

2 nabbed after body found in freezer

Remains of woman found in Campbell; Youngstown police investigate

YOUNGSTOWN

A man and a woman, both of Youngstown, are scheduled to appear in Municipal Court today facing abuse-of-a-corpse charges in connection with the discovery of human remains that had been in

a basement freezer in a Campbell home for a week.

Arrested by Youngstown Police on Saturday and Sunday, respectively, and incarcerated in Mahoning County jail were Arturo Novoa, 31, and Katrina Layton, 34, both of 1625 Mahoning Ave.

Novoa was arrested at his job in

the kitchen of a Boardman restaurant and Layton at her residence, both without incident. Layton may also be charged with obstructing justice, said Youngstown Police Lt. Doug Bobovnyik.

The detective said the cause of death and identity of what is believed to be a female found in the

freezer will be determined by an autopsy performed by the Cuyahoga County Coroner's office.

Bobovnyik said he expects the results of the autopsy to be known more quickly than usual because of the high-profile na-

Layton

Trailblazer officer joins Campbell's police force

CAMPBELL

When Delphine Baldwin-Casey first joined the Youngstown Police Department in 1978, she used to pray that she could fade into the background during roll call at the start of every shift.

Baldwin-Casey, who was then 27, had joined the department just as women were first being permitted to go out on patrol. Some of the veteran cops were not happy about the changes, Baldwin-Casey said.

"The sexist things that they would say, you would be sued for now," Baldwin-Casey said. "It was all geared to make women fail."

Baldwin-Casey, who describes herself as "stubborn," said those remarks hardened her resolve. She said the other officers took her on the types of calls that rookies wouldn't ordinarily see.

She remembers one instance, when her co-workers told her to check out a basement. There was a man inside with his head blown off. When she came back outside, Baldwin-Casey acted nonchalant and quipped that the man had a problem because he could no longer wear a hat.

She then walked around the corner, so the other officers wouldn't see her throw up.

Baldwin-Casey, who retired from the Youngstown Police Department in 2010, was the first woman to become a front-lines supervisor there. She is marking another milestone this year, as the first black female officer





"The president will not accept those who said it's, quote, 'Time to move on,'" White House adviser Kellyanne Conway said. Those were the words used by Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., after the early Friday morning defeat of the GOP proposal.

ture of this case.

Youngstown police believe the death occurred in Youngstown, after which the body was moved to a home in the 300 block of Devitt Avenue in Campbell.

Bobovnyik said the people who found and reported the freezer's contents "have cooperated fully" and are not suspects in connection with the body.

The remains of what appears to be a female was discovered at about 4:30 p.m. Saturday when the homeowner became suspicious because the freezer, which had been there about a week, was locked.

The homeowner was keeping the freezer for an acquaintance, Novoa, who said his electricity was off and he needed to keep it plugged in so the contents would not spoil, Bobovnyik said.

When the homeowner discovered the remains, it was reported to the Campbell Police Department, which in turn contacted the YPD, thinking it might be connected to a missing-person case there.

"A lot of the older guys like to talk about how good they were, and they talk about how there was an annual younger vs. older game, so we wanted to get it set up


again," he said.

in the Campbell Police Department's history.

She was sworn-in in Campbell this summer as a part-time patrol officer, earning \$10.50 hourly. She is a Campbell native.

Campbell has 14 full-time police officers, including one woman. Baldwin-Casey is currently the only black police officer in the city.

Twenty-one percent of Campbell's population identifies as black and close to 16 percent identifies as Hispanic, according to the most recently available data from the U.S. Census Bureau.

"Campbell has a lot of Greeks, a lot of Spanish, a lot of blacks, a lot of Italians, so we do need diversity," said Campbell Police Chief Dennis Puskarcik, in response to a question about diversity within his department.

"Color never enters my mind. It's about quality of the applicant. I could never ask for a more qualified person than Delphine."

Those qualifications include Baldwin-Casey's work for the Catholic Diocese of Youngstown as a victims' assistance coordinator. The position involves reviewing sexual-abuse allegations against priests and other church personnel.

Baldwin-Casey helped found the Youngstown Crisis Intervention Unit in

1996 and feels passionately about assisting victims of sexual and domestic violence.

When she was a rookie, Baldwin-Casey said some of her shift partners instructed her not to get involved with domestic-violence cases involving police officers, especially if the officer had a higher rank.

"I had a hard time with women being abused by their spouse, but not just by their spouse, but by the judicial system from the police department on up," Baldwin-Casey said.

Additionally, Baldwin-Casey teaches in the police academy at Youngstown State University and works as a diversity and cultural awareness consultant to other police departments.

When she leads diversity training, Baldwin-Casey often uses herself as an example. At first glance, people categorize her only as a black woman, she said, and don't realize she has a grandmother from Czechoslovakia and a grandfather from Saudi Arabia.

"It didn't matter what I said to people," Baldwin-Casey said of her early life. "They didn't see the richness of the diversity in me. They saw the skin color."

She says her upbringing in Campbell was key to shaping her perspective on life.

"I always wanted to come back here to work," Baldwin-Casey said. "I view this as going home."







Ex-NASA agent fears gold lunar module will be melted down

CLEVELAND

Whoever broke into an Ohio museum late Friday and stole a solid-gold replica of the Apollo 11 lunar module likely intends to melt it down for the value of the gold instead of trying to sell what could be a collectible worth millions of dollars, said a Texas attorney and retired federal agent with NASA who has helped recover and locate stolen moon rocks worth millions of dollars.

The 5-inch high replica was discovered stolen after an alarm sounded just before midnight Friday at the Armstrong Air and Space Museum in Wapakoneta, the boyhood home of astronaut Neil Armstrong, the first person to set foot on the moon in July 1969.

Replicas made by the French jeweler Cartier were presented to Armstrong and fellow Apollo 11 space voyagers Buzz Aldrin and Michael Collins in Paris after they returned to Earth.

The NASA agent, Joseph Gutheinz Jr., told The Associated Press on Sunday there's a moon rock in the museum from the Apollo 11 mission that's much larger than other rocks given away or loaned to museums or foreign coun-

tries that could easily be smuggled out of the country, where a geologist could verify its authenticity. He said it would be worth millions of dollars to a collector into space items.

"Either they didn't have easy access to the moon rock, or they weren't into collectibles," Gutheinz said of the thief or thieves.

Gutheinz ran an undercover sting operation in 1998 that led to the recovery of a moon rock from the Apollo 17 mission originally given to the Honduran government. The seller offered the rock to Gutheinz for \$5 million. He more recently has led a group of criminal-justice students from the University Phoenix in a project that has identified 79 missing lunar samples and rocks from the Apollo 11 and Apollo 17 missions.

At an auction of space items July 20 at Sotheby's in New York, a lunar collection bag Armstrong carried on the moon sold for \$1.8 million, a value enhanced by tiny amounts of moon dust engrained in the bag.

