart corporate policy states the business must “welcome into our stores any animal that is individually trained to assist a person with a disability.”

Trump ousts Priebus as chief of staff

WASHINGTON

His White House in turmoil, President Donald Trump abruptly announced late Friday he was appointing Homeland Security Secretary John Kelly to be his chief of staff, ending the tumultuous six-month tenure of Reince Priebus.

After months of speculation about Priebus' fate, Trump tweeted his decision as he landed in Washington after a speech in New York in which he lavishly praised Kelly's performance at Homeland Security.

Priebus, the former Republican National Committee head, has been a frequent target of rumors about his job security amid infighting and confusion within the White House and a long whisper

A man and his mower

When his Warren neighborhood starts to look 'raggedy,' Vietnam veteran steps into action

WARREN

Mike Packman is a 67-year-old retired Navy veteran of the Vietnam War who enjoys being able to help people.

He doesn't drive a car anymore, but he has something to drive in his downtown neighborhood few others have – a riding mower.

Packman, who moved from Southington to downtown Warren 15 years ago

after his wife died of cancer, uses the mower to help the sometimes “raggedy” area just north of downtown stay in good shape.

Packman has found that a number of his neighbors are disabled or elderly, and others have trouble keeping their yards mowed for other reasons.

He doesn't worry about why, and just goes

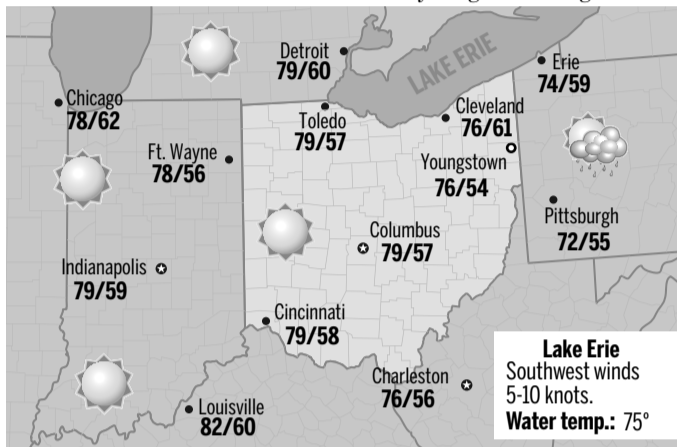

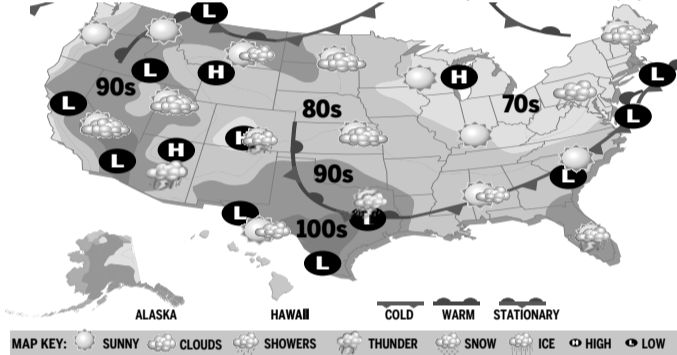

campaign by Trump allies. Then, on Thursday, he was the subject of a remarkable and profane public rebuke by Trump's newly appointed White House communications director, Anthony Scaramucci.

Priebus said he had offered his resignation Thursday and the president accepted. "I think the president wanted to go a different direction," Priebus told CNN just hours after his exit was announced. He added that he agreed the White House might well benefit from "a reset," and he said, "I'm always going to be a Trump fan. I'm on Team Trump."

Trump's announcement on Twitter said, "I am pleased to inform you that I have just named General/Secretary John F Kelly as White House Chief of Staff. He is a Great American ... and a Great Leader. John has also done a spectacular job at Homeland Security. He has been a true star of my Administration."

He also saluted Priebus, the chief of staff he had just pushed out.

"I would like to thank Reince Priebus for his service and dedication to his country. We accomplished a lot together and I am proud of him!"

Kelly is a retired Marine four-star general. Trump had focused on him in recent days, telling those close to him that he loved the general's star power and that he believed military discipline was what his administration needed.

Priebus never could bring a semblance of order to the team of in-fighting rivals

that populate Trump's West Wing, and questions about his future have long swirled around the office. Those questions sharply escalated this week with the arrival of Scaramucci, the hard-charging communications director who was hired over Priebus' objections.

Priebus' already tense relationship with Scaramucci took a darker turn over the past two days when the communications chief suggested in a late-night tweet that Priebus was one of the "leakers" that Trump has railed against. *The New Yorker* magazine published an interview Thursday in which Scaramucci called Priebus, amid an avalanche of vulgarity, a "paranoid schizophrenic."

Priebus, who hails from Wisconsin and has deep ties to House Speaker Paul Ryan, had grown increasingly isolated in the White House, as past Republican National Committee colleagues and other allies have left or been pushed out. Those who have departed include former deputy chief of staff Katie Walsh, former communications chief Mike Dubke, press secretary Sean Spicer and press aide Michael Short. Another early departure from the Trump White House was National Security Adviser Michael Flynn. And Trump has fired Twitter insults at Attorney General Jeff Sessions recently though Sessions is still in place.

Ryan, in a statement, said Priebus "has left it all out on the field, for our party and

our country." Ryan added that he looked forward to working with Kelly.

Both Scaramucci and Priebus traveled to New York's Long Island with Trump on Friday for a speech in which the president highlighted efforts to crack down on the gang MS-13. Priebus took the return flight to Washington, his fate sealed in the tweets that were sent by the president just as he stepped off the plane.

Shortly before the president deplaned, Priebus' black SUV pulled away, leaving the rest of the motorcade, including the president's vehicle, in the distance. The president eventually emerged, umbrella in hand, and delivered a brief statement on the runway as driving rain poured.

Rep. Peter King of New York sat across from the outgoing chief of staff on Air Force One's return flight to Washington and said Priebus "kept a poker face."

Priebus' term ends in fewer than 200 days, the shortest tenure for any president's first White House chief of staff since the post was formally established in 1946. From day one, his power has been limited compared with past officials with his title. In a highly unusual arrangement, Trump said at the outset that Priebus and chief strategist Steve Bannon would serve as "equal partners" in implementing his agenda.

Scaramucci was the latest top aide to be granted a direct line to Trump, and it became increasingly unclear who actually reported to Priebus.

George Clooney threatens prosecution over pics of twins

George Clooney says photographers who captured images of him and his wife, human-rights lawyer Amal Clooney, cradling their newborn twins will be "prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law."

The pictures published by French magazine *Voici* were taken at the Clooneys' residence in the Lombardy region of Italy. The magazine claims the photos are the first to be made public of twins Ella and Alexander, who were born June 6.

The actor says the photographers "scaled our fence, climbed our tree and illegally took pictures of our infants inside our home."

He adds that the photographers, the photo agency and the magazine will face prosecution because the safety of the couple's children "demands it."

Linkin Park singer's widow opens about husband's death

NEW YORK

The widow of late Linkin Park singer Chester Bennington says she's feeling the love from the rocker's fans but she's also feeling the loss.

Talinda Bennington said in a statement late Thursday she wants "to let my community and the fans

worldwide know that we feel your love. We feel your loss as well."

Chester Bennington hanged himself from a bedroom door in his home near Los Angeles last week. His death was ruled a suicide.

"One week ago, I lost my soulmate and my children lost their hero - their Daddy. We had a fairytale life and now it has turned into some sick Shakespearean tragedy. How do I move on? How do I pick up my shattered soul?" Talinda Bennington wrote. "The only answer I know is to raise our babies with every ounce of love I have left."

Chester and Talinda Bennington had six children.

Linkin Park rose to fame after releasing its debut album, "Hybrid Theory," in 2000. It sold more than 10 million albums and was highlighted by Chester Bennington's screeching signature vocals. The band went on to become one of music's top-selling acts and won accolades that included Grammy Awards.

After his death, the band announced it would cancel its tour, which would have begun this week.

Talinda Bennington said she knows his fans, family and friends "will help keep [Chester's] memory alive."

"He was a bright, loving soul with an angel's

voice. And now he is pain free, singing his songs in all of our hearts," she continued. "May God bless us all and help us turn to one another when we are in pain. Chester would've wanted us to do so. Rest In Peace, my love."

Bennington was found dead on what would have been the 53rd birthday of Soundgarden frontman Chris Cornell, who hanged himself in May. The two were friends and Bennington was the godfather to Cornell's 11-year-old son, Chris.

Simone Biles shares goofy video after wisdom teeth surgery

Olympic gymnast Simone Biles is giving fans a glimpse of her goofy side in a video that shows her coming out of an anesthetic haze after surgery to have her wisdom teeth removed.

Biles posted the video on Twitter on Thursday. She appears on a recovery room bed with gauze in her mouth, yelling something incomprehensible and pretending to drive a car. Biles says she hopes the 27-second clip makes people laugh.

The 20-year-old Biles says the full video is 14 minutes long. She says, "Other parts are hilarious too!" Biles won four gold medals and a bronze medal at the 2016 Summer Olympics in Rio de Janeiro.

Coroner IDs man found in minivan

WARREN

The Trumbull County coroner has identified the man found dead in a burned-out minivan on Pershing Avenue Southwest on Monday as Michael C. Walker, 31, of Parkman Road Northwest, the registered owner of the car.

The coroner's office has not yet ruled on the cause of death, but police continue to investigate it as a possible homicide. No arrests have been made.

A woman called 911 at 10:08 a.m. Monday to report that a minivan in a remote area at the end of Pershing had burned and a body was partway out of the vehicle.

Firefighters determined that the fire probably occurred overnight.

The area where the van was found is overgrown with trees close to the street and has been repeatedly used for trash dumping.

When Walker was booked into the Trumbull County jail a month ago on a petty theft charge, he indicated his employment was a driver for the Amish.

Woman faces endangering charge

A woman who was arrested after reports said she overdosed outside a West Side barbershop while her children were inside getting haircuts was arraigned Friday in municipal court.

Judge Robert Milich set bond at \$5,000 for Amanda Long, 32, of Compass West, Austintown, who faces a misdemeanor charge of child endangering after she was arrested late Wednesday afternoon at the Mahoning Avenue barbershop.

As part of Long's bond, she is not allowed any contact with her children and she also must get a drug and alcohol assessment.

If she manages to post bond, she will be placed on house arrest.

The children who were with her at the time, age 4 and 11, were released to a grandparent.

Teen charged with felonious assault

WARREN

Police charged a 17-year-old male with felonious assault in the July 17 shooting of another teen, 19, at the Highland Terrace apartments basketball court.

The victim, who lives at the apartment complex, was hit by two gunshots — one in the leg and one in the stomach — in the 8:33 p.m. incident off Lane Drive Southwest.

Detective Wayne Mackey said surveillance cameras at the basketball courts and community cooperation assisted in solving the crime. The juvenile was taken to the Trumbull County Juvenile Justice Center.

US Route 62 work to begin Monday

SALEM

Weather permitting, work is expected to begin Monday on a project to extend the pavement life on 6 miles of U.S. Route 62 from state Route 165 through Damascus to state Route 45 near Salem, the Ohio Department of Transportation said.

As a preservation strategy, Route 62 will be microsurfaced to seal the pavement, making it last longer.

Using aggressive preservation treatments such as chip seal and microsurfacing lowers costs over the long term, enabling ODOT to resurface more roads and provide a smoother ride for more people, transportation department officials said. Traffic will be maintained.

ODOT's contractor for the \$800,000 project is Strasser Construction Inc. from Columbus. The completion date is Sept. 30.

He isn't the heaviest dog, but Gott said carrying Barney through the store while shopping wasn't an option.

Walmart offers curbside service, and groceries can be purchased online, but Gott said she still wants her independence.

"This is why I'm so upset," she said.

The U.S. Department of Justice requires any private business that serves the public to permit service animals anywhere customers are allowed. A physical or mental impairment that may limit a person's ability to function is considered a disability under the Americans with Disabilities Act. That includes PTSD.

Gott said Barney is like any other dog at home, but when he's out of the house, he's working.

"Sometimes you don't know you're going to have a panic attack," Gott said. "That's why I need him here."

Katie Costello is with The Canine Campus, 757 N. Main St., Hubbard, a dog-training service that also trains service animals. Their program, The Together Journey, trains about 20 service dogs a year.

Trained service animals run a regimen of exercises, with about a 40 percent national success rate, Costello said.

These animals assist with a range of impairments — guiding people who are blind, alerting people who are

deaf, pulling wheelchairs, alerting someone who is going to have seizures, calming panic attacks and reminding a person to take medication.

