DECLARATION OF ALI GOLCHIN, ESO.

I, ALI GOLCHIN, declare as follows:

1. I have personal knowledge of the following and if called upon could competently testify thereto.
2. I am an attorney licensed to practice law in the State of California. I am admitted to the Supreme Court in California.
3. I met with Ms. Linda Ann Adi in my office at 1251 Third Ave, Suite 203 in Chula Vista, CA on February 27, 2007. She was interviewed extensively about the nature of her relationship with her ex-husband Mr. Adi. Ms. Adi voluntarily came to my office, and voluntarily discussed her ex-husband's case with me.
4. I explained to Ms. Adi the aspects of her ex-husband's case, and also discussed the crime of perjury and its consequences.
5. Ms. Adi knowingly and willingly made the attached declaration in my presence.

I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the United States of America, that the foregoing is true and correct.

Declaration of Linda Ann Adi

I, Linda Ann Adi, declare the following:

1) I was born on December 27, 1953 in Coronado, California. I live at [REDACTED]

2.) I met Amer Numan Adi in January of 1980 at Daisy's Restaurant in San Diego, California, where we both worked. I was a cook and Amer was a busboy. We met and started dating, and after a month decided to move in together. We found a house and lived there as a couple for five months until we were married on May 14, 1980.

3.) Our marriage was in the Mission Valley area of San Diego. I took Amer's last name when we married, and I have kept it to this day. The possibility of Amer receiving a green card never crossed my mind at any point during our courtship or marriage ceremony. We married for no other reason than that we loved each other and wanted to be together. A month later, in June of 1980, we had a reception for all of our family and friends. They gave us presents and money to start our new life together.

4.) We lived together as husband and wife, and after about a year of marriage, I petitioned for Amer's legal permanent residence card. We attended an interview at INS together, and he was granted his green card on March 3, 1981.

5.) Amer and I had a happy life together, but eventually we grew apart when I met someone else and later moved out in April 1982 under friendly circumstances. We filed

for divorce on May 11, 1982 because of irreconcilable differences. After that, we went our separate ways and lost touch.

6.) Years later, in early April of 1990, the INS came to my house. They knocked on the door at about 7:30 or 8 in the morning, when I was still in my bedclothes. I had no clue why authorities would be at my house. I had to put on clothes and leave my eight-year-old twin boys unattended while I went outside to talk to them. I didn't want my children to be alarmed by having federal agents in the house, so I had to meet with them outside.

All I wanted was for them to go away and leave me alone so that I could go back to feeding my children and getting them to school. I had no sense of why they would be talking to me about someone who I had not had contact with for more than six years. I had no clue if he was hurt and needed help or if he had gotten into trouble. The first conversation with the officers took less than an hour.

7.) I asked the men if they had Amer's contact information. I was worried about him and also angry that he was why the men were there. The men said they could not give me that information, and that made me even angrier.

8.) The men left, and came back a few days later with a statement for me to sign. I met them outside, and again I was aware of what neighbors might be able to hear and see. I wanted to terminate the meeting as soon as possible. I was scared and worried for my children who were inside the house unsupervised and I wanted to get back to them. I was

also furious that the men came back unannounced and were there to bother me a second time.

9.) I don't remember all of the things I said to the two INS agents; I was surprised when I saw the words on the affidavit of witness form when Amer recently showed it to me. At the time I signed the paper I was annoyed at the disruption, scared of the officers, and angry with Amer for causing me this trouble. I just wanted to get things over with so I could go back inside to my children. I got the sense that the officers wanted me to say what they wanted to hear so that would leave me alone. I have an Irish temper and I can get very angry. As a natural-born U.S. citizen, I am unfamiliar with immigration procedures. I didn't understand that a green card could be taken away. I couldn't understand what Arner's immigration status had to do with me, or why they were talking to me about someone who I hadn't seen in over six years. I never dreamed that he might be deported, and never meant to cause him harm.

10.) I don't recall ever getting a copy of the statement from the INS officers.

11.) Since that day I have regretted signing the untrue statement the INS officers prepared and have also learned more about immigration procedures. After the INS came to my door and I was able to reestablish contact with Amer, we have kept in touch and are good friends.

12.) Since he has moved to Ohio he has become a pillar of the community and is actively involved in neighborhood, school, and business functions. He currently is married to a wonderful woman and has four beautiful daughters. I, too, have gone on with my life and have two beautiful twin boys. I am now a schoolteacher with San Diego Unified School District and teach third grade. I am also president of the Department of California AMVETS Auxiliary.

13.) I am making this true statement now because I had no clue that my actions would cause Amer such trouble. I want to set the record straight. Now that I have seen the statement, I want the truth to be properly recorded in my own words. Although it has been painful recalling all these events, it is important to me to make the truth known.

14.) I would like to add that I am making this statement freely and voluntarily and that I have not been threatened in any way, nor have I been promised anything by Amer or anyone else.

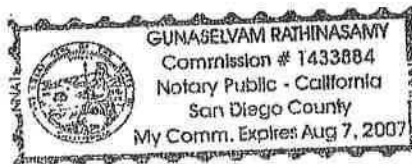