It will be difficult to catch the thief if the replica is melted down, which Gutheinz said would be a "damn shame." It's unclear how much gold the replica contains.

Researchers create warning system for toxic algae in lakes

Satellites in space and a robot under Lake Erie's surface are part of a network of scientific tools trying to keep algae toxins out of drinking-water supplies in the shallowest of the Great Lakes.

It's one of the most wide-ranging freshwater monitoring systems in the U.S., researchers say, and some of its pieces soon will be watching for harmful algae on hundreds of lakes nationwide.

Researchers are creating an early warning system using real-time data from satellites that in recent years have tracked algae bloom hotspots such as Florida's Lake Okeechobee and the East Coast's Chesapeake Bay.

The plan is to have it in place within two years so that states in the continental U.S. can be alerted to where toxic algae is appearing before they might detect it on the surface, said Blake Schaeffer, a researcher with U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

"You don't have to wait until someone gets sick," said Schaeffer, one of the leaders of the project.

Across the nation, farm runoff, sewage overflows and lawn fertilizers have washed into lakes and rivers and left behind unsightly algae blooms that can sicken people and pets and harm wildlife.

But often the first reports of harmful algae on a lake come from boaters seeing something strange in the water, said Rick Stumpf, of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

He began using satellites in 2008 to monitor algae on Lake Erie. That work took on a new urgency after a bloom near Toledo's shoreline contaminated the drinking water for more than 400,000 people three years ago.

The EPA in recent years

has been testing using the satellite data to watch for algae in lakes in California, Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island.

Earlier this year, the data helped detect an algae bloom in a Utah lake near Salt Lake City before officials on the ground knew about it.

"That's exactly what we're trying to accomplish," Schaeffer said.

The system in development will cast a wider net at a time when many states can't afford to monitor every lake threatened by harmful algae. The goal is to use the satellite data to watch for algae on 1,800 lakes across the nation and provide four different types of water quality measurements on close to 170,000 lakes.

What satellites can't measure is the amount of toxins in the water. That's where samples gathered by researchers come into play. That too can be expensive, so researchers have developed an underwater lab that sits at the bottom of Lake Erie and both collects water and tests the levels of toxins before sending the results back remotely.

The whole process takes four hours—much less than the day or two it takes to test samples from a boat.

"We call it the 'lab in a can,'" said Tim Davis, a Great Lakes researcher with the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration.

The first robotic lab was launched this summer and two more are in the works. While it's still in the early stages, Davis said it could work in other lakes plagued by algae.

Other researchers are testing drones on Lake Erie to see if digital images they capture can be effective monitoring the algae blooms. Already in use on the lake are buoys that measure algae in the water.

Ohio State Fair officials say rides to reopen after fatal accident

Officials say rides shut down at the Ohio State Fair after a thrill ride broke apart and killed a man are open after being re-inspected.

Fair officials made the announcement Sunday morning. Some rides, mostly in the fair's Kiddie Land, had previously reopened.

All rides were shut down Wednesday night after a swinging and spinning ride called the Fire Ball broke apart, killing

18-year-old high-school student Tyler Jarrell and injuring seven others, severely critically.

The Dutch manufacturer of the Fire Ball subsequently ordered similar rides to shut down worldwide.

A co-owner of the company providing rides at the fair has told WCMH-TV in Columbus he's certain a mechanical failure caused the ride to break apart.

Jarrell's family has hired an attorney to possibly pursue a wrongful death lawsuit.

Don't mess with RITA in Niles recovery plan

IT'S BEEN NEARLY THREE LONG years now since Ohio Auditor Dave Yost declared the city of Niles in the demeaning and unflattering state of fiscal emergency. In the interim, city officials have slogged through plan after plan after plan in attempts to move the city out of state oversight and in the direction of long-term financial solvency.

Now at long last and with patience running thin among state watchdogs over the municipality's purse strings, a potentially viable conduit out of fiscal emergency appears to have taken solid shape.

Last week, the Niles Financial Planning and Supervision Commission, the state-appointed panel overseeing the city's recovery, put its stamp of approval on the seventh rendition of a plan authored by Mayor Thomas Scarnecchia and approved by city council. It lays out a road map for cost-cutting and capital improvements for the beleaguered city of 19,000 people over the next five years.

Among its more noteworthy features include implementation of two \$5 license-plate fees to generate about \$180,000 a year, borrowing of \$1.6 million to make critically needed improvements to crumbling city buildings and dismantling the city's income-tax department.

That latter move to outsource most income-tax functions of city government to the Regional Income Tax Agency operated in connection with the Council of Regional Governments has ignited a firestorm of opposition from some within city government, most notably the leadership of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees Local 506 in the city.

RITA, formed in 1971, administers the income-tax ordinance of any Ohio city or village that joins it through the Regional Council of Government. Today, more than 250 communities or about 40 percent of municipalities in the state use RITA to handle their income tax collection and enforcement efforts. For a fee estimated at between 1.89 and 2.48 percent of collections, RITA offers comprehensive tax services from registration through litigation of challenged tax bills.

As a critical pillar of the proposal, RITA must not be messed with. Attempts to fight the outsourcing could threaten the viability of the recovery plan and by extension the city's long-term financial stability.

We therefore would ask the city's major labor union to think long and hard about the potential adverse ramifications of filing a grievance and seeking third-party arbitration of the dispute.

Opposition to the totality of the recovery plan would only muck up the already murky financial waters the city must get through en route to recovery.

NO LAYOFFS OR JOB LOSSES

First, as Mayor Thomas Scarnecchia has explained time and time again, no one will lose his or her job in city government over the transfer. Employees in the city income-tax office will be allowed to use their seniority to bump into other union jobs. In addition, Lisa Smathers, the director of the income tax department, plans to retire soon.


Second, the savings from using RITA could be substantial. The city could save \$42,000 a year by shutting down its income-tax office and take in up to an additional \$400,000 in revenue, according to documents provided by the city. Though some criticize those estimates as inflated, particularly for a city still reeling from the aftereffects of the Great Recession, we're confident RITA ultimately would do more good than harm to the city's bottom line.

After all, RITA is no slouch, and others recognize as much. For more than 30 years, the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada has awarded RITA a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting. It's also received numerous Auditor of State Awards for its clean record keeping and audits.

Other cities that have struggled with financial distress, such as Girard and Youngstown, have successfully turned to RITA for assistance. Niles should not hesitate to join in.

Too much is at stake to cling to the status quo. The stigma the city has endured over its fiscal collapse will not be lifted without continued decisive and constructive action. What's more, the city faces strict penalties without a firm plan in place, namely a 15 percent across-the-board slashing of revenue.