For some, the act of taking their service animals into the public isn't as stressful.

"Everybody in the [Mahoning] Valley has been great," said Robert Galloway, a veteran.

Galloway is training his service dog Luna in The Together Journey to help with his PTSD.

He said she was timid at first, but after a year of running the gamut at The Canine Campus, Luna has been everywhere from restaurants to the bus with Galloway. She'll join Galloway for class at Youngstown State University next school

year. "This dog saved my life," he said. "I thought about ending my life, but if something ever happened to me, I thought about what would happen to my wife and this dog."

People are legally able to ask individuals with service animals what purpose their dog serves.

mendment of Andre Cowling for the superintendent position, with backup options of Martha Hasselbusch and Diane Longstreth.

Mohip responded shortly after, saying he would take their recommendations into consideration.

Mohip has control over the district under Ohio House Bill 70, which put a chief executive officer, overseen by a state-appointed academic-distress commission, in control of the district.

District spokeswoman Denise Dick said Mohip was disappointed the board didn't interview Meranto, who he says has long-stand-

ing knowledge of the district and community.

About 1 p.m. Friday, Mohip sent another email that said: "Upon review of resumes and/or reference checks, I have chosen to go in a direction and not select anyone from the three names provided. Your input has been considered and I thank you for your efforts."

Friday afternoon, Cowling informed Mohip he wanted to withdraw from consideration for the position.

Still, an upset board member, Dario Hunter, responded: "When your choice is announced, you will no doubt attempt to portray this process as one that involved genuine input from the school board in the collaborative spirit intended by HB

70. The actual process has been nothing of the kind. We haven't had a single discussion about your insight regarding the imminent choice of a superintendent or the reasons behind the choices made by the board."

Hunter included in his email that Meranto was, in fact, interviewed by the board; however, Meranto said he merely had a conversation with the board, not an official interview.

But Mohip has high hopes for Meranto in his new position.

"Joe knows this district," Mohip said. "He knows the community, the families and the kids. None of the other candidates can say that. I'm confident that Joe is the right person for the job."

Support system to help students

YOUNGSTOWN

A new support system is being put in place to catch students before they fall behind in Youngstown City Schools.

"Here we have people working together far more than in the past," said Linda Yosay, special-education consultant from the Mahoning County Educational Service Center.

The district's new Multi-Tiered Support System is seeking to cut down on labeling students in need of special education prematurely.

"Just because a student is struggling behaviorally or academically doesn't mean they're special education [students]," Yosay said. "We are still looking for indicators if they might be, though."

Currently, 23 percent of

students in the district are labeled as in need of special education.

"We realize for some of those students, getting that extra assistance has been very helpful. However, if they don't have a disability, they should be back in general population," Yosay said.

The new system is being put in place first through educators' professional development and second by passing it onto students, said Timothy Filipovich, city schools chief of academics, accountability and assessment.

"We are working on transforming our teachers," said Amanda McGinnis, district deputy chief of transformation. "We're empowering them. It's our mission for them to help transform this district."

Teachers, who are the people working the closest to

students, are going to have more authority to monitor students and implement interventions to help and prevent problems at their first sign.

McGinnis said in addition to teachers receiving this authority, they will also be receiving support.

"Our teachers are going to have so much support," she said. "We have instructional framework specialists, we will be providing tools to improve, and there is just so much out there to support these teachers."

Another large part of the success of the new system is the students' believing they can succeed, Yosay said.

"It's about raising the expectations for our students," Filipovich said. "If we do a good enough job, we can capture all students and close gaps for everybody."

A Rand Corp. study has estimated between 1,320 and 6,630 out of 1.3 million active-duty troops are transgender.

Trump abruptly declared a ban Wednesday on transgender troops serving in the military Wednesday through Twitter rather than a formal announcement. It caught the Pentagon off guard, but on Thursday, top military leaders said they would continue to allow transgender troops to remain in uniform until Defense Secretary Jim Mattis receives an authoritative directive to remove them.

A White House spokeswoman said guidance on how to fully implement the policy was still being worked out.

McNally wrote: "Especially jarring in this decision [by Trump] is the White House's inability to clearly articulate the ongoing status of transgender service persons currently serving in the military and how the presence of patriot transgender service persons disrupts the drive of American forces to be focused on decisive and overwhelming victory."

Mom sentenced for overdose of her children seeks early release from prison

WARREN

A young mother convicted of two counts of felony child endangering after her children, age 21 months and 9 months, had to be revived with the overdose drug naloxone Feb. 2, 2016, is asking to be released early from prison.

Carlisa Davis, 19, of Randolph Street Northwest, was sentenced to 30 months in prison Jan. 4. She has served a little under seven months of her 30-month sentence.

Judge W. Wyatt McKay of Trumbull County Common Pleas Court said at the sentencing hearing one of the reasons for sending her to prison was her unwillingness to tell anyone at the hospital that her unresponsive children might have overdosed on drugs.

A prosecutor said Davis' refusal to tell hospital personnel what might be wrong with the children delayed treatment by 30 minutes.

After administering the drug on one of the children, the child became conscious. Both children were expected to make a full recovery.

Prosecutors said Davis admitted to knowing that her brothers sold drugs out of the home where she lived with her children and her mother. She also said she observed one of her children "playing in powder" when she woke up from a nap.

Michael Partlow, Davis' attorney, said in a filing that Davis has completed a number of programs in prison and will be able to return to her prior employment upon release from prison.

In a letter to the judge, Davis said if she is released, she

plans to live with her grandparents "until I am able to get back on my feet and take care of my children."

Davis' grandparents took custody of all three of her

children when she went to prison.

Judge McKay has not ruled on the motion. Davis' appeal of her conviction is also pending with the 11th Dis-

trict Court of Appeals.

In another case, Reggie L. Potts of Northgate Drive in Howland, former Bazetta Township police chief, has asked a third time for Judge McKay to seal the records in Potts' 1993 and 1994 theft-in-office, falsification and tampering with evidence convictions.

He was fired as chief in 1993 after his conviction.

The theft in office involved letting a friend borrow a car loaned to the police department.

The falsification was writing a letter indicating a man had worked for the Bazetta Police Department who had not.

His tampering charge related to police department drug records.

Judge McKay approved the motion the first time, but an appeals court reversed the

decision, saying Potts didn't qualify because the offenses occurred over five years, not at the same time.

Potts asked the appeals court in 2011 to consider expungement under "unusual and exceptional circumstances," but that form of expungement is only available when someone has never been convicted of a crime, the appeals court said.

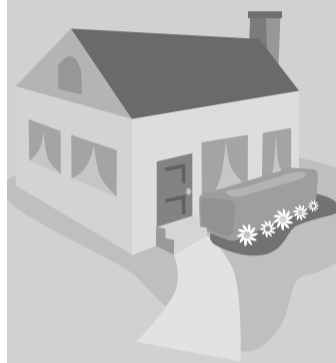
In Potts' newest motion, he says there have been considerable changes to the statute governing sealing of records that he believes makes him eligible for his records to be sealed.

He said the sealing of the records is appropriate because he has "lived a law-abiding life for a significant period of time" and to help Potts "advance in the workforce."

A hearing is scheduled for 8:30 a.m. Wednesday.

Man not allowed to have a gun racks up fourth gun arrest in three years

A man police said was caught with a gun late Thursday on a South Side street racked up his fourth arrest since 2014 for being a felon in illegal possession of a firearm and his second since May 29.

DeMario Hoyt, 22, of Bruce Street, was arraigned Friday in municipal court before Judge Robert Milich on the charge after he was arrested about 10:30 p.m. at

East Myrtle Avenue and Erie Street after he was pulled over for making an improper turn.

A Mahoning County grand jury indicted Hoyt in June on a charge of being a felon in possession of a firearm, and at the time of his arrest he was free on a \$30,000 bond.

Hoyt also has convictions in Mahoning County Common Pleas Court in 2014 and 2016 for being a felon in possession of a firearm. In 2016, he was sentenced to a year in prison. Court records are

Hoyt was pulled over he was searching for his driver's license while also leaning against the side of his door. He gave an officer a wrong Social Security number, and when the officer walked back to Hoyt's car, Hoyt was

confusing, however, as to how much of that sentence he served.

On Thursday, reports said after the officers ordered the people back to their cars, and they obeyed, reports said. Officers also called for backup and a police dog from Campbell because none of the city police dogs was on duty.

The dog sniffed around the car and indicated it

found something near the driver's-side door. When police searched that part of the car, they found a loaded .45-caliber semiautomatic handgun on the floor next to the door, reports said.

On May 29, Hoyt was arrested after police responded about 2:15 a.m. for a report of two people sitting inside a car on East Evergreen Avenue, and Hoyt was in the driver's seat. Reports said officers smelled marijuana coming from the car. When Hoyt was ordered to get out

of the car, police could see a .45-caliber handgun that was later found to be loaded in the side of the driver's door, reports said. Reports said Hoyt was also wearing a bulletproof vest at the time. A grand jury indicted him July 13 on a charge of illegal possession of a weapon.

In the 2014 case, court records show Hoyt was sentenced to probation. He later violated probation, but records do not show what sentence, if any, he received for that violation.

He got caught up in selling drugs so he could make money.

"I finally got the opportunity to be a good father, and I screwed it up," Centeno said. "It makes me feel like less of a man. I threw that all away because of my selfish and irresponsible ways."

Twenty people were indicted in the case, which was investigated by county authorities and the state attorney general's office.

According to the attorney general's office, the ring was supplied with drugs that came from California, Michigan and Arizona and were sometimes shipped by mail to the home addresses of the members, who in turn divided the drugs for street-level dealers to sell.

Prosecutors said the leaders of the ring would make money off selling marijuana and then invest some of that money in obtaining heroin to sell. Centeno, however, did not sell heroin but only marijuana.

Man laments time he will miss with child

A Campbell man said Friday in Mahoning County Common Pleas Court it wasn't the seven-year federal prison sentence he served for selling drugs that got his attention, but the 10 months he served on a probation violation for that charge.

Jonathan Centeno was before Judge Maureen Sweeney to be sentenced on several drug charges — charges that violated his federal probation. He was released on bond from that sentence in June.

Centeno, 32, of Campbell, entered guilty pleas in April to charges of engaging in a pattern of corrupt activity, trafficking in marijuana in the vicinity of a juvenile, two counts of trafficking in marijuana and complicity to trafficking in marijuana. A joint sentencing recommendation called for a four-year prison term with credit for the 10 months Centeno has already served for the

most of his daughter's life. He was just starting to know her again when he was arrested in his state case then went to prison on the probation violation.

"The last few months I went away were the worse of my life," Centeno said.

Prosecutors said Centeno was one of six leaders of a ring that imported drugs from the West to the Youngstown area. Damian Billak, Centeno's attorney, said his client was selling marijuana while other members of the ring were selling heroin.

"He's been in the system before," Billak said.

Centeno said it is his own fault he is going back to prison and will be away from his daughter because

The Public Library of Youngstown and Mahoning County brought Wells to Youngstown to celebrate area children who completed the library's Summer Discovery program's reading requirements.

Wells, the creator of the Max & Ruby children's book series, has worked on more than 130 books, including

historical novels, nursery rhymes and other children's literature.

"These kids are total winners because they've

Judge in murder case OKs motion

The judge in the Nasser Hamad murder case has granted a motion that he rejected the first time, after Hamad's new attorneys cited different case law to bolster their argument.

Atty. Robert Dixon of Cleveland sought to prevent inmates, deputies, corrections officers and other "agents of the state" from engaging Hamad in discussions about his pending aggravated-murder case.

Hamad, 47, of state Route 46 in Howland, is charged with killing two people and injuring three others who came to his house near Eastwood Mall on Feb. 25 in an ongoing dispute. He's accused of shooting the five after a fistfight in his front yard between Hamad and one of the five.

If convicted of certain charges, Hamad could get the death penalty.

The judge said "the surest and clearest means to exercise one's right to remain

silent" is not to speak. But if he chooses to talk about the case, "he does so at his own peril."

Nonetheless, it would be inappropriate for state-associated representatives to attempt to engage him in discussions about the case, Judge Rice said.

"This restriction applies to any so-called 'jail-house snitches' attempting to retrieve information solicited by or on behalf of the state or other law enforcement arm," the judge said.

**Doctors would report
opioid diagnosis
codes under deal**

COLUMBUS

Ohio doctors have reached a tentative agreement with the Kasich administration on a proposed rule requiring them to report the specific diagnosis of every patient who receives a prescription painkiller. Parties to the negotiation said the deal was struck Friday, ahead of a Monday vote. The disputed rule required prescribers to enter what's known as an ICD-10 code into Ohio's online reporting database for every controlled substance prescription. Under the compromise, hospitals and doctors' offices would report codes for opioids right away, but they would have an additional nine months to begin reporting all other controlled substances.

**Pot found in
Ford, Lincoln cars
shipped from Mexico**

WOODHAVEN, MICH.

Federal agents have seized 277 pounds of marijuana concealed in rail cars containing new Ford and Lincoln vehicles recently imported from Mexico. U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement said Thursday the marijuana was found a day earlier by employees at the Ford Rail Distribution Facility in the Detroit suburb of Woodhaven. Federal, state and local officials then searched 200 vehicles. No arrests have been made. ICE did not say where the rail shipment had originated in Mexico or where the cars were produced. ICE said Ford is cooperating fully with the investigation. The Vindicator previously reported that marijuana was found inside the wheel well for a spare tire in a new Ford Fusion that was manufactured in Sonora, Mexico, at a Ford dealership in Kent. Investigators then found 14 packages of marijuana in other Fusions that had all come through a rail yard in Warren.

**British baby Charlie
Gard at center of
legal battle dies**

LONDON

Charlie Gard, the terminally ill British baby at the center of a legal and ethical battle that attracted the attention of Pope Francis and President Donald Trump, died Friday. He was one week shy of his first birthday. Charlie's parents fought for the right to take him to the United States for an experimental medical treatment for his rare genetic disease, mitochondrial depletion syndrome, which left him brain damaged and unable to breathe unaided. His case ended up in the courts when doctors opposed the plan, saying the untested therapy wouldn't help Charlie and might cause him to suffer. A family spokeswoman, Alison Smith-Squire, confirmed Charlie's death on Friday.

**Trump to sign bill
for new sanctions
on Russia**

The White House says President Donald Trump will sign legislation implementing tough new financial sanctions against Russia. White House press secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders says in a statement the president has "reviewed the final version and, based on its responsiveness to his negotiations, approves the bill and intends to sign it." The legislation includes language that bars Trump from easing or waiving the additional penalties on Russia unless Congress agrees. It also imposes financial sanctions against Iran and North Korea. Moscow has responded by ordering a reduction in the number of U.S. diplomats in Russia and closing the U.S. Embassy's recreation retreat.

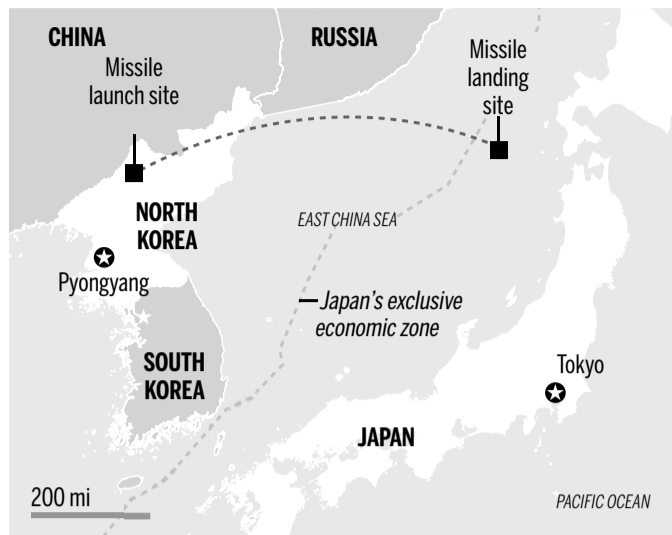
S. Korea to deploy US strategic military assets

PYONGYANG, NORTH KOREA

South Korea says it will deploy strategic U.S. military assets to the Korean Peninsula and consider placing additional launchers of an advanced U.S. anti-missile system on its soil following North Korea's second test-launch of an intercontinental ballistic missile. The latest measures were announced today by South Korean Defense Minister Song Young-moo, hours after the launch left analysts concluding that the mainland U.S. was now within range of North Korean weapons. Song told reporters in Seoul he will discuss with U.S. military commanders

in South Korea temporarily placing additional THAAD launchers. There are currently two THAAD launchers operational in the South and one THAAD battery consists of six. Song did not specify what the strategic assets are, but they usually refer to U.S. stealth bombers and aircraft carriers. Immediately after the launch late Friday evening, U.S. and South Korean forces conducted a live-fire exercise this morning during which they fired missiles off South Korea's east coast. The drill involved the surface-to-surface Army Tactical Missile System and South Korea's Hyunmoo Missile II. Analysts had estimated that the North's first ICBM could have reached Alaska, and said Friday that the latest missile appeared to extend that range significantly.



David Wright, a physicist and co-director of the global security program at the Union of Concerned Sci-

entists, said in Washington that if reports of the missile's maximum altitude and flight time are correct, it would have a theoretical range of at about 6,500 miles. That means it could have reached Los Angeles, Denver and Chicago, depending on variables such as the size and weight of the warhead that would be carried atop such a missile in an actual attack. Bruce Klingner, a Korean and Japanese affairs specialist at the Heritage Foundation think tank in Washington, said, "It now appears that a significant portion of the continental United States is within range" of North Korean missiles.

Vacation blackout

POWER OUTAGE HITS NORTH CAROLINA ISLANDS

A man-made power outage – not an approaching hurricane – forced 10,000 tourists to flee two North Carolina islands and turned summer vacation into a messy nightmare for many. Cars lined up Friday to get on ferries, the only way off Ocracoke Island, after a mandatory evacuation order was announced. Gas stations ran perilously low on fuel and ice, and business owners complained about losing a chunk of their most lucrative time of year due to a construction crew accidentally severing a main transmission line. Without power, air conditioners went silent and ceiling fans stopped humming as extremely humid temperatures reached 80 degrees. "We were really disappointed. You're used to things like this happening from Mother Nature on Ocracoke, but not from human error," said Kivi Leroux Miller, who awoke

in a hot rental house Thursday morning. The Lexington, N.C., resident had to cut short her yearly vacation with her husband and two children, and they were among the last cars on a packed ferry Friday. "There was definitely this sort of sadness with everyone having to leave," she said. Ocracoke and Hatteras Islands went dark Thursday when a construction company building a new bridge between islands drove a steel casing into an underground transmission line. The company, PCL Construction, was digging at the site Friday to determine the extent of the damage. Officials said it could be days or weeks before it's fixed. A better forecast wasn't expected for another day or so. North Carolina Gov. Roy Cooper declared a state of emergency as generators were sent to the islands for the residents who stayed behind.

Officials urged people to use power only for fans and refrigerators. "The situation is stabilizing today thanks to the use of additional portable generators," Cooper said. The islands, which have about 5,000 permanent residents, rely heavily on the summer tourist season for their local economies. "In a seasonal community like Ocracoke, there's three to five months out of the year when most businesses are closed," said Jason Wells, owner of Jason's Restaurant on Ocracoke Island. "So when you take this hit in July and factor in that you're only open eight months out of the year, it's big. It's a lot more than people even realize." Wells said his restaurant, closed by the outage, is missing out on between \$5,000 and \$6,000 a day in sales. His 25 workers typically make between \$75 and \$250 a day.

House moves to extend Veterans Choice program

The House overwhelmingly approved a \$3.9 billion emergency spending package to address a budget shortfall at the Department of Veterans Affairs that threatens medical care for thousands of veterans. The bill provides \$2.1 billion to continue funding the Veterans Choice program, which allows veterans to receive private medical care at government expense. Another \$1.8 billion would go to core VA health programs, including 28 leases for new VA medical facilities. The bill was approved 414-0 Friday and now goes to the Senate. The Choice program was put in place after a 2014 wait-time scandal that was discovered at the Phoenix VA hospital and spread throughout the country. Veterans waited weeks or months for appointments amid phony records that covered up the lengthy

health care for thousands of veterans. A priority of President Donald Trump, the program allows veterans to receive care from outside doctors if they must wait at least 30 days for an appointment or drive more than 40 miles to a VA facility. VA Secretary David Shulkin has warned that without legislative action, the Choice program will run out of money by mid-August, causing delays in

**State fair reopens kiddie,
other low-impact rides**

Rides at the Ohio State Fair's Kiddieland and some elsewhere in the amusement park reopened Friday with the OK of inspectors two days after the governor shut them all down following a thrill ride malfunction that killed a teen who had recently enlisted in the Marines. The 18-year-old man's girlfriend was among seven other people who were injured when the Fire Ball flung riders – some still strapped in seats – through the air Wednesday night. A few people on the midway were hit by debris. The ride's Dutch manufacturer has told operators of the attraction at fairs and festivals worldwide to stop using it until more is learned about what caused the malfunction. Ohio Gov. John Kasich shut down all rides for new inspections after the accident.

Agriculture Department spokesman Mark Bruce said Friday that 28 rides were cleared to resume operations Friday afternoon. Those reopened include the children's carousel, bumper boats and other low-impact attractions including the Giant Slide and SkyGlider. More than half of the fair's rides remained closed. It runs through Aug. 6. Federal and state investigators have begun working to find what caused the wreck on the fair's opening day. Video taken by a bystander of the swinging, spinning Fire Ball ride in action captured a crashing sound. A section holding four riders came apart, and screams could be heard as at least two people were ejected and plunged toward the ground. Other riders were still in their seats as they fell.

**GOP blame
game begins
after health
bill crash**

The resounding Senate crash of the seven-year Republican drive to scrap the Obama health care law incited GOP finger-pointing Friday but left the party with wounded leaders and no evident pathway forward on an issue that won't go away. In an astonishing cliffhanger, the GOP-run Senate voted 51-49 to reject Majority Leader Mitch McConnell's last ditch attempt to sustain their drive to dismantle President Barack Obama's health care overhaul with a starkly trimmed-down bill. The vote, which concluded shortly before 2 a.m., was a blistering defeat for President Donald Trump and McConnell, R-Ky., who've made uprooting the statute a top priority. "They should have approved health care last night," Trump said Friday during a speech in Brentwood, New York. "But you can't have everything," he added, seemingly shrugging off one of his biggest legislative setbacks. Trump reiterated his threat to "let Obamacare implode," an outcome he could hasten by steps such as halting federal payments to help insurers reduce out-of-pocket costs for lower-earning consumers. Senate Democrats were joined in opposition by three Republicans – Maine's Susan Collins, Lisa Murkowski of Alaska and Arizona's John McCain. The 80-year-old McCain, just diagnosed with brain cancer, had returned to the Capitol three days earlier to provide a vote that temporarily kept the measure alive, only to deliver the coup de grace Friday.

OHIO GOV. JOHN R. KASICH DID not mince words in his description of this week's deadly ride accident at the opening day of the 164th Ohio State Fair: "It's a nightmare. It's a terrible situation."

State and county fairs, after all, are designed to be stomping grounds for fun, amusements, entertainment and education for children and adults alike. They are not designed to be breeding grounds for death, injury and destruction.

The accident that killed an 18-year-old Marines enlistee and injured seven others on the Fire Ball ride late Wednesday afternoon shocked the senses of those who witnessed it. As the pendulum ride was swinging riders 40 feet above the midway while spinning them at 13 revolutions per minute, one of the cars broke off, tumbling riders to the ground.

Just what caused that car to break loose remains an anguishing mystery. Operator error? A loose screw? Irresponsible rider behavior?

While it would be satisfying to pinpoint the cause and assign blame to a party found guilty of precipitating the accident, the truth is that it's far too early to point fingers. Thus far in the investigation, however, we are encouraged by the responsible behavior and speedy reactions from virtually all players with stakes in ride safety:

♦ **The governor** immediately ordered all rides shut down at the fair and implemented mandatory new inspections of all of them. Rides reopened Friday.

♦ **KMG**, the Dutch manufacturer of the ride, has ordered all 43 versions of the Fire Ball in use around the world to be shut down until more is known about the cause of the malfunction in Ohio.

♦ **The Ohio Department of Agriculture** and ride company Amusements of America completed at least three thorough inspections of that ride and all others before awarding it a permit. Some rides did not pass muster and were shut down.

FAIRS REMAIN VIABLE

As those and other investigators continue to sort through potential causes of the accident, one victim of the midway crash should not be attendance at the state fair or at county agricultural exhibitions, such as the Columbiana County Fair that officially opens in Lisbon on Monday and runs through Aug. 6.

When put in perspective, injuries and deaths from amusement thrill rides are quite rare. The Consumer Product Safety Commission, for example, reports less than 1 percent of injuries on rides in the U.S. require hospital care. The Outdoor Amusement Business Association says the chances of suffering serious injuries on a thrill ride are 1 in 9 million.