Clearly, many players implementing many changes are needed to nurse Niles back to sound fiscal health. RITA is but one player, but it is a critical piece of the financial-recovery puzzle. As such, it must be preserved.



'Values' are relative when you're rooting for your political team

In his wary optimism after the U.S. Senate voted to proceed with debate on dismantling President Barack Obama's signature Affordable Care Act and replacing it with, well, something, Majority Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky said he and his supporters were "not out here to spike the football."

In this case, the cliched sports metaphor fit.

Politics, more than ever, has come to resemble a depressingly repetitive sporting event: Judging an idea's worth depends on which team supports it. And the opposing team is – always the New England Patriots.

With apologies to the late Speaker of the House Tip O'Neill, the politician most associated with the phrase "all politics is local," his sentiment seems increasingly old-fashioned. Elections from school board to state judge are taking on a national sheen, with divisions at the very top of the political food chain – party vs. party, tribe vs. tribe – trickling down.

Political ads in all corners of this sprawling country, with needs as varied as their climates, landscapes and time zones, may toss in a few promises on affordable housing or new roads and schools. But weary and occasionally bewildered local voters are just as likely to see and hear attacks on "values" (the other guys' are always terrible) and villainous bogeymen who reside thousands of miles away.

YOUNGSTOWN APPEARANCE

At a campaign-style rally in Youngstown, Ohio, on Tuesday, President Donald Trump extolled the virtues of the "American heartland," a phrase that conjures more than geography. It's a familiar and everlasting characterization leaned on by politicians of every stripe, one that maligns, by default, all those out-of-control folks who live (and work and pay taxes) on both coasts.

I've never understood why standing in the middle of a corn field somehow makes one more virtuous than living in a Baltimore row house, or why milking cows earns more kudos than adjusting a part on an assembly line or working as a teacher or social worker.

The argument also makes little sense coming from a gold-

plated New York City billionaire who spent much of his life in a tower that bears his name.

The demonization of the "other" has always worked. Now, though, no one even tries to sugarcoat the contempt with a veneer of civility in the name of national unity.

Many senators in favor of ACA repeal say they are only keeping a promise to their voters, who, in the town halls that some elected officials selectively hold, are expressing second thoughts, especially if their family's medical or Medicaid coverage is not included in whatever bill follows.

HATED RIVAL

Running against "Obamacare" – named for the hated rival – was good enough then. But what about now? Look at what happened to Republican Sens. Susan Collins of Maine, Lisa Murkowski of Alaska and Shelley Moore Capito of West Virginia when they expressed concern about what changes in health-care legislation would mean for their constituents.

Texas Rep. Blake Farenthold said it was "absolutely repugnant" that "some female senators from the Northeast" had been a roadblock, and added, "If it was a guy from south Texas, I might ask him to step outside and settle this Aaron Burr-style." This was a guy re-elected by double digits in 2016 after settling a previous case of purported sexual harassment.

Is that an expression of "Texas values"?

Georgia Democrat Jon Ossoff got caught on the "wrong" team in his House race when Republicans transformed him – in English and Spanish – into a henchman for House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi and an enabler of the values of "liberal" San Francisco. An ad that tied Democrats, and by extension Ossoff, to the shooting of House Majority Whip Steve Scalise was too much even for the election's eventual winner, Republican Karen Handel.

City council races are not exempt. In Charlotte, N.C., where I am based, city council member Dimple Ajmera, who is running in the at-large race after she was appointed to fill the remaining term in a district seat, got tangled up in controversy when she said in a TV appearance that those who

"have supported Trump and all his cronies should be voted out of our council. Look at all our Republicans who are supporting Trump. I think they should have no place on city council whatsoever or in the mayor's race."

She has stood by her comments, yet explained them in a statement last week: "My remarks on Trump were never to make this about a political party. Instead, it remains about morals and principles, which includes standing up to Trump's disrespect, disregard and dangerous rhetoric towards women, minorities, immigrants, disabled and the poor.

I started this conversation, and I want to be the one to end it with a call to action for unity, mutual respect, care and regard for our neighbors as we tackle very important issues of safety, trust and equity."

ETHNIC SLURS

But protesters at last week's city council meeting took her words as a personal insult. One told *The Charlotte Observer*: "In a city with such a wide range of beliefs, we had 100,000 Charlatans who voted for the president. To say we have no place in city government is infuriating."

A regional Republican group had to clean up its own efforts to take advantage when its criticisms of Ajmera were marred by commenters throwing ethnic slurs at the candidate, who was born in India.

Were "Trump values" on display at the Boy Scouts of America national jamboree in West Virginia last week? In a speech about virtues, the president valued one, loyalty, above all others before he bragged about himself, trashed opponents, including former scout Barack Obama, and wandered off script into a shaggy dog tale that involved a rich guy's potentially R-rated hijinks on a yacht.

While some observers were outraged, others, including scouts from the Trump administration standing behind him, seemed to like it just fine. It's so much easier to root for your team than to appreciate the virtues of folks you can't take the trouble to know.

Call it an American value.

Leave Sessions alone

The way many of his political enemies go after President Donald Trump is a national disgrace, an antideocratic, snarling, hateful dismissal of protocol, sometimes of law. Techniques have even included jokes about his getting killed, and you would think no one could go further. Someone can. Trump can.

He's doing it in his attacks on Attorney General Jeff Sessions that are at the same time vicious attacks on himself. They portray him as immature, narcissistic and downright mindless. They arm his enemies with still more criticisms and discourage Republicans and any number of civic groups respecting Sessions as an honest, hard-working, capable public servant loyal to the president's goals.

After all, Sessions was the first senator to back Trump in his bid for the presidency and, time and again, defended Trump's positions in a knowledgeable, rational way.

What he did wrong, in Trump's eyes, was to recuse himself from playing a role in the investigation of Russian intervention in the 2016 presidential election. He took the action for the obvious reason that some had suggested he could somehow himself have been involved in collusion with a Putin gang. He wanted no hint of guiding the probe away from truth and turned it over to Deputy Attorney General Rod Rosenstein. He's the one who appointed Robert Mueller as general counsel to get to the bottom of things.

The problem is Mueller sinks to the bottom to get to the bottom. As an FBI director trying to get the goods on a congressman once, he ignored the law along with urgings that he correct himself from the attorney general and the president. In his current position, he has a good friend, former FBI director James Comey, as a key witness – despite a law that says nothing doing.

DEMOCRATIC DEVOTEES

To pursue the case against Trump, he has brought aboard Democratic devotees and, apparently getting nowhere on the Russian probe, expanded his attention to obstruction of justice. Then, perhaps stubbing his toe there, too, he included Trump's enormous financial holdings. Considering Trump's billions in assets, my guess is that a persistent enough, government-financed gotcha guy could find something amiss even if Trump had given everything to Goodwill.