Injuries that do happen often result from those who violate Ohio's Rider Responsibility Law by failing to keep hands and arms inside the ride, not staying seated and holding on or taking selfie photos while the ride is in motion.

Though we could understand why some would want to stay away from the most daring of thrill rides as the investigation plays out, the accident should not keep patrons away from fairs altogether.

After all, amusement rides alone do not a fair make. At next week's fair in Lisbon, for example, there'll be plenty of farm and animal displays, educational exhibits, grandstand concerts and races plus dozens of delectable fair-food concessions.

We therefore encourage robust fair attendance while urging public and private investigators to work tirelessly toward pinpointing the source of the Fire Ball tragedy and doing all possible to ensure it is never repeated on any midway in the world.

Now that we're six months into the presidency of Donald Trump, it's time to make some evaluations.

On the economy, we've seen some important strides made. Markets have hit record highs – several times in recent days. Unemployment stands at 4.4 percent, down from 4.9 percent a year ago. Oil prices have remained stable, resulting in an average gasoline price of \$2.25 per gallon nationwide. That's only 5 cents more than a year ago.

Some economic indicators have been mixed, such as retail sales and housing. Other indicators, like the expanding trade deficit (likely to be more than \$500 billion this year) and economic growth (which slowed in the first quarter to 1.4 percent gross domestic product), are less positive.

On the president's policy proposals, not much progress has been made. There's only been a scant one-pager issued on tax reform. And with the president's trillion-dollar infrastructure idea, a mere six-pager is all that's been released. Both of these initiatives, if carried out correctly, would go a long way toward positively propelling the economy.

As for repealing and replacing the Affordable Care Act, aka Obamacare, a bill has passed the House of Representatives, but the Senate's efforts have come up short.

On the president's proposed border wall between the U.S. and Mexico, there's been no visible progress.

The single congressional feather in the president's cap is the confirmation by the Senate of his Supreme Court nominee, Judge Neil Gorsuch.

Trump not doing better is noteworthy given the Republicans (the president's party) have majorities of both houses of Congress. The circumstances won't get any easier in the short-term.

TOUGH TASKS

New tough tasks that lie ahead include the fiscal year-end budget battle and the need to increase the debt ceiling (both to be voted upon around the end of September).

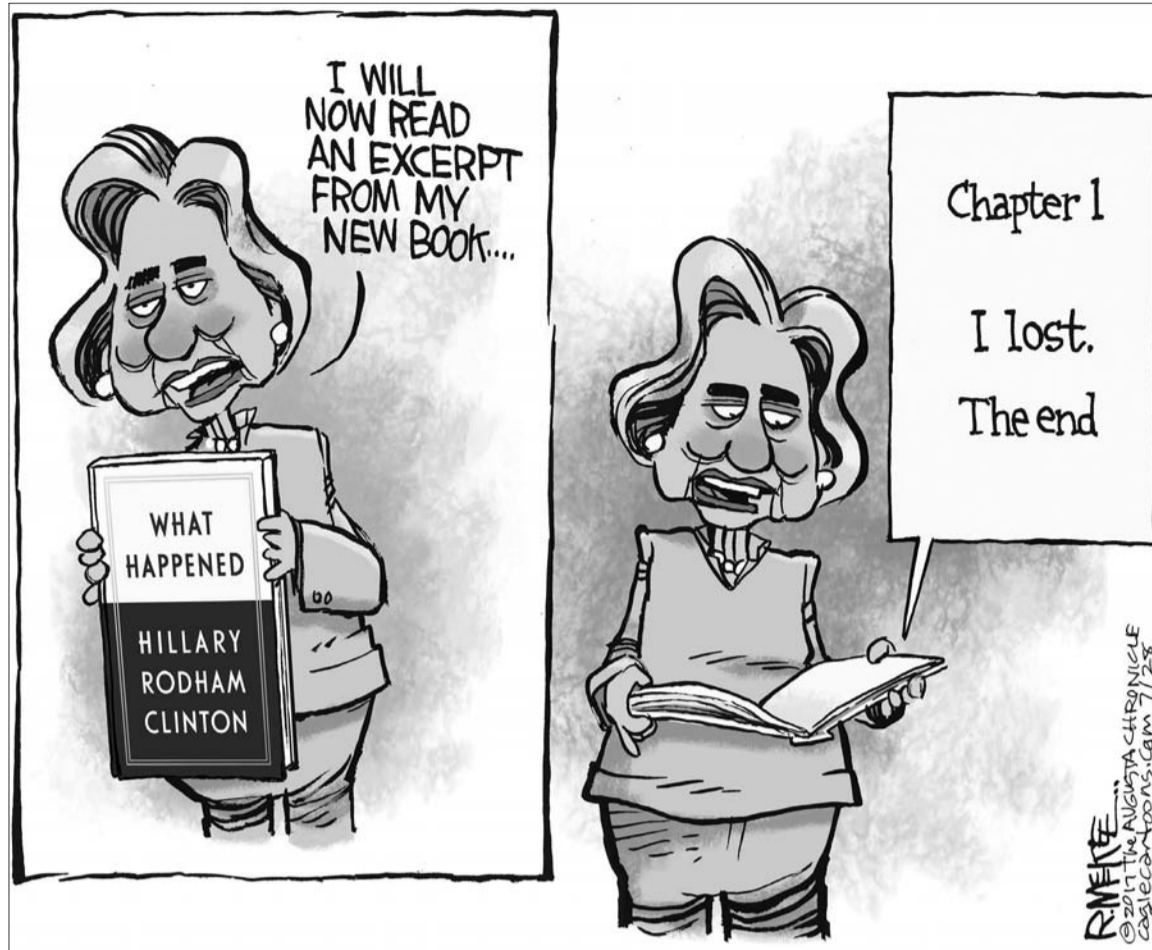
Investigations into Russian election tampering and potential collusion between the Trump campaign and Russians continue to dog the president. And while Trump and his spokespeople continue to insist nothing untoward took place, facts continue to be discovered that clearly cast doubt on such assertions. At this time, it's uncertain what, if anything, will result from the investigations underway by Congress and the Department of Justice's special counsel.

To complicate matters more, the president hasn't had the honeymoon period normally enjoyed by new presidents. Even some Republicans have been critical. Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., recently said an idea of the president's was one of the "dumbest" ever. A recent ABC News/*Washington Post* poll revealed only a 36 percent job approval rating (down from 42 percent in April), which is a 70-year low for presidents at this point in their tenure.

On geopolitics, the president has made some important progress. He started off strong with world leaders, hosting several in the U.S. and meeting many more on his foreign forays to the Middle East and Europe. On the negative side, North Korea has pursued belligerent behavior both in terms of its warmongering rhetoric aimed at the U.S. and the testing and proliferation of nuclear weapons.

In sum, while there have been glimmers and gleams of positives for the Trump presidency – and there's potential for many more – it's nonetheless been a fairly bad beginning.

Now that President Donald Trump has had his fun with the Boy Scouts, it's up to their parents to clean up his mess.

Many critics of the president's campaign-rally-disguised-as-a-jamboree address called on the Boy Scouts to denounce the rhetoric.

(Trump encouraged booing of former President Barack Obama and former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, lamented the lack of loyalty in Washington, bragged about his "so red it was unbelievable" election night map, threatened to fire some people, trashed the media as fake and promised to bring back "Merry Christmas," among other delights.)

On Tuesday morning, the Boy Scouts released a statement saying, essentially, "No harm, no foul."

"The Boy Scouts of America is wholly nonpartisan and does not promote any one position, products, service, political candidate or philosophy," it reads. "The invitation for the sitting U.S. president to visit the National Jamboree is a longstanding tradition and is in no way an endorsement of any political party or specific policies."

Now the parents of those 40,000 Scouts have some explaining to do to their kids – even if they (the parents or the kids) loved the speech.

If I had a Boy Scout, I would say something along these lines:

"What a cool experience to stand with the Boy Scouts and

have the president of the United States address you. I'm really proud of you for the hard work it took you to get to that moment.

"Some of your peers might have really enjoyed what the president was saying, and some of them might not have. Some of them might need some time to decide how they feel about what he said. It can be hard to really think about a person's words and what they truly mean when a crowd is chanting and cheering. You sort of get the impression that the words are true and inspiring, even when they're not.

"What I mostly want to talk about is how the president made it sound as though the Scouts are a group separate and apart from the rest of America. He tried to pit you guys against other people – grown-ups who've served their country nobly, people who don't vote the way he does, people who don't worship the way he does.

'NOT YOUR ENEMIES'

"Those people are not your enemies. They are your fellow Americans. Some of them are your fellow Scouts.

"People with a lot of power, especially people terrified of losing their power, will often flatter you to get you to start thinking and acting like them. You'll see it at school when someone's trying to talk you into breaking a rule or mistreating a classmate. You'll see it at work when you're older. You'll see it in politics.

"It's tempting to succumb to that flattery – to think that this powerful person sees something special in you and really wants your unique talents and

traits on his team. And that may be true.

"But you have to decide if it's a team you want to join.

"You have to listen closely to the powerful person's words. Is he talking about treating everyone fairly? Is he talking about setting aside differences and working toward a common goal? Are his ideas ones that you would be proud to make happen – proud to tell us you made happen?

"Or is he mostly talking about how the people who aren't on his team are losers? Losers who aren't worth your time or your concern?

"That winners vs. losers path can be a dangerous, lonely one to start down. Think long and hard about whether you want to win the favor of someone who divides a place – any place – into people worth respecting and people who aren't.

"Lots of presidents have spoken to the National Scout Jamboree. President Harry Truman, in his speech, said America 'is striving to build a world in which men will live as good neighbors and work for the good of all.'

"That's a pretty good yardstick. That's the kind of team I hope you'll seek out and join. Because then, whether your team wins or loses, you can be proud of what you worked toward, how you conducted yourself and in what sort of shape you left the place – whether that place is your troop, your school, your workplace or your country."

Donald Trump – who seemed to be trying to intimidate the Justice Department and the special counsel in a *New York Times* interview – is reportedly considering a variety of dramatic moves against the Russia investigation, perhaps including firing special counsel Robert Mueller (something many have been reporting on for some time) and pardoning members of his family, campaign and administration (something which, up to now, appeared to be just the speculation of some of the most hair-on-fire observers).

These are extremely fraught waters for the president to travel in. It's certainly possible that this is just more bluster. But it's also possible he'll act. If so, here's the legal and constitutional situation, as I understand it – with the major caveat that much of this is untested. Presidents just haven't done these things.

The issue with firing Mueller is that he was hired, and probably must be fired, by Deputy Attorney General Rod Rosenstein, who is the acting attorney general for all matters in this case as Attorney General Jeff

Sessions has recused himself.

Trump could fire Rosenstein. It's not clear, however, whether he could find anyone in the chain of command willing to fire Mueller. I suppose Trump also could attempt to fire Mueller directly despite not having the authority to do so, which would be something close to a constitutional crisis; presumably, the courts would have to rule whether Mueller was fired lawfully, and then we would see whether Trump would defy the courts as well.

CONSTITUTIONAL POWER

The issue with pardons is a little clearer, at least to begin with. The constitutional power to pardon for federal crimes (even if no one has yet been charged) is essentially absolute, with the main question being whether the president can pardon himself. The constraint on this power is political, not legal.

Pardoning those around him might be great for them, but it wouldn't necessarily help Trump. That's because removing them from legal jeopardy would also remove the protection of the Fifth Amendment: Because they could no longer incriminate themselves, they could be compelled to testify in court or in Congress and

be held in contempt if they refused, or charged with perjury if they lied. At least, it appears that is the case. What's more, once they had been pardoned, they would have little incentive to stay silent.

Whatever the answers to all of those questions, the big picture is that Trump has already obstructed justice; he did that just by firing FBI Director James Comey for continuing the Russia investigation, and he further obstructed justice by threatening those properly conducting the investigation today. But impeachment and removal of a president is a severe remedy, one that should be used only when necessary.

Up to this point (and pending potential further information to be revealed), there are strong arguments that even if Trump has acted criminally, it still hasn't reached that point of necessity. Pre-emptive pardons? Firing the investigator? That's when obstruction moves from something that could be perhaps overlooked to, well, something that really would have to be countered in order to ensure the rule of law.

Wells Fargo in another scandal

Scandal-plagued Wells Fargo is back in hot water for signing customers up for products they didn't need or want. This time it's auto insurance, and the bank says it may have cost about 20,000 people their cars.

San Francisco-based Wells Fargo acknowledged late Thursday that it enrolled roughly 570,000 auto-loan borrowers for what's known as collateral production insurance on their vehicles when the customers already had appropriate insurance. It will pay \$80 million in refunds and account adjustments to those people.

"We take full responsibility for our failure ... and are extremely sorry for any harm this caused our customers, who expect and deserve better from us," said Franklin Codel, the head of Wells Fargo Consumer Lending, in a statement.

Wisconsin governor calls special session on Foxconn deal

MADISON, WIS.
A wide array of Wisconsin environmental regulations would be waived in an effort to speed up construction of a \$10 billion Foxconn electronics factory under a proposal Gov. Scott Walker unveiled Friday.

Walker called on the Republican-controlled Legislature to consider the measure as early as Tuesday. It also would borrow \$252 million to finish rebuilding Interstate 94, which connects Milwaukee with Chicago and runs near where the massive display panel factory is expected to be built.

The plant would be the first outside of Asia to produce liquid crystal display monitors used in computers, televisions and other areas. Walker calls it a once-in-a-generation opportunity to transform Wisconsin's economy.

FDA to target nicotine levels in cigarettes

For the first time, the federal government is proposing cutting the nicotine level in cigarettes so they aren't so addictive.

U.S. Food and Drug Administration chief Scott Gottlieb on Friday directed the agency's staff to develop new regulations on nicotine. The FDA has had the power since 2009 to regulate nicotine levels but hasn't done so. Stocks of cigarette makers plunged after the announcement.

As part of the new strategy, the FDA is giving e-cigarette makers four more years to comply with a review of products already on the market, Gottlieb said.

Consumer spending continues to fuel growth

The U.S. economy revved up this spring after a weak start to the year, fueled by a surge in consumer spending. But the growth spurt still fell short of the optimistic goals President Donald Trump hopes to achieve through tax cuts and regulatory relief.

The Commerce Department said Friday that growth in the gross domestic product, the economy's total output of goods and services, expanded at a 2.6 percent annual rate in the April-June quarter. That's more than double the revised 1.2 percent pace in the first quarter.

The improvement was powered in large part by

robust consumer appetite for items such as clothing and furniture.

The 2.6 percent GDP gain came in close to economists' expectations.

"Consumers continue to drive the economy's growth, but firmer business investment is also a plus," said Mark Zandi, chief economist at Moody's Analytics. "Weaker housing construction was the only significant drag on growth in the quarter."

Trump campaigned on a pledge to boost growth to rates of 4 percent or better. So far, his economic program has not advanced in Congress. But on Friday he still hailed the latest acceleration in growth.

"GDP is up double from

what it was in the first quarter - 2.6 percent," Trump told a crowd in New York. "We're doing really well. And we took off all those restrictions."

Trump told the crowd he was proud that he had appointed wealthy people to his Cabinet, including Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross and Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin.

"I want a rich guy at the head of Treasury. I want a rich guy at the head of Commerce," Trump told the audience on Long Island. "We've been screwed so badly on trade deals. I want people that made a lot of money now to make a lot of money for our country."

FirstEnergy reports profit of \$174M in 2nd quarter

FirstEnergy Corp. on Friday reported second-quarter 2017 earnings of \$174 million on revenue of \$3.3 billion.

These results compared with a loss of \$1.1 billion for the second quarter of 2016 on revenue of \$3.4 billion.

"We are pleased with the continued solid performance of our regulated businesses in the second quarter, reflecting our customer-focused growth initiatives," said Charles E. Jones, FirstEnergy president and chief executive officer, in a statement. "We remain on track to achieve the operating earnings guidance we outlined earlier this year."

In FirstEnergy's regulated distribution business, second-quarter 2017 earnings increased compared with the prior-year period as a result of new rates that went into effect in Ohio, Pennsylvania and New Jersey in January, which offset lower weather-related distribution deliveries and higher operating and maintenance and depreciation expenses.

Total distribution deliveries decreased 0.7 percent compared with the second quarter of 2016, primarily due to the impact of milder weather on residential and commercial sales.

In the regulated transmission business, earnings increased compared with the second quarter of 2016 as a result of higher transmission revenues, which offset higher operating expenses.

In the competitive energy services segment, results improved compared with the prior year period due to lower asset impairment and plant exit costs as compared with the second quarter of 2016.

PUCO suggests surcharges to help Y-town Thermal

The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio's staff has recommended surcharges for Youngstown Thermal customers the commission board will review Wednesday.

The staff determined there needed to be emergency surcharges on a fixed customer-charge basis for the months of July, August and September.

"The fixed charge is necessary to assure the minimum amount of revenue during the reduced usage period of the summer to pay essential expenses," the staff wrote in a report issued Friday.

Essential expenses needed to be covered include payroll and employees' health care expenses.

Last week, PUCO voted during a special meeting to establish the emergency surcharge on rates for Youngstown Thermal customers.

Youngstown Thermal is a downtown Youngstown utilities company that uses steam for heating and cooling. The commission's report lists 45 customers on the company's system - 41 heating customers and four cooling customers.

Carl Avers, chief executive officer of Youngstown Thermal, contacted PUCO, a state regulator, in June about a potential "energy crisis" in downtown Youngstown due to the company's inability to meet expenses, such as payroll, in a timely manner.

The loss of a major customer in Youngstown State

University and four customers not paying their bills are some of the factors that led to Youngstown Thermal's financial struggle.

The financial struggle led PUCO to ask the Ohio Attorney General's office to file a complaint to seek a receiver to take over the company and get its finances in order. The commission and Youngstown Thermal are to review receivers that could be appointed.

The case has been assigned to Judge R. Scott Krichbaum of Mahoning County Common Pleas Court. A status hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m. Aug. 11.

Youngstown Thermal told PUCO it needs about \$199,000 every month to meet its essential expenses, including payroll.

In its report issued Friday, the PUCO staff recommends the 45 unnamed customers be charged a minimum of \$100 each.

After the minimum customer charge, the staff allocated remaining payroll and health care expenses based on peak demand. The PUCO staff calculated each customer's percentage contribution to the peak demand month for 2016, then each customer's contribution was applied to the monthly payroll and health care costs to determine a monthly surcharge.

No. 3 overall pick signs contract SANTA CLARA, CALIF.

The San Francisco 49ers have signed No. 3 overall pick Solomon Thomas and now have all 10 of the team's 2017 draft picks under contract. San Francisco general manager John Lynch had been encouraged the deal could get done ahead of the team's first training camp practice Friday. The defensive lineman out of Stanford, who got a four-year deal, was one of two first-round picks for the 49ers this year. The other, linebacker Reuben Foster, had signed previously and was cleared to go after missing the offseason program rehabilitating his injured right shoulder. Adding urgency to Thomas' situation was the fact that he missed the offseason program because Stanford was still in session until after the end of minicamp. Thomas played three seasons at Stanford, registering 101 tackles, 11.5 sacks, 25.5 tackles for loss, four fumble recoveries and two touchdowns.

LA RAMS

All-Pro Aaron Donald a no-show at training camp IRVINE, CALIF.

All-Pro defensive lineman Aaron Donald has not reported to the Los Angeles Rams' training camp, and general manager Les Snead says the club will continue negotiations on a contract extension. Donald didn't join his veteran teammates in reporting to UC Irvine on Friday. The fourth-year pro also skipped several weeks of offseason workouts while his agent worked on a new deal that will make him one of the highest-paid players in the NFL. Snead says the Rams weren't completely surprised that Donald didn't show up, but were hopeful he would decide to join his teammates and rookie coach Sean McVay. Donald is one of the best defensive players in football, making the last two All-Pro teams as a disruptive pass-rusher and run-stopper.

TITANS

Team extends pro-bowl DT Jurrell Casey NASHVILLE, TENN.

The Tennessee Titans have agreed to a multi-year extension with two-time Pro Bowl defensive tackle Jurrell Casey. The team announced the extension Friday as the Titans went through their conditioning test. Casey still had two seasons remaining on his current contract. ESPN reported Casey received a four-year, \$60.4 million extension. General manager Jon Robinson says it's rare to do an extension this early, but calls Casey someone they want to keep around for years. The Titans drafted Casey in the third round in 2011. He has missed only two games, playing in 94 with 33 sacks, 41 tackles for loss and 106 quarterback pressures. He is the team's first back-to-back Pro Bowl defensive player since Albert Haynesworth in 2007-08.

COWBOYS

Dallas suspends defensive lineman Damontre' Moore OXNARD, CALIF.

A third Dallas Cowboys defensive lineman will miss the start of the season because of a suspension. The NFL said Friday that defensive end Damontre' Moore has been suspended without pay for the first two games of the regular season for violating the league's substance-abuse policy. Defensive end David Irving and defensive tackle Randy Gregory already were suspended. Moore, an offseason addition, worked out with the Cowboys during training camp last year but wasn't signed then because of concerns over some off-the-field issues. Irving will miss the first four games for violating the NFL's policy against performance-enhancing drugs. Randy Gregory, a second-round pick who slid in the 2015 draft because of concerns over marijuana use, could miss the entire season for multiple violations of the substance abuse policy. Cornerback Nolan Carroll, a free agent pickup from Philadelphia, faces a two-game ban over his arrest on a drunken-driving charge earlier this year.

confidence that indicates he knows he belongs.

"The way that they've thrown me into the fire in the last couple months has been one that has allowed me to grow quickly and to become comfortable pretty fast," he said before Friday's workout. "It's (the starting job) out of my hands, and I look forward to just trying to play well when my time does come."

It may be here soon.

The second-round pick is competing with veterans Cody Kessler and Brock Osweiler to be Cleveland's Week 1 starter, a job that has been mostly a part-time gig in recent years because of injuries and roster shake-ups.

But while Kizer lacks the experience of Osweiler (13 NFL wins) or Kessler (eight career starts), the 6-foot-4, 233-pounder appears to have all the necessary tools to handle starting duties.

At Notre Dame, Kizer played on a big stage nearly every week, and Fighting Irish coach Brian Kelly prepared him for the scrutiny he'll get as a pro by demand-

ing perfection on every play.

The Browns, who have been in a nearly constant search for a franchise quarterback for most of the past 20 years, aren't going to rush Kizer into the lineup. However, coach Hue Jackson and his staff won't hold him back if they feel Kizer gives them the best chance against the Pittsburgh Steelers on Sept. 10.

Just last season, Philadelphia started rookie Carson Wentz and Dallas pushed Dak Prescott onto the field for their openers. It's possible the Browns may do the same with Kizer, whose goal is to start — now or in the near future.

"There's multiple ways of getting there," Kizer said. "This is an awesome environment to learn and develop. Coach Jackson's had a lot of success with quarterbacks and developing quarterbacks and to have the veteran offensive line, it's a great opportunity for me to learn as much as I can to hopefully have some success early — if that time has come."

Kizer isn't skipping any steps in his development. Following minicamp, the 21-year-old spent five weeks

in California working with Kessler quarterback guru Tom House, who helped him fine-tune his throwing mechanics.

He also picked the brains of NFL QBs Matt Ryan, Matt Stafford and Blake Bortles, hoping to learn all he could about his new profession.

"I was able to kind of be a fly on the wall to guys who have had a lot of success," Kizer said. "Matt Ryan's a guy who obviously was the MVP and has shown that he's headed in the right direction to be a great quarterback."

"Some of the things that he does within his workouts I like to emulate myself. He's a guy who's all about quality over quantity and takes every rep seriously."

Osweiler, who went 8-6 with Houston last season, has already noticed a major change in Kizer and has been impressed with his quick growth.

"DeShone is a tremendous quarterback," he said. "He just keeps getting better and better. He's in great shape physically. He's really on the screws when it comes to his playbook. The kid has a big arm. There's not a throw he can't make. He has a ton of talent. I'm very excited to see what he does."

level of his chosen profession.

There were no tears when Conner arrived at Saint Vincent College on Thursday to start training camp. No moment in the dorm room he's sharing with second-round pick Juju Smith-Schuster to think about just how far he's come.

If Conner is being honest, he's ready to move on. While his spirited and ultimately one-sided battle with lymphoma in 2015 and 2016 turned the former Pitt star into a role model, made (hash)ConnerStrong very much a thing and turned his No. 30 Steelers jersey into a hot seller before he even signed his contract now he sees himself as just another rookie trying to make it.

"There's no emotion (about) being a cancer survivor and everything," Conner said Friday as the Steelers opened camp. "I'm a good football player. All the emotional part, 'Oh wow, I'm in the NFL,' that's all behind me."

The 22-year-old is only focused on what's ahead, namely trying to get a firm grasp of the intricacies of offensive coordinator Todd Haley's playbook and developing a rapport with quarterback Ben Roethlisberger. With Pro Bowler Le'Veon Bell yet to sign his franchise tag-tender and report to camp, Conner and former Kansas City Chiefs backup Knile Davis find themselves splitting carries with the starters.