On top of all of that, the Mueller office seems from news reports to be leaking lots of stuff and you can see why Trump is upset. But why take it out on Sessions in public tweets that in Trump's usual crude way go after the recusal and even laxity in investigating Hillary Clinton? Trump himself dropped the goal of locking her up after the election, but one person who didn't was former New York City Mayor Rudolph Giuliani.

In his mayoral job, he was one of the most effective public servants in recent times, essentially saving the city from runaway crime and a downturn in its prosperity. He would be a good attorney general, but an embittered Sessions is not likely to resign and Trump would be crazy to fire him, although that in itself is no deterrence.

The main point here is that a president should never, ever go after a good, decent, able Cabinet member in adolescent tweets to the public. Private discussions in the White House? Fine. Frustration at what really could be a "witch hunt" as he calls it? Understandable. But play the kinds of games he is playing on this, and one cannot help but wonder about the way he proceeds on other matters.

Cellphone service could be spotty for rural eclipse watchers

If you plan to livestream next month's solar eclipse from one of the prime viewing spots, here's a thought: Stick the cellphone in your pocket, put on your paper glasses and enjoy the celestial wonder.

Otherwise, frustration is possible since the best places to see the eclipse Aug. 21 are largely in rural areas with spotty cell coverage. Even as the major cellphone companies temporarily upgrade service, there are no guarantees you'll be able to post to social media as quickly as you'd like.

The solar eclipse will be seen first in Oregon and cut diagonally across 14 states to South Carolina. It will be the first seen coast-to-coast since 1918.

Cellphone companies plan to bring in temporary towers to boost connectivity at some of the big eclipse-watch events.

Companies: Apple removed privacy apps

WASHINGTON

China appears to have succeeded in eliminating software programs that enable its people to view an uncensored internet.

Companies that let people avoid the government filters said Saturday that their programs have been removed from Apple's app store in China.

ExpressVPN, one of the companies, posted on its corporate site a message from Apple saying that its program was illegal in China. The British Virgin Islands-based software company says that all major virtual-private network apps were removed from the Apple app store in China. ExpressVPN claimed Apple was "aiding China's censorship effort."

Attack leaves 8 dead

MOGADISHU, SOMALIA

Fighters with the al-Shabab extremist group ambushed an African Union convoy in southern Somalia and killed at least eight soldiers Sunday, a Somali military officer said. The attack came hours after a car bomb in the capital killed at least five people, most of them civilians, shattering a month of relative calm in Mogadishu.

The al-Qaida-linked al-Shabab fighters attacked the convoy near Bulo-Mareer town in Lower Shabelle region, Col. Muhyadin Yasin said.

20,000 flee fire at fest

BARCELONA, SPAIN

A huge fire at a music festival in Spain forced the evacuation of more than 20,000 concertgoers and incinerated the event's stage in Barcelona, the government said Sunday.

The fire Saturday night consumed the large outdoor stage at the "Tomorrowland" electronic music festival at Barcelona's Parc de Can Zam. Firefighters extinguished the flames just before midnight. Firefighters said they were investigating the cause. They said there were no serious injuries.

Deadly dispute at club

VIENNA

A disagreement in a German discotheque turned deadly Sunday after the disco operator's son-in-law left the club, returned with an assault rifle and started shooting, law enforcement officials said.

A security guard was killed and four other people were wounded, three of them seriously, during the rampage that started at the Grey club discotheque in Konstanz. The suspect was fatally shot by a police officer.

Child advocates urge back-seat alarms as 2 die

A proposed law that would require carmakers to build alarms for back seats is being pushed by child advocates who say it will prevent kids from dying in hot cars.

The law also would streamline the criminal process against caregivers who cause the deaths — cases that can be inconsistent but often heavier-handed against mothers.

The latest deaths came in Arizona on triple-digit degree days over the weekend, with two baby boys found forgotten in vehicles in separate incidents.

More than two dozen child and road safety groups are backing the U.S. Senate bill introduced last week aimed at preventing those kinds of deaths by requiring cars to be equipped with technology that can alert drivers if a child is left in the back seat once the vehicle is turned off.

It could be a motion sensor that can detect a baby left sitting in a rear-facing car seat and then alert the driver, in a similar way that reminders about tire pressure,

open doors and seat belts now come standard in cars.

"The technology would help because if you're in a vehicle, your child is in the back seat, and you ignore that alarm: Go to jail. Do not pass go. You had a chance," said Janette Fennell of the advocacy group Kids and Cars.org. "You talk to any of the judges, they'll tell you, they're beyond the hardest things they have to deal with."

Police say 1-year-old Josiah Riggins was in the car for hours Saturday, discovered dead only after his father drove roundtrip, twice, between their suburban home and a Phoenix church to drop off the mother and a sibling.

Zane Endress, who was 7 months old, died Friday in Phoenix after being left in the car in the driveway at home, as his usual daycare drop-off routine was lost by his grandparents.

No charges have been filed against the caregivers in either Arizona case, as police say the death investigations are underway.

Trump travel ban keeps orphan children from US foster families

SAN FRANCISCO

Tianna Rooney has already bought the poster board for the sign she'll wave when the 16-year-old refugee boy her family is taking in arrives in the United States. Rooney knows the exact words of welcome she'll write on it, in the teenager's native language from the African country of Eritrea.

But Rooney's family is leaving the sign blank, for now. She and her husband, Todd, fear actually writing the words "Welcome Home" could break her heart.

The foster son they're waiting for is part of a small, three-decade-old U.S. program for so-called unaccompanied refugee minors that has been halted by a series of new refugee bans and travel limits imposed by the Trump administration in the name of fighting terrorism.

By blocking the program,

the U.S. travel bans have stranded more than 100 refugee children who were already matched to waiting American foster families. Without parents or other adult relatives, those kids are living on their own in countries of temporary refuge, in limbo while their U.S. foster parents hope for a court ruling that will allow the children to finish their journeys.

Since the June day a refugee agency matched the Rooneys with their foster son, which turned out to be the same day of the first Supreme Court ruling barring him, "we have experienced this very unexpected ride of grief in our family," says Rooney, a 39-year-old family therapist and mother of two from Brighton, a suburb of Detroit.

Meanwhile, the boy who fled his home country at 13 to avoid widespread forced military conscription of children continues to fend

for himself on the streets in his temporary refuge in another African capital, with no phone or internet for the Rooneys to reach him to explain the delay.

"There's part of me that really hopes he knows a family wants him," Tianna Rooney says.

Since the 1980s, the program for orphaned refugee children has brought in more than 6,000 refugee children, including 203 last year.

"These are kids on their own, and struggling to survive," said Elizabeth Foydel, policy counsel with the International Refugee Assistance Project, a Washington, D.C., legal-aid group for refugees.

The program for orphaned refugee children from around the world is different from one started by the Obama administration in 2014 for Central American children fleeing a surge in violence there.