Conner understands he's not Bell. Then again, neither is anyone else in the NFL.

"He set the bar, he definitely set the bar high with his

receiving and his running ability and his pass blocking, in every category to me he's the best running back in the game," Conner said. "I've got to get in a rhythm. It'll give me an opportunity to work with Ben a little bit so there's no drop-off in the rhythm when Bell comes out of the game."

Conner, wearing yellow game pants rather than shorts (a habit he picked up from Pittsburgh All-Pro wide receiver Antonio Brown), spent two soggy hours on Friday darting all over the field. When he wasn't working with the punt protection unit, he was lining up in the slot — yes, in the slot — drilling the team's 2-1-1 drill or setting up behind Roethlisberger then trying to weave his way through a sea of arms, legs churning all the while.

During one sequence Conner headed left, cut right and lowered his shoulders then kept right on chugging 60 yards to the end zone long

after coaches had whistled the play dead. Following a hamstring injury that limited him during organized team activities and minicamp, Conner is only too eager to show he's more than just a feel-good story.

"The slogan here is 'the best ability is availability,'" Conner said. "It's a moving train as Coach T says, so hop on. We get in what we put in."

Even if what Conner has put in over the last two years has been a little more than most. He was the reigning ACC Player of the Year when he tore the MCL in his right knee in Pitt's 2015 season opener before being diagnosed with Hodgkin's lymphoma around Thanksgiving. Six months of energy-sapping, mettle-testing chemotherapy followed, then another six months of proving he was all the way back during his redshirt junior season with the Panthers.

Consider the Steelers believers.

IndyCar leader back at Mid-Ohio

A year ago, Scott Dixon came to one of his favorite courses and had one of the most trying weekends of his racing career.

A five-time winner at the Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course, Dixon faced reporters two days before the race and, along with his team owner, discussed having Target pull its sponsorship of Chip Ganassi Racing at the end of the season after 27 years.

That media event was followed by Dixon's last-place finish 48 hours later in the Honda Indy 200 because of mechanical issues.

He's in a much better spot entering the race Sunday at Mid-Ohio.

The 37-year-old New Zealander leads the IndyCar standings with 423 points, three more than Team Penske's Helio Castroneves.

A new main sponsor (NTT Data) wasn't the only change for Dixon's No. 9 car this year. After three seasons with Chevrolet, Ganassi has returned to Honda engines.

"We had a really big offseason but it was a positive to have such a change," he said. "We were getting, not complacent, but we were continuing to do the same things over and over. So it was nice to have almost like a shiny new toy that we could change our approach to how we mechanically set up the car to how we approach race weekend."

He won at Road America in Wisconsin on June 25 and has 11 top-10 finishes in 12 races, including five podium appearances.

Dixon won on Mid-Ohio's

13-turn, 2,258-mile course in 2007, '09, '11, 12 and '14 and has nine top-10 finishes in 12 starts at the track.

"It's similar to a lot of the tracks I grew up driving in New Zealand," he said Friday. "It's quite an aggressive track. You can get a lot out of it by building on each lap. The track likes sort of loose or neutral cars, so if you like an under-steering car you struggle here a lot more. It's the balance of a having a car I prefer that is better suited here, but it's also the team is very good here."

It hasn't hurt that Chip Ganassi Racing has 10 victories at Mid-Ohio, although Dixon's three years ago was the last.

Dixon, sixth in points last season, won't give up the points lead easily even with Team Penske holding the second through fifth positions.

"He's extremely under-appreciated," driver Ryan Hunter-Reay said. "I think he's a legend, what he's accomplished. I don't want to say too much because I'm racing against him every weekend but it's amazing what he's been able to accomplish through the years."

Dixon's 41 wins, including the 2008 Indianapolis 500, are the most among active IndyCar drivers. He has also won season points championships in 2003, '08, '13, and '15.

"I love being able to do what I do in the sport I love," he said. "IndyCar is a very unique series with many different disciplines — short ovals, speedways, of course the street courses. It's a very difficult championship to win."

Byron's run fuels speculation NEWTON, IOWA

For now, William Byron's future is in the NASCAR Xfinity series. If he keeps racing as he has, he'll likely find himself in a Monster Cup ride soon enough. Byron and the No. 9 JR Motorsports team, in partnership with Hendrick Motorsports, have dominated the Xfinity series the past six weeks. The 19-year-old Byron has three wins and two more top-three finishes over his last six races. That success, combined with Kasey Kahne's uncertain future in the No. 5 Cup car for Hendrick, heightened speculation that Byron could fill one of Hendrick's four planned Cup spots in 2018. But owner Rick Hendrick ended such talk last weekend, saying Byron would be back in the Xfinity series next season. On Saturday, Byron will race at Iowa Speedway, the site of his first series win last month. "For me, the focus is on having fast race cars and doing the best we can each week. I'm not worried about what the future holds or when that time comes," Byron said. "It's about trying to go out there and compete for wins and prove myself at this level."

Target will leave NASCAR at the end of this season after 16 years with Chip Ganassi Racing. Target had served as the primary sponsor for Cup driver Kyle Larson

since his debut in 2013. The 24-year-old Larson has emerged as one of the brightest young stars in NASCAR and has two wins and nine top-10 finishes this season. His success wasn't enough to keep Target interested in racing. The Minneapolis-based retail giant left Ganassi and IndyCar at the end of last season following a 27-year run. Target says it will focus its sports sponsorship on soccer.

Ricciardo dominates practice BUDAPEST, HUNGARY

Red Bull driver Daniel Ricciardo posted the fastest time in the first practice session for the Hungarian Grand Prix on Friday. The Australian driver was 0.234 seconds quicker than Ferrari's Kimi Raikkonen and 0.372 ahead of Lewis Hamilton's Mercedes on the Hungaroring circuit. Red Bull's Max Verstappen was fourth, followed by Hamilton's teammate Valtteri Bottas and Raikkonen's teammate Sebastian Vettel. On a circuit that reduces power output because of its tight and twisting nature, the Red Bulls should be confident of getting closer to Ferrari and Mercedes in terms of race speed. Vettel leads Hamilton by one point overall heading into Sunday's race. The 4.4-kilometer (2.7-mile) track nestled in rolling hills just outside of Budapest was a bit slippery despite warm and sunny conditions.

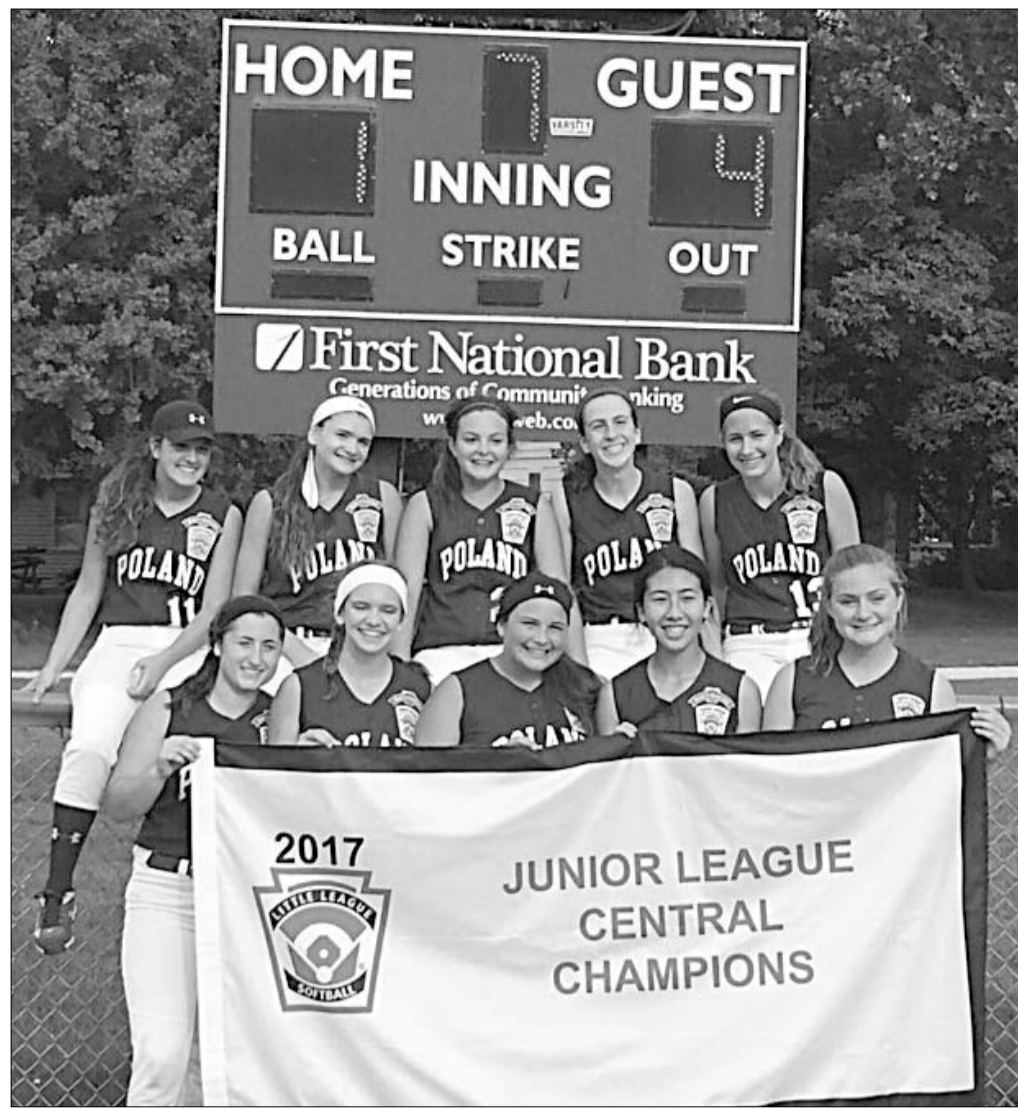

U.S. Olympic champion captures gold at Worlds

BUDAPEST, HUNGARY
Simone Manuel felt the pressure of being an Olympic champion. It sure didn't bother her at the world championships.

The 20-year-old Texan backed up her historic victory in Rio de Janeiro by rallying to beat Sweden's world-record holder Sarah Sjöström in the 100-meter freestyle Friday.

Hey, when you've got two older brothers, you're used to playing catch-up.

"It's kind of been ingrained in me," said Manuel, who edged Sjöström on the final stroke. "I want to win, and I've been training to do that this whole time."

Last summer, Manuel became the first African-American woman to win an individual swimming gold at the Olympics when she tied Canada's Penny Oleksiak for the top spot on the podium.

"It was a lot of pressure knowing that I was the Olympic gold medalist in that event," Manuel said. "I had a lot of nerves."

Another U.S. Olympic champion came up short in his bid for an individual gold in Budapest.

Ryan Murphy settled for silver in the 200 backstroke behind Russia's Evgeny Rylov, while another American, Jacob Pebley, took the bronze.

Murphy swept the backstroke events last summer

in Rio, but he hasn't been quite as sharp in Budapest. He took bronze in the 100 and simply couldn't catch Rylov in the longer event, the Russian finishing in 1 minute, 53.61 second to beat Murphy by a comfortable 0.60 seconds.

"There's definitely disappointment," Murphy said. "I want to be the guy that's finishing first, and I want to be the guy that has the top time in the world. So it definitely stings a little bit, coming out of this meet and not having done that in either race. But it's a long way to 2020."

It was a huge night for the Russians, who captured two other individual golds and grabbed a silver in the men's 4x200 free relay behind Britain.

Yulia Efimova bested American rival Lilly King

in the women's 200 breaststroke, easing a bit of the sting from two silvers in Rio and another loss to King in the 100 breast at Budapest.

In the men's 200 breast, Anton Chupkov held off a pair of Japanese swimmers to claim the world title. Yasuhiro Koseki and Ippei Watanabe snagged the silver and bronze.

Efimova pulled away on the final lap to win by more than 2 seconds over another American, Bethany Galat. China's Shi Jinglin grabbed the bronze over a fading King, who slipped to fourth after setting a blistering pace early in the race as she always does.

But King is a 100 specialist and still struggling to master the longer race. There was no holding off Efimova, whose winning time was 2:19.64.

That's a lot of days. But the 23,496 sunrises during my lifetime haven't dulled the sheer appreciation I feel for the new opportunity the next one will present.

Sunrises are always a blessing. But the days when I'm on the water with fishing rod in hand as the sun burns over the trees top them all.

I've been on the water with rod in hand as dusk turned to darkness and the sensation within is that a good thing is coming to an end. At sunset, most days, I'm content.

At dawn, however, my outlook is full of hope, confidence and excitement.

Sunday at the lake, I shared the BassCat with Cody Luknis. Like another recent tournament trip during which Jeff Grope was riding shotgun, I was in the boat with a brother of kindred spirit.

Luknis and Grope are among the growing corps of competitive collegiate anglers. They are Youngstown State University Penguins, representing their school as proudly on the water as the football players and other YSU athletes represent on their fields of play. They and fellow Penguin fishers Jared Latone and Jonathan Creed joined Youngstown-based Mohawk Valley Bass Club recently to broaden their bass tournament experience.

The young anglers bring a fresh brand of enthusiasm to local tournament angling. Cody's positive outlook was evident the moment he stepped aboard the boat. In black Sharpie ink on the back of his hand were three bold letters: PMA. Positive Mental Attitude.

Let me pause to say that even after 23,496 sunrises, it's still pretty easy to burst with PMA as I shove off the dock. The challenge is to stay positive as the day grinds on.

Sunday was not a grind. On the contrary, I was more than pleased with the fish I hooked on buzzbaits, spinnerbaits and Texas-rigged plastics throughout the eight hours.

Fishing was great, but so was the opportunity to learn more about my friend. Cody is a tall man who moves about the boat with the grace of a fellow who's spent time on a basketball court. He skipped baits expertly into the hideyholes where big bass are known to lurk and displayed the skills of a tournament angler with more experience than might be expected based on the few years he's got under his belt.

One cool thing about sharing the boat with a friend is you get to learn more than your eyes might see.

We talked throughout our eight hours on the lake and I discovered he's a graduate of Austintown Fitch now pursuing a degree in nursing at YSU. He's also enlisted in the U.S. Air Force Reserves and will serve as a flight nurse. In the meantime, he's employed by Second Harvest Food Bank.

Cody is from a fishing family and his stories about outings with parents, grandparents, uncles and siblings made the impact of their influence clearly evident.

It hit me again as I drove home after my day with Cody that there is much about our world that is good. As long as we have eager young people with positive mental attitudes, we are going to be OK.

After 23,496 sunrises, I might be excused if sometime soon I wonder why I have bothered to get out bed that morning.

But I'll get positive quickly when I think of that tall young man wearing the big red Y on the front of his shirt while helping to feed the hungry people of the Mahoning Valley and pursuing his dream of serving as a flight nurse.

Funny the inspiration that a simple PMA scrawled on the back of a hand might create.

Lost bird rediscovered in Venezuela

It's often been said that extinction is forever, but sometimes that label can be applied prematurely. Consider the 7½-inch-long Tachira Antpitta. It has not been seen since the mid-1950s, when ornithologists first recorded and described it. The International Union for Conservation of Nature lists the species as Critically Endangered, and many feared it was extinct.

That natural history mystery has now been solved, and the news is good. An international team of researchers working deep in the mountainous forests of western Venezuela have rediscovered the Tachira Antpitta, a plump, short-tailed brown bird not seen since it was first recorded in the 1950s.

Last year, scientists from the Red Siskin Initiative (www.redsiskin.org) — a conservation partnership between the Smithsonian and several scientific organizations in Venezuela — organized a team to search for the antpitta. The

team was led by Jhonathan Miranda of RSI and included colleagues Alejandro Nagy, Peter Bichier of the University of California at Santa Cruz and Miguel Lentino and Miguel Matta of the Coleccion Ornitologica Phelps. The American Bird Conservancy (https://abcbirds.org/wp-admin/abcbirds.org) provided financial support as part of its ongoing "Search for Lost Birds" (https://abcbirds.org/birds/lost-birds).

The team set out in June 2016 knowing that several factors were likely to make the antpitta especially challenging to find, if in fact it still existed. The species inhabits dense undergrowth at altitudes of 5,000 to 7,000 feet in a rugged and hard-to-reach region of the Andes. It is difficult to see, much less identify visually. This antpitta differs in coloration only subtly from related species.

On the other hand, antpittas are easier to hear than to see, but with no recordings of their voices,

nobody knew what to listen for.

From personal experience, I know that antpittas are notoriously difficult to see in their preferred dense jungle habitat. In 2011, a local guide led me on a jungle hike to see antpittas in Ecuador. We saw four different species. However, if I had been alone, I doubt I would have found even one.

Fortunately, the team searching for the Tachira Antpitta in Venezuela had one advantage. They knew where to look. "We followed the route described in the earlier expedition's field notebooks to locate the original site of the discovery," Miranda said.

To reach the remote location, part of what is now El Tama National Park, the team traveled by foot on steep and narrow Andean trails, with a mule train

to carry its gear. From its campsite, the team hiked two hours in the dark to reach appropriate habitat at dawn, the best time to hear the birds sing.

The first day there, Miranda and Nagy heard the distinctive song of an antpitta they had not heard before. "We were thrilled to re-find the Tachira Antpitta during our first day in the field," said Miranda, "and we think they persist in more places we have not yet searched."

Over the next week, the team was able to confirm the mysterious song as that of the long-lost Tachira Antpitta. They photographed it and recorded its voice for the first time.

"The rediscovery provides hope and inspiration that we still have a chance to conserve this species," said Daniel Lebbin, ABC's Vice President of International Programs. "We hope this rediscovery will lead to improved management of and attention for protected areas such as El Tama Na-

tional Park."

"Jhonathan Miranda and his RSI colleagues have resolved one of South America's great bird mysteries, and we hope their findings will contribute to a renewed effort to conserve this species," said Lebbin.

In the coming months, the team plans to publish the full details of its findings in a scientific journal, including how the Tachira Antpitta's voice and appearance differ from other antpittas.

Additional fieldwork is necessary to learn more about this mysterious bird. Similar habitat can be found nearby in Colombia, and the species might also occur there. This study will help future researchers determine the species' full range, ecology and habitat requirements, and how best to ensure its survival.

VOICES OF FAITH Q & A

The Kansas City Star (TNS)

Q. Should fringe religious groups (cults) be eliminated?

Elder Donald D. Deshler, of the Seventy, North America Central Area, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints:

A. Since our nation's founding, the First Amendment of the Constitution has afforded protections for all voices to be heard in the public square.

The freedom of conscience and the right to practice diverse religions – or none at all – and to engage in dialogue and debate in public settings has been a hallmark of our democratic society.

Varying religious perspectives and faith traditions have helped weave the strong moral fabric of our country. As new, novel or fringe religious movements emerge, they should be embraced and not shunned as long as their practices do not harm health or safety.

Regrettably, religious freedom faces growing challenges from those who view this fundamental right narrowly. Specifically, some argue that religious practices and expressions should be confined to the home or houses of worship, but these practices should not be expressed or exercised publicly.

This perspective is inconsistent with the intent of our Founding Fathers. If religious freedom becomes

restricted, our culture will be adversely affected because of the crucial role that religion has played and will continue to play in strengthening individuals, families and communities.

In short, to ensure the rights of all to practice diverse religions, laws should be framed that achieve a balance of protecting the freedoms of all people while respecting those with differing views.

This will lay the foundation of a safe, moral and vibrant democratic culture that enhances the quality of life for all of its citizens and advocates for the dignity of every person.

The Rev. Penny Ellwood, Blue Springs campus pastor, United Methodist Church of the Resurrection:

A. It is difficult to answer a question like this with a simple yes or no. On principle, I don't believe that fringe religious groups should be eliminated.

Truth be told, Christianity would have been considered a fringe religion or cult in the second century Roman Empire when Christianity began.

As Americans, we highly value the opportunity to live in a country founded on the civic principle of religious freedom. This civic principle happens to be rooted in our understanding of the Bible.

Part of being "created in the image of God" (Genesis 1:26) means having the freedom to make decisions, even if we make the wrong decisions. In Matthew 19:16-23, a rich young ruler comes to Jesus.

After a brief conversation, the young man "went away grieving," choosing not to follow Christ's instruction, and Jesus let him go.

God does not "force" belief in him, and we should take care not to force our beliefs on another.

With that said, there are some fringe religious groups that are destructive, and care should be taken to protect helpless victims. Not all groups, even though they appear to incorporate strange beliefs and practices, are necessarily destructive.

Religious groups that isolate their members physically and emotionally from the outside world and/or require complete submission and obedience to the laws of a cult leader and not the laws of the state are suspect. When a religious group engages in abusive conduct detrimental to a person's health, safety and welfare, then intervention may be warranted.

While we cannot interfere with an individual's religious beliefs, there are times religious conduct and practices should be prohibited.

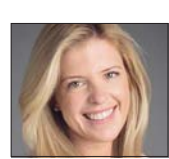

Needing help to fight lender

Dear Annie: My wife and I are in our mid-70s, are retired and have been living in our lovely home for 10 years. In 2011, because of the loss of our incomes, we took out a reverse mortgage. The lender has lost its Better Business Bureau accreditation and employs unscrupulous thieves who have stolen homes from countless other unsuspecting seniors. There are numerous complaints against the lender. It paid our property taxes for two years before we had a chance to pay them, so we owe \$5,000 for that. It promised to roll the \$5,000 into the principal amount of the reverse mortgage.

The lender took us to court in 2016 to foreclose on our home. Our attorney was very knowledgeable about our type of case, and the judge vacated the foreclosure. But the lender is at it again, and this time we cannot afford to defend ourselves. Last year, we filed for Chapter 7 bankruptcy and succeeded. The bankruptcy was granted six months ago. We have only enough funds to go from month to month for necessities and have been rebuilding our credit slowly. I am working part time to help with some of our necessary expenses, such as medical copays.

Is there any way we could find a pro bono attorney in the state of Florida to fight these crooks? Could you help us with this dilemma?

If you've never tried Al-Anon, consider attending a meeting. It might help unpack some of the baggage that you're most likely still carrying from having a loved one with alcoholism.

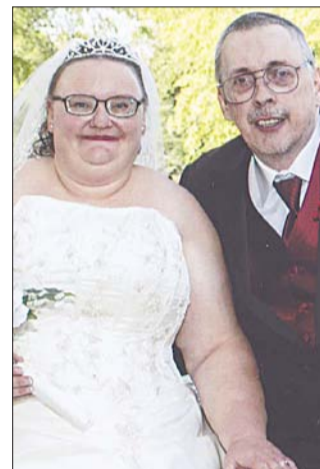

Film recaptures the fear that gripped New Yorkers 40 years ago

'Son of Sam' summer

NEW YORK

Geraldo Rivera dates the low point in modern New York City history to Aug. 9, 1977.

That was the day before police arrested David Berkowitz, the serial killer who called himself "Son of Sam." He terrorized the city for a year with late-night shootings, killing six and wounding seven, and primarily targeted young women sitting in cars.

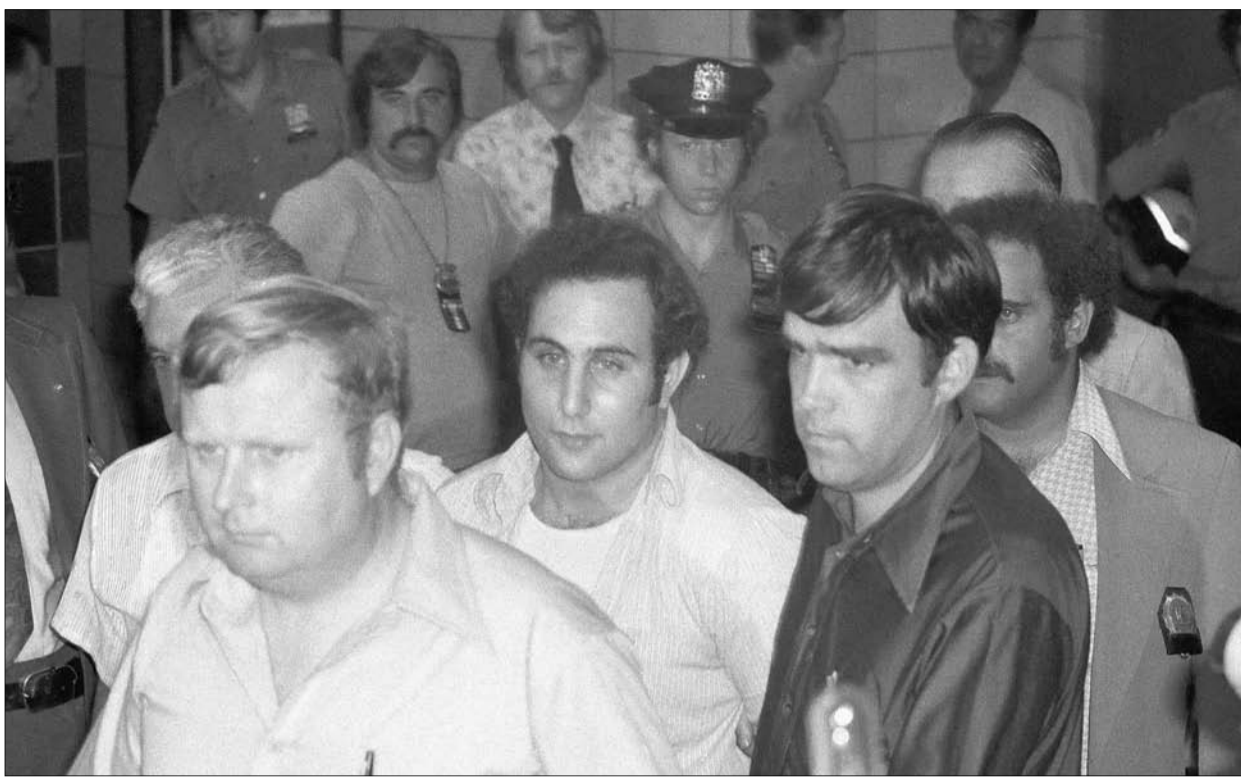
The time is vividly brought to life in the Smithsonian Channel documentary, "The Lost Tapes: Son of Sam," premiering Sunday at 9 p.m. The Investigation Discovery network is airing its own retrospective on the crime spree that airs next Saturday.