In Venezuela, a voter-turnout dispute

Venezuelans stayed away from the polls in massive numbers Sunday in a show of protest against a vote to grant President Nicolas Maduro's ruling socialist party virtually unlimited powers in the face of a brutal socio-economic crisis and a grinding battle against its political opponents and groups of increasingly alienated and violent young protesters.

The government swore to continue its push for total political dominance of this once-prosperous OPEC nation, a move likely to trigger U.S. sanctions and new rounds of the street fighting that has killed at least 122 and wounded nearly 2,000 since protests began in April.

Venezuela's chief prosecutor's office reported seven deaths Sunday in clashes between protesters and police across the country.

Late Sunday, a key ally of Maduro's said there was "record" participation in Sunday's election for a constitutional assembly that he says will surprise the

opposition, whose leaders contend turnout was exceptionally low.

Ruling socialist party leader Diosdado Cabello says that while the official National Electoral Council results are still being counted, "I can assure you there

was record participation."

However, organizers with Venezuela's opposition say they stationed observers at every polling site and the preliminary results show Sunday had a small fraction of the turnout seen in previous elections voted.

5 more make it to Cooperstown

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y. "Pudge" Rodriguez stared out at his father, wiping away tears as he spoke.

"I love you with all of my heart," Rodriguez said. "If I'm a Hall of Famer, you're a Hall of Famer — double."

Those words punctuated Rodriguez's speech as he was inducted Sunday into the Baseball Hall of Fame. Jeff Bagwell and Tim Raines, along with former commissioner Bud Selig and front-office guru John Schuerholz also were enshrined on a picture-perfect summer day in front of over 27,000 fans.

"It's always emotional when you see the fans cheering for you, and my whole family in front of me," Bagwell said. "I'm an emotional person. It's a dream just to be part of this beautiful group. Now I have that plaque forever. It's unbelievable."

Before he started, Rodriguez received a standing ovation from hundreds of fans, many wearing red-and-white jerseys with Puerto Rico emblazoned on the front, and proceeded to give half his speech in Spanish.

"This is such an incredible honor for me," Rodriguez said. "A little kid from Puerto Rico with a big dream. Never let them take your dream away from you."

The 45-year-old Rodriguez holds major league records for games caught (2,427) and putouts by a catcher (12,376). He hit 311 homers and batted .296 in his career. He's also only the second catcher elected on the first ballot, following in the footsteps of his childhood idol, Cincinnati Reds star Johnny Bench, who was seated on the dais behind him.

After speaking in Spanish, Rodriguez went back and repeated in English, concentrating on a message to youth.

"You have the right to dream," he said. "Everything in life is possible. I speak from experience."



THE YOUNGSTOWN STATE football team didn't reach the top of the Football Championship Subdivision mountain, but the Penguins have a good idea how to get there.

The Penguins will go for its first back-to-back trips to a national title game since the 1993-94 seasons this fall. Last year's 12-4 campaign featured four different starting quarterbacks, four suspensions at the worst time and five victories that came by a touchdown or less.

The Penguins return a mostly intact offense and a defense that is missing two NFL-caliber talents in Derek Rivers and Avery Moss.


OFFENSE

Despite using four different quarterbacks in 2016, Pelini is looking at just one to be his starter. Senior Hunter Wells got the vote of confidence from his head coach.


"Hunter is obviously our starter going in," Pelini said. "He had a heck of a year. I thought

Kyle Busch breaks drought

2015 Cup champion nudges Harvick out of the way, holds on

Kyle Busch used a bump-and-run on Kevin Harvick to take the lead and held on to snap a 36-race losing streak and win the NASCAR Cup race at Pocono Raceway on Sunday.

Busch won for the first time this season in the No. 18 Toyota and won for the first time ever at Pocono. Busch had led more than 1,000 laps this season entering the race. He was racing for the lead last weekend in the Brickyard 400 when he wrecked with Martin Truex Jr., which led to a pit road altercation between members of both teams.

Busch won from the pole and gave Toyota its 100th Cup win since its 2007 debut.

Busch, the 2015 Cup champion, had never gone a full season without winning a race. Charlotte Motor Speedway is now the only track where he's failed to win.

"I never thought this day would happen," Busch said.

He also won his 176th career NASCAR race over the Cup, Xfinity and Truck series.

"We've all been fighting all year long and just wasn't sure why," Busch said. "This is something I've been waiting for for a long, long time. It's been a frustrating year but an awesome day today."

Harvick finished second, followed by Truex, Denny Hamlin and Brad Keselowski. Harvick, who hasn't won in 34 career races at Pocono, said he had nothing for Busch down the stretch.

"There was no battle. He was way faster than we were," Harvick said.

Busch had seven top-five finishes and was runner-up to Austin Dillon in the Coca-Cola 600. All the near misses have gnawed at Busch, who won the All-Star race. He

he really came along and made a lot of significant improvements from the year prior. I feel comfortable with Hunter going in."

A heck of a year may be underselling it a bit. Mays entered his junior season as the fourth string quarterback and didn't see action until week 9 against Indiana State. He threw for 1,714 passing yards, 11 passing touchdowns and five picks as he started the team's final nine games.

Pelini said he is also comfortable with sophomore Nate Mays backing up Wells. Senior Trent Hosick returns in a reserve role and while senior Ricky Davis is listed on YSU's roster as a quarterback, he spent spring practice as a wide receiver.

There's about 2,500 rushing yards and 18 touchdowns to replace with the departures of leading rushers Jody Webb and Martin Ruiz. Only two other running backs saw the field in 2016. Junior

Tevin McCaster got a big stage to show what he was capable of in last year's national semifinal against Eastern Washington, where the Newcastle native piled up 154 yards on the ground and three touchdowns. South Range graduate Joe Alessi has decent sample of stats, 223 rushing yards and two TDs on just 11 carries. Some incoming freshman to watch at that position include Farrell's Braxton Chapman and Cincinnati La Salle's Christian Turner. Chapman is Farrell's all-time leading rusher with 3,067 yards and has made a Class A state finals appearance in his career. Turner compiled roughly 1,400 all-purpose yards — split even between rushing and receiving — and scored 13 touchdowns as La Salle won the Division II state title in 2016.

With the exception of Darien Townsend, who left the team in April after his junior season ended with a suspension during last year's playoffs, all of YSU's wide receivers and tight ends are back. Senior Alvin Bailey leads the returning wideouts in catches, yards

and touchdowns with a line of 47 catches for 511 yards and five TDs.

Senior tight end Kevin Rader returns after making arguably the greatest catch in YSU history to send the Penguins to the National Championship game. He's joined by fellow seniors Shane Kuhn and Anthony Parente as well as Virginia Tech transfer Chris Durkin.

Pelini was a bit cagey when discussing his offensive line. Starting center Vitas Hrynkiewicz and guards Justin Spencer and Gavin Wiggins are back, but Pelini is not naming someone to the remaining two spots just yet.

"When we get into camp, I'll get more specific as we move along," Pelini said. "I'd be remiss to name names because you never know how things will turn out. Everyone is going in with a clean slate."

DEFENSE

It's a big ask to replace defensive ends Derek Rivers and Avery Moss, who are now in the NFL training camps with the New England Patriots and New York Giants, respectively. The only knowns with the

Penguin defense is its linebackers and the interior of the D-line. The rest will have to be sorted out through August.

Just because the program's all-time leaders in sacks are gone doesn't make for a change in how the Penguins play defense.

"We're not going to change how we play. We've had a lot of success over the years playing how we played and we have guys on our roster who will fit right in," Pelini said. "It's not that you can easily replace guys like [Rivers and Moss], but we have some able guys that are ready to step up and do their thing."

The likely guys to take the end spots, junior Johnson Louigene and senior Fazson Chapman have a combined 15 tackles last season. Pushing them will be Florida transfer Justus Reed.

Juniors Savon Smith, Cody Squirc and senior Donald Mesier all return at defensive tackle.



Jones regains UFC title belt

ANAHEIM, CALIF.

Jon Jones reached the pinnacle of mixed martial arts and then fell harder than just about anyone ever had before.

When he got back on top Saturday night by stopping his greatest rival in dramatic style, Jones vowed to appreciate everything he had lost and regained.

Jones reclaimed his UFC light heavyweight title by stopping Daniel Cormier in the third round with a vicious head kick and a finish on the ground at UFC 214, completing his rocky journey back to the top after 2½ years of drama with his 14th consecutive victory.

He fended off a stiff challenge from Cormier (19-2), who held the belt for most of the past two years while Jones (23-1) dealt with self-inflicted setbacks outside the cage. His title belt has been stripped twice, and he endured a yearlong suspension for a doping test failure before returning to beat Cormier for the second time.

"I feel like I'm leaving my past behind me and I'm erasing everything I've done before," Jones said. "I feel like this is a step to a new career,

a new championship, and I want to be a better champion than I was in the past."

After 2½ rounds of even, high-level striking, Jones landed a left head kick that caught Cormier leaning in. The champion staggered backward and then around the cage with Jones in pursuit, and Jones finished the fight on the ground with a series of merciless strikes.

Jones was widely consid-

ered the world's top pound-for-pound mixed martial artist while he held the belt for nearly four years from 2011-15. He beat Cormier by clear decision in their first bout in January 2015, but had fought just one time since.

Jones praised Cormier afterward.

"I want to thank Daniel for being my biggest rival and my biggest motivator," Jones said.

Hoyer seizes opportunity as starting QB for 49ers

It took nine NFL seasons and sixth franchise for Brian Hoyer to come into training camp as the unquestioned starting quarterback of his team.


Signed by the San Francisco 49ers back in March to replace the departed Colin Kaepernick, Hoyer is entrenched as the starter to begin the team's first camp under coach Kyle Shanahan.

With a familiar coach who believes in his ability after a successful season together in Cleveland in 2014 and a rebuilding team that has only untested Matt Barkley and third-round rookie C.J. Beathard behind him on the depth chart, Hoyer won't need to win a training camp battle to earn the starting job this season.

"You don't have to deal with the unknown a little bit when it comes to that," Hoyer said. "That's always nice, especially being a human being. You can tell yourself not to worry about things as much as you want to, but you know those thoughts creep up in your mind. So now just to be able to go out and focus and take control and know this is my team, this is my offense. It kind of eliminates that and you can just focus on the football side of it."

Hoyer has seized that leadership role by organizing an informal summer workout in Texas with many of the team's receivers to build up chemistry in the down period between minicamp and training camp.

How long he has it remains to be seen. The 49ers gave Hoyer only a two-year contract and could easily move on from if they make

a run at Kirk Cousins next offseason and return him to his more usual backup role if they draft a quarterback in the first round.

Hoyer has heard that speculation but isn't dwelling on it.

"I know from being in this league it's about what have you done lately, so one whole year can change a lot of aspects on how people think about things," he said. "So for me, like I said, to be able to go into training camp and not have to worry about a quote unquote competition, to be the guy to have gotten all the reps in the offseason, I feel very confident and very excited about going into this season."

He has also served as a tutor to many of the players because of his deep knowledge of Shanahan's offense from their year together with the Browns when Hoyer won seven of his 13 starts, throwing for a career-high 3,326 yards with 12 touchdowns and 13 interceptions.

That marked one of only two times that Hoyer has been an opening day starter in a career that began in New England as an undrafted free agent out of Michigan State in 2009.

After three seasons as one of Tom Brady's backups with little chance of ever seeing the field, Hoyer moved on to Arizona in 2012 where he made his first career start before making stops in Cleveland, Houston and Chicago as part of his nomadic career.

for us," Davidson said. "We needed it really bad. We're working hard, but it's been a tough go. That's why these things probably mean more than just a normal win."




McCutchen's big day backed Gerrit Cole, who pitched seven innings of five-hit ball for the Pirates.

It was just the second win in eight games for the Pirates, who ended the Padres' four-game winning streak.

McCutchen, a five-time All-Star and the 2013 NL MVP, has 22 homers. He connected with two outs in the first off left-hander Clayton Richard, with the ball clearing the fence just out of the reach of center fielder Manuel Margot. He homed

"It feels good, man," McCutchen said. "I've done it before so it's cool to be able to do it again. To have that opportunity to go out there and do it for the third time in my career, that's pretty cool."

This was McCutchen's third multihomer game of the season and 15th of his career. He also made a nice diving catch in center field to end the eighth.

"They're special days, and I told him that as he came off the field," said manager

Clint Hurdle, who turned 60 Sunday. "I've got to see him do it a couple times now, three homers in a game. He creates a wake in everything he does. To have your best players and have the performance they had today, Andrew and Cole, makes the game look easy, and it's not."

"I've watched players play at an elite level and Andrew's as good as any of them."

McCutchen scored four runs.

"He's a perennial All-Star," Richard said. "He's one of the top players in the league for a reason. You have to give him credit. Like you saw today, he hits with power to all fields, he has speed. He's a really good player."

"I fell behind McCutchen a couple of times and I think that's really what changed the game," he said.

Pinch-hitter Josh Bell homered in the ninth, his 19th.

Cole (9-7), who lives in Santa Ana and played at UCLA, won his second straight start and third decision in a row. His only big mistake was allowing a home run by rookie Dusty Coleman to center field with one out in the seventh, his second. Cole struck out eight and walked two.

Cole was a happy witness to McCutchen's big day.

"It's a lot of fun," the right-hander said. "Using all three parts of the ballpark. Pretty special hitter."

Dressel ties Phelps' record with 7th gold

BUDAPEST, HUNGARY

Michael Phelps, you've got company.