Producer Tom Jennings has made similarly styled documentaries on Pearl Harbor, the assassinations of John F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King Jr. and the 1994 Los Angeles police riots. The idea is to trace the story through news reports shown at the time, trading in retrospective for a "you are there" feel.

Since police were largely flummoxed until the end, news producers sent crews out on the streets to interview New Yorkers about how they were coping. As such, "The Lost Tapes" offers a rich portrait of what the city was like that summer 40 years ago. It isn't pretty. The city was grubby, crime-ridden and scared, in the midst of a hot and sticky stretch that included a blackout-induced night of lawlessness.

"1977 was an awful, awful year in New York City," said Rivera, who appears as a study ABC News reporter in the documentary, painted into a pair of jeans. "It was a year of the blackout, it was a year the city seemed totally dysfunctional, coming apart at the seams."

Fanned by news reports and

Berkowitz's own oddball letters sent to newspaper columnist Jimmy Breslin, the "Sam" saga whipped up fear among young people at a usually carefree stage in their lives. Many turned down dates or parties to stay home. Since the killer appeared to favor women with long, dark hair, women across the city cut or died their hair.

"You wouldn't let your kids go out," Rivera recalled. "It was the kind of crime spree that was so irrational. His victims were people that everyone could relate to and everyone was subsequently fearful that they could be next."

Berkowitz, he said, was the Joker in Gotham City.

The New York City Police Department formed a 200-person task force

to solve the crime. It was deeply personal for police, said Bill Clark, a former city homicide detective who was on the task force. Detective work was difficult because the crimes seemed random, with few building blocks of commonality. Many undercover officers worked all night on the streets, hoping to catch the shooter in the act.

Eventually, mundane police work cracked the case. When a witness reported a strange man on the street near the final shooting, police checked traffic tickets that had been issued in the area and traced them to Berkowitz's car and Yonkers, N.Y., home.

Berkowitz remains in an upstate New York prison.

Producer Jennings said the story

crafted through the news reports takes viewers back into time better than any of the documentaries he's done. Interviews with the thick-accented residents recall a "New Yawk" middle class that has shrunk considerably in 40 years.

"The New Yorkers themselves became an important voice in this — the frustration, the fear they felt and the elation when it was solved," he said.

ARCADE FIRE

◆ **Album:** "Everything Now"

◆ **Grade:** A

Arcade Fire are darkly happy-go-lucky on "Everything Now," applying Euro disco and new wave to somber themes on their fifth album like consumerism, flummoxed youth and suicide prevention.

Working with co-producers Thomas Bangalter (Daft Punk) and Steve Mackey (Pulp), Arcade Fire may have picked up a case of Stockholm syndrome, with abounding sonic similarities with those bands.

The title cut is one of the Montreal band's most successful singles, it's Abba-esque, Pulp-ish rhythms sparking behind Win Butler's narrative about information overload matched with a swelling emotional vacuum.

"Signs of Life" is about "cool kids stuck in the past" looking in the night for what they'll never find there, only the mortal coil. "Creature Comfort" is back in Pulp music territory as Butler exhorts those thinking about ending it all to come off the ledge.

"Infinite Content" furiously claims "we're infinitely content" and reprises itself in a Wilco-like Americana style, both detached and involved. Your choice. "Electric Blue," sung in a crystalline falsetto by Regine Chassagne, laments a love that dissipated as quickly as the summer heat.

A laid-back version of the title song ends the album, similar to a snippet at the start. It creates a seamless loop should you choose now to listen to everything again.

Every Arcade Fire album has been nominated for a Grammy Award — "The Suburbs" won album of the year in 2011 — and "Everything Now" should continue the streak.

ALICE COOPER

◆ **Album:** "Paranormal"

◆ **Grade:** B+

It's the middle of summer, but school is back in session as Alice Cooper teaches us how it's done.

In fact, the shock-rock godfather literally goes old school on this two-disc set, reuniting most of the original Alice Cooper Band from the '70s on two tracks.

Guitarist Michael Bruce, bassist Dennis Dunaway and drummer Neal Smith join Cooper on

"Genuine American Girl," a satiric look at gender identity from one of rock's original gender-benders, and "You and All of Your Friends," an apocalyptic revenge song against those who despoiled the planet and "painted Heaven black."

Cooper is just as lethal with his current band. "Dynamite Road" is his own "Detroit Rock City," about a fatal car crash that kills his entire band, but leaves Cooper alive to complain that God allowed his beloved Cadillac to be totaled. No surprise here, since the album is produced by longtime collaborator Bob Ezrin, who also did Kiss' signature album "Destroyer."

The disc also includes six live tracks. Guest musicians include ZZ Top's Billy Gibbons, U2 drummer Larry Mullen Jr. and Deep Purple bassist Roger Glover.

THE ISLEY BROTHERS & SANTANA

◆ **Album:** "Power of Peace"

◆ **Grade:** B

Ronald and Ernie Isley team up with Carlos Santana on the vigorous "Power of Peace," putting their stamp on mostly spiritually inclined songs from the likes of Marvin Gaye, Billie Holiday, Bacharach & David and Swamp Dogg.

Ronald Isley guested on "Santana IV," the 2016 album which reunited most of the band's original lineup, and the collaboration continues here, with Santana's current band providing the foundations and Ernie Isley's guitar pyrotechnics proving a harmonious foil for the bandleader.

Versions of Curtis Mayfield and The Impressions' "Gypsy Woman," a pair of Chamber Brothers songs, Stevie Wonder's "Higher Ground" is pushed over the top and ends up sounding like an audition for an NBA promotion, name-checking many of the league's legends and stars.

Cindy Blackman Santana wrote the record's sole original, "I Remember," which she sings with Ronald Isley. The ballad is a true revelation — tonal shades of Brazil and Santana's delicate guitar lines heighten the regret. Hopeful Blackman Santana, married to Carlos and also the band's astonishing drummer, will contribute more songs to the next album.

Q. What happened to "Sun Records," the show that ran on Country Music Television? — Jack Heffelfinger, Reading, Pa.

A. At least for the time being, it's over. Though it was meant to run over three nights initially, it was changed to a weekly show for two months. CMT declined to order a second season, with the economics involved a likely factor, since that network made a big buy in saving "Nashville" after that series was canceled by ABC.

In a scenario similar to that one, the "Sun Records" producers were said to be seeking another home for their show — which dramatized the early careers of such music legends as Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash and Jerry Lee Lewis — though there were no developments on that front at the time of this writing.

Q. How can "Hawaii Five-0" continue without Daniel Dae Kim and Grace Park? — Chris Ross, via e-mail

A. Well, it will. The actors, executive producer all have weighed in with their takes on why the founding co-stars have left the show, and it's said that the Sept. 29 season premiere will explain the unexpected absence of their characters, cousins Chin Ho and Kono. Some other long-running shows have dealt with cast departures reasonably well, "M*A*S*H" and "Beverly Hills,

90210" being among famous examples.

If there's an upside here, it's that the circumstances give the makers of "Five-0" the chance for some creative reinvention ... though at the same time, one doesn't want to mess too much with a successful formula, particularly one that also serviced an earlier CBS version of "Five-0" that ran for 12 years. It bears mention that on that show, Chin Ho (then played by Kam Fong) left after 10 seasons and Kono (played by Zulu) after four. Even the original "Danno" (James MacArthur) didn't stay for the final year.

Q. What was the name of the "Party of Five" spinoff that starred Jennifer Love Hewitt? — Kate Fryer, Bend, Ore.

A. It was "Time of Your Life," and it had an interesting history. Lower-than-hoped-for ratings led Fox to pull it from the lineup after three months, and an attempt at a relaunch the following summer (2000) didn't work very well. It officially was canceled at that point, but six years later, TBS ran the seven episodes that hadn't been shown by Fox.

One reason may have been that by then, "Time" co-star Jennifer Garner had become a major television star in her own right with "Alias." Also prominent in the "Time" cast was another actress who also went on to a much more successful run, and one that's still going — Pauley Perrette of "NCIS."

Q. Will the new "Roseanne" be on this fall? — Robin White, Grove City, Ohio

A. ABC is planning it as a midseason entry, possibly to separate it from other fall series revivals including NBC's "Will & Grace" and The CW's "Dynasty." That's also giving the writers some extra time to figure out such things as how Dan (John Goodman) is still present, since the finale of the original series revealed that he had died.

Kellie Pickler still has enough 'Love' to go around for Season 3

As she starts the third season of her unscripted series, there's still a lot of love around Kellie Pickler.

The country-music star and "American Idol" alum and her husband — songwriter Kyle Jacobs — again let the cameras be up-close and constantly on them as "I Love Kellie Pickler" resumes with new episodes Thursday, Aug. 3, on Country Music Television. Among the couple's off-stage adventures this time: buying a house in Nashville, and making a trek to Alaska.

With each episode subtitle starting with "I Love ...," Pickler maintains there are still plenty of things for her to adore. "We've had a ball," the friendly, spirited singer says. "We've been able to do some pretty incredible things and travel and mark things off our bucket list. It's been really wonderful." Pickler notes Alaska is the only state she and Jacobs hadn't visited: "We were planning to go regardless, but we ended up filming it for the show. It was great."

Becoming a homeowner also is a major, Pickler maintains. "Kyle and I live in the city area, which is nice for work and commuting back-and-forth, but we are ready for some land and to just get a little bit out of Nashville. It is crazy-booming now, with construction everywhere. It's growing fast." And did Pickler and Jacobs choose a newly built house or a rehabbed home? "You'll have to watch the show!," she teases.

The third round of "I Love Kellie Pickler" — reuniting the title star with fellow "American Idol" veteran Ryan Seacrest, the show's executive producer — comes at an active time for her. Around concert dates that have included Nashville's annual CMA Music Festival, she recently performed on the PBS special "A Capitol Fourth" (albeit on tape from the previous night's rehearsal, since she took ill later),

and she'll soon co-host a new talk show with Ben Aaron (husband of "Good Morning America's" Ginger Zee), executive-produced by country icon Faith Hill.

Pickler also has ongoing television fame as the Season 16 winner (with pro partner Derek Hough) of ABC's "Dancing With the Stars,"

and she's interested to see what that network does with the upcoming revival of "American Idol." She acknowledges that show "was the rocket that launched my career and helped my dreams become reality. It does wonderful things, taking people from small towns who never would have had that

opportunity and transforming their lives overnight. I'm happy to see it come back."

Having done "I Love Kellie Pickler" for this long is a help in tackling other TV ventures, Pickler believes. "Luckily, the production crew that we work with is like family," she reflects, "and of course, everyone

at CMT. I've had a home there since I was 19, and they've always taken care of me. Most every day when we wrap up shooting, the crew ends up staying and hanging out for a little bit. You know you're in good company and with friends when you hang out after working 20 hours a day together."

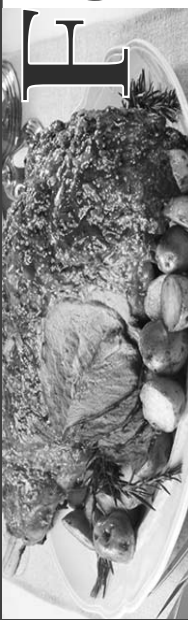