Caeleb Dressel won his seventh gold medal of the world championships Sunday, putting the U.S. team ahead to stay with another dominating swim in the 4x100-meter medley relay.

Twenty-four hours after becoming the first swimmer to win three golds in one night at a major international meet, Dressel joined Phelps in another elite club: seven golds at the second-biggest meet after the Olympics.

Phelps was the first to do it at the 2007 worlds in Melbourne, Australia — a prelude to his unprecedented eight golds the following year at the Beijing Olympics.

Dressel matched the feat along the banks of the Danube, emerging as America's next swimming sensation.

"We're seeing a star being born," teammate Matt Grevers said.

The 20-year-old University of Florida student won three individual golds and was part of four winning relay teams.

"I'm pretty tired, but, you know, it's been a good season, a good year, and to put together a seven-day meet, it's a really nice feeling," Dressel said. "There's a lot more that goes into this than just the seven days that people see, so I'm very happy to be done."

It was a big night all around for the Americans.

Lilly King set her second individual world record of the meet in the 50 breaststroke, again besting Russian rival Yulia Efimova, and returned as part of the women's 4x100 medley relay that also broke the world record.

"I couldn't imagine a better finish to this meet," King said.


Chase Kalisz swept the men's individual medleys to carry on America's dominance in those races, even after Phelps' retirement and Ryan Lochte missing out on Budapest because of his shenanigans at the Rio Olympics.

"I don't think I'll ever be on the level of those guys," said Kalisz, who romped to victory in the 400 IM on the heels of his victory in the 200. "But for me to be able to continue our prior tradition of IM, that was one thing when I grew up that I knew that was our thing."

The U.S. finished with 18 golds and 38 medals overall — a huge improvement over the previous worlds two years ago in Kazan, where the Americans managed just eight golds and 23 medals.

The home crowd had no complaints, either.

Katinka Hosszu, the "Iron Lady," finished off her third straight 200-400 IM sweep at the championships, to go along with a pair of golds from Brazil last summer.

Filmmaker Kathryn Bigelow revisits 1967 riots

'Detroit' is still burning


NEW YORK

Kathryn Bigelow hasn't forgotten the out-of-body experience she felt when she won the best director Academy Award for her 2009 "The Hurt Locker." At that moment, she became the first woman to win the award. None have been nominated since.

"The gender inequity that exists in the industry, I thought it would maybe be the beginning of that inequity not being quite so pronounced," said Bigelow in a recent interview. "Sadly, that doesn't seem to be the case. And I don't know why that is. I just don't know. But I sort of feel like on behalf of all the women who might yearn to tell challenging, relevant, entertaining stories – that I was standing there for them. And that emboldened me."

Boldness is not a fleeting quality for Bigelow. Since "The Hurt Locker," she has, with the reporter-turned-screenwriter Mark Boal, continued to craft an ambitious, intrepid kind of cinema that marries visceral big-screen immersion with deeply researched journalism. Their previous collaboration, the Osama bin Laden-hunt thriller "Zero Dark Thirty," proved an unparalleled flashpoint in both Hollywood and Washington, prompting debates over its representation of the role torture played in the hunt.

"I'm the messenger. I didn't invent the message," she said. "I'm just compelled to make these challenging pieces. And I'm compelled by stories that are informational, that tell you what you didn't know

going in – that I didn't know going in."

Her latest film, "Detroit" is a no-less challenging dive into the violent soul of America, but this time, she's on the home front. The film, also from a script from Boal, is about the Algiers Motel incident, a relatively little-remembered event that took place amid the 1967 Detroit riots – an uprising sparked by a police raid of an after-hours club – and a reaction to a long history of oppression of the city's African-Americans. The riots, among the largest in U.S. history, left 43 dead and led to the deployment of thousands of national guardsman to a Detroit that raged in fire and fury.

"Detroit" seeks to show the historical context and individual reality of the riots, which many say should be called a "rebellion." Within the chaos was the particularly heinous act at the Algiers Mo-

tel. Three unarmed black males were killed in an encounter with police and nine others (seven of them black) were beaten and terrorized. Three officers were charged with murder, as well as other crimes, but found not guilty.

Boal approached Bigelow about making a film about the incident shortly after a St. Louis County grand jury decided not to indict police officer Darren Wilson, whose fatal shooting of Michael Brown prompted the protests in Ferguson, Missouri. The relevance of the tale, Bigelow said, fueled her motivation for making it.

"There was something sadly, tragically contemporaneous about this story," Bigelow said. "How can this conversation happen in a meaningful way, is what I walk away asking. I'm just telling this story in an authentic and truthful and honest way as we could give

the information that is out there."

The story for Boal began with Cleveland Larry Reed. During the riots, Reed (played by Algee Smith in the film) was an 18-year-old singer in the Dramatics, an up-and-coming Motown group whose concert was canceled that night. He and another bandmate bunkered down at the Algiers, only to find themselves swept into a nightmare. Reed, who met with Boal and later with Smith, never recovered from the ordeal; he gave up professional music, singing instead in church choirs.

"In the summer of 2014, I was drawn to this story after meeting Larry Reed and hearing him recount what had happened to him 50 years ago, and then, later on, hearing from other survivors of the Algiers," Boal wrote in an email. "My idea for the movie was driven from the start by real people."

Gregg Allman bared soul in final album

DETROIT

Only a tight circle of family and friends knew Gregg Allman had been diagnosed with liver cancer a second time and wouldn't survive it.

With limited time, the beloved musician and co-founder of the Allman Brothers Band set a course: He would return to Muscle Shoals, Alabama, where his band began, and make a musical statement that would, according to those intimately involved in his final studio album, reach back, resolve past with present and reveal his essence.

"It really captures who Gregg is," said Don Was, producer of the "Southern Blood" album that is set for release on Sept. 8. "I think there was a tacit understanding that this album was an attempt to tie up the loose ends of his life."

Allman, who died May 27 at age 69, spent a dozen days in March 2016 in the legendary Fame Studios recording the 10 songs that would comprise "Southern Blood." Allman and his solo band cut two songs daily, but because of his health, sessions lasted only a few hours, Was said.

While the sessions were quick, Was said Allman was "fully present" and "at the peak of his interpretive powers." He co-wrote one song, the aching lead-off track titled, "My Only True Friend," but spent years deciding what to record.

Man beats odds of catching blue lobster, donates it to science

PORTSMOUTH, N.H.

A New Hampshire lobsterman has joined an elite club after catching a rare blue lobster.

The Portsmouth Herald reports Greg Ward initially thought he had snagged an albino lobster when he examined his catch off the coast July 17 where New Hampshire borders Maine. The Rye lobsterman quickly realized his hard-shell lobster was a unique blue and cream color.

The oft-cited odds of catching a blue lobster are 1 in 2 million. But no one knows for sure.

Ward says the lobster is unlike anything he's ever seen. He gave the rare crustacean to the Seacoast Science Center in Rye to study and put on display.

Center aquarist Rob Royer says

Ward's blue lobster would go on display in the exotic lobster tank once it acclimated to the water.

Self-described drug dealer calls 911, reports stolen cocaine

FORT WALTON BEACH, FLA.

Calling 911 to report a stolen bag of cocaine probably wasn't the best idea for a self-described Florida drug dealer.

But Okaloosa Sheriff's officials wrote on Facebook that 32-year-old David Blackmon did just that July 16.

The post says Blackmon called 911 to report a robbery in Fort Walton Beach. Blackmon told the responding deputy that someone entered his car and took \$50 and about a quarter ounce of cocaine from the center console.

The report says the deputy spotted some cocaine and a crack rock on the console and a crack pipe on the floor-board by the driver's side door.

Blackmon is charged with posses-

sion of cocaine and resisting arrest without violence. He was released from jail July 18, but records don't list a lawyer.

New librarian finds live Civil War-era shells in office


CARLISLE, MASS.

Will it be 'Bye Bye' to
'Birdie' for J. Lo?

Q. I'm sorry to hear that the Jennifer Lopez version of "Bye Bye Birdie" won't be on this year. Will it ever be done? — Maria Douglas, Boynton Beach, Fla.

A. Next year, supposedly. At least that's what NBC said when they made the announcement of the musical's delay. The network remains very much in business with Lopez, having renewed both of her shows, "Shades of Blue" and "World of Dance" ... but her busy schedule was the reason given for the "Birdie" postponement. That doesn't look to get much lighter in immediate times to come, so we'll see.

Q. What happened to "Sun Records," the show that ran on Country Music Television? — Jack Heffelfinger, Reading, Pa.

A. At least for the time being, it's over. Though it was meant to run over three nights initially, it was changed to a weekly show for two months. CMT declined to order a second season, with the economics involved a likely factor, since that network made a big buy in saving "Nashville" after that series was canceled by ABC.

In a scenario similar to that one, the "Sun Records" producers were said to be seeking another home for their show — which dramatized the early careers of such music legends as Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash and Jerry Lee Lewis — though there were no developments on that front at the time of this writing.

Q. How can "Hawaii Five-0" continue without Daniel Dae Kim and Grace Park? — Chris Ross, via e-mail

A. Well, it will. The actors, CBS and the show's executive producer all have weighed in with their takes on why the founding co-stars have left the show, and it's said that the Sept. 29 season premiere will explain the unexpected absence of their characters, cousins Chin Ho and Kono. Some other long-running shows have dealt with cast departures reasonably well, "M*A*S*H" and "Beverly Hills,

"90210" being among famous examples.

If there's an upside here, it's that the circumstances give the makers of "Five-0" the chance for some creative reinvention ... though at the same time, one doesn't want to mess too much with a successful formula, particularly one that also serviced an earlier CBS version of "Five-0" that ran for 12 years. It bears mention that on that show, Chin Ho (then played by Kam Fong) left after 10 seasons and Kono (played by Zulu) after four. Even the original "Danno" (James MacArthur) didn't stay for the final year.

Q. What was the name of the "Party of Five" spinoff that starred Jennifer Love Hewitt? — Kate Fryer, Bend, Ore.

A. It was "Time of Your Life," and it had an interesting history. Lower-than-hoped-for ratings led Fox to pull it from the lineup after three months, and an attempt at a relaunch the following summer (2000) didn't work very well. It officially was canceled at that point, but six years later, TBS ran the seven episodes that hadn't been shown by Fox.

One reason may have been that by then, "Time" co-star Jennifer Garner had become a major television star in her own right with "Alias." Also prominent in the "Time" cast was another actress who also went on to a much more successful run, and one that's still going — Pauley Perrette of "NCIS."

Q. Will the new "Roseanne" be on this fall? — Robin White, Grove City, Ohio

A. ABC is planning it as a midseason entry, possibly to separate it from other fall series revivals including NBC's "Will & Grace" and The CW's "Dynasty." That's also giving the writers some extra time to figure out such things as how Dan (John Goodman) is still present, since the finale of the original series revealed that he had died.

Kellie Pickler still has enough ‘Love’ to go around for Season 3

As she starts the third season of her unscripted series, there's still a lot of love around Kellie Pickler.

The country-music star and “American Idol” alum and her husband — songwriter Kyle Jacobs — again let the cameras be up-close and constantly on them as “I Love Kellie Pickler” resumes with new episodes Thursday, Aug. 3, on Country Music Television. Among the couple’s off-stage adventures this time: buying a house in Nashville, and making a trek to Alaska.

With each episode subtitle starting with “I Love ...,” Pickler maintains there are still plenty of things for her to adore. “We’ve had a ball,” the friendly, spirited singer says. “We’ve been able to do some pretty incredible things and travel and mark things off our bucket list. It’s been really wonderful.” Pickler notes Alaska is the only state she and Jacobs hadn’t visited: “We were planning to go regardless, but we ended up filming it for the show. It was great.”

Becoming a homeowner also is major, Pickler maintains. “Kyle and I live in the city area, which is nice for work and commuting back-and-forth, but we are ready for some land and to just get a little bit out of Nashville. It is crazy-booming now, with construction everywhere. It’s growing fast.” And did Pickler and Jacobs choose a newly built house or a rehabbed home? “You’ll have to watch the show!” she teases.

The third round of “I Love Kellie Pickler” — reuniting the title star with fellow “American Idol” veteran Ryan Seacrest, the show’s executive producer — comes at an active time for her. Around concert dates that have included Nashville’s annual CMA Music Festival, she recently performed on the PBS special “A Capitol Fourth” (albeit on tape from the previous night’s rehearsal, since she took ill later),

and she’ll soon co-host a new talk show with Ben Aaron (husband of “Good Morning America’s” Ginger Zee), executive-produced by country icon Faith Hill.

Pickler also has ongoing television fame as the Season 16 winner (with pro partner Derek Hough) of ABC’s “Dancing With the Stars,”

and she’s interested to see what that network does with the upcoming revival of “American Idol.” She acknowledges that show “was the rocket that launched my career and helped my dreams become reality. It does wonderful things, taking people from small towns who never would have had that

opportunity and transforming their lives overnight. I’m happy to see it come back.”

Having done “I Love Kellie Pickler” for this long is a help in tackling other TV ventures, Pickler believes. “Luckily, the production crew that we work with is like family,” she reflects, “and of course, everyone

at CMT. I’ve had a home there since I was 19, and they’ve always taken care of me. Most every day when we wrap up shooting, the crew ends up staying and hanging out for a little bit. You know you’re in good company and with friends when you hang out after working 20 hours a day together.”




